

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BRAILLE LITERACY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that literacy skills are fundamental to success in education, employment, and life for all members of society, including individuals who are blind.
- 4 The legislature further finds that braille literacy skills are
- 5 essential for individuals who are blind to learn, seek and
- 6 maintain remunerative employment, and access the opportunities
- 7 in life open to all regardless of disability.
- $oldsymbol{8}$ The legislature also finds that it is the interest of the
- 9 State to make learning opportunities available to all residents.
- 10 Therefore, it is necessary for the State to promote braille
- 11 instruction and the timely access to braille instructional
- 12 materials for blind students, parents, teachers, and other
- 13 school personnel.
- Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 15 (1) Require the individualized education programs of blind
- 16 students to include the instruction of braille and

1		provision of braille instructional materials under
2		certain circumstances;
3	(2)	Require the department of education to establish a
4		braille literacy resource center; and
5	(3)	Make an appropriation.
6	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended b	y adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
8	to read a	s follows:
9		"PART . BRAILLE INSTRUCTION
10	§302	A-A Purpose. It is the policy of the State to promote
11	braille l	iteracy and support opportunities for blind students to
12	obtain re	ading and writing skills to the maximum extent
13	achievabl	e for each blind individual.
14	§302.	A-B Definitions. As used in this part, unless the
15	context o	therwise requires:
16	"Bra	ille" has the same meaning as in section 302A-442.5.
17	"Bra	ille instructional materials" means print instructional
18	materials	, as defined in section 302A-442.5, that are printed in
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"Eligible blind student" means an eligible student, as that

    term is defined in section 302A-442.5, who is blind, as that

    term is defined in section 347.2.

       "Individualized education program" and "individualized

    education program team" have the same meanings as in section
    614(d) of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20

         §302A-C Individualized education program; eligible blind
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    students; braille instructional materials. (a)
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    individualized education program for an eligible blind student

    shall include instruction in braille and provision of braille

    instructional materials unless the individualized education
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    program team determines that the instruction or materials are

    not necessary for the student after current and future needs
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    reading and writing performance assessments have been made.
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         (b) When included in an eligible blind student's
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    individualized education program, braille literacy instruction
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    shall be sufficient to enable the student to achieve at least
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    grade level reading and writing proficiency expected of the
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    student's peers of comparable ability to learn and progress from
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1	grade to	grade	in school. The eligible blind student's
2	individua	lized	education program shall:
3	(1)	Docum	ment:
4		(A)	The results of current braille reading and
5			writing assessments of the student, if any;
6		(B)	The date on which braille literacy instruction
7			will commence;
8		(C)	The length of the period of instruction and the
9			frequency and duration of each instructional
10			session; and
11		(D)	Performance goals for the end of the period and
12			the objective assessment measures to be used; and
13	(2)	Summa	rize how use of acquired braille skills and
14		brail	le instructional materials will be incorporated
15		into	the student's general education program and daily
16		activ	rities.
17	(c)	If th	e individualized education program team decides
18	that brai	lle li	teracy instruction is not necessary for an
19	eligible 1	blind	student in accordance with subsection (b), the
20	student's	indiv	idualized education program shall:
21	(1)	Docum	ent the student's:

1		(A) Visual condition, including cause, visual acuity,
2		field of vision, visual functioning over time,
3		stability of the condition, and prognosis; and
4		(B) Ability to achieve at least grade level reading
5		and writing proficiency without regard to the use
6		of braille, as expected of the student's peers of
7		comparable ability to learn and progress from
8		grade to grade in school;
9	(2)	Identify the literacy assessment tools and methods
10		used;
11	(3)	Provide the date of the student's next literacy
12		assessment, not to exceed twelve months from the
13		previous assessment; and
14	(4)	Include the parents or, as appropriate, the student's
15		signed concurrence to exclude braille literacy
16		instruction and braille instructional materials from
17		the individualized education program until the next
18		assessment of the student's literacy needs."
19	SECT	ION 3. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20	amended by	y adding a new section to part II, subpart C to be
21	appropria	tely designated and to read as follows:

1	" <u>§30</u>	2A- Braille literacy resource center; establishment;
2	duties; r	ules. (a) The department shall establish and maintain
3	a braille	literacy resource center that shall:
4	(1)	Advocate for braille literacy;
5	(2)	Obtain instructional materials in braille as needed;
6	(3)	Acquire, maintain, and make available studies,
7		reports, and other authoritative information about the
8		efficacy of instruction in braille and braille
9		instructional materials;
10	(4)	Award and administer grants or contracts with one or
11		more entities that the department finds qualified to
12		provide in-state braille transcription services, or
13		provide financial support in whole or in part for the
14		establishment of braille transcription services by a
15		qualified entity;
16	(5)	Ensure that each eligible blind student is registered
17		with the department of human services pursuant to
18		section 347-6;
19	(6)	For each student registered pursuant to paragraph (5),
20		provide the parents and, as appropriate the student,
21		with gomerohonging information about braille literage.

1		instruction, braille instructional materials,
2		assistive technology devices, and assistive technology
3		services, including tools and options available to
4		assess the student's braille literacy needs; and
5	(7)	When requested by a member of an individualized
6		education program team or, as appropriate, an eligible
7		blind student, participate in the development of the
8		student's individualized education program.
9	(b)	The department shall designate an individual from the
10	braille 1	iteracy resource center to serve as the ex officio
11	member of	the board of trustees of the American Printing House
12	for the B	lind pursuant to the federal Act to Promote the
13	Education	of the Blind (20 U.S.C. 101 et seq.), as amended.
14	(c)	The department may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91
15	to carry	out the purposes of this section.
16	(d)	For purposes of this section:
17	"Ass	istive technology device", "assistive technology
18	service",	and "braille" have the same meaning as defined in
19	section 3	02A-442.5; and
20	<u>"Bra</u>	ille instructional materials", "eligible blind
21	student",	"individualized education program", and

- 1 "individualized education program team" have the same meaning as
- 2 in section 302A-B."
- 3 SECTION 4. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of
- 4 the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,
- 5 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the
- 6 appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023,
- 7 and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure
- 8 ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by
- 9 \$ or per cent. This current declaration takes
- 10 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal
- 11 year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act
- 12 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure
- 13 ceiling are that:
- 14 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
- serve the public interest; and
- 16 (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
- 17 addressed by this Act.
- 18 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 20 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to
- 21 make grants or enter into contracts with one or more entities



- 1 the department of education finds qualified to provide in-state
- 2 braille transcription services, or to provide financial support
- 3 in whole or in part for establishment of braille transcription
- 4 services by a qualified entity.
- 5 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 6 education for the purposes of this Act.
- 7 SECTION 6. Beginning fiscal year 2025-2026 and each fiscal
- 8 year thereafter, the department of education shall include in
- 9 its annual budget request any sums necessary for the provision
- 10 of braille transcription services pursuant to section 3 of this
- 11 Act.
- 12 SECTION 7. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 13 3 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 14 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 15 the new sections in this Act.
- 16 SECTION 8. New statutory material is underscored.
- 17 SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.

Report Title:

Deaf and Blind Task Force; DOE; Braille Literacy Instruction; Braille Literacy Materials; Braille Literacy Resource Center; Expenditure Ceiling; Appropriation

Description:

Establishes state policy to promote braille literacy for blind students. Requires the individualized education programs of blind students to include the instruction of Braille and provision of Braille instructional materials under certain circumstances. Requires the Department of Education to establish a Braille Literacy Resource Center. Declares that the general fund expenditure ceiling is exceeded. Makes an appropriation.

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
