A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BRAILLE LITERACY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that literacy skills are
- 2 fundamental to success in education, employment, and life for
- 3 all members of society, including individuals who are blind.
- 4 The legislature further finds that braille literacy skills are
- 5 essential for individuals who are blind to learn, seek and
- 6 maintain remunerative employment, and access the opportunities
- 7 in life open to all regardless of disability.
- 8 The legislature also finds that it is in the interest of
- 9 the State to make learning opportunities available to all
- 10 residents. Therefore, it is necessary for the State to promote
- 11 braille instruction and the timely access to braille
- 12 instructional materials for blind students, parents, teachers,
- 13 and other school personnel.
- 14 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 15 (1) Require the individualized education programs of blind
- 16 students to include the instruction of braille and

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1 provision of braille instructional materials under 2 certain circumstances; 3 (2) Require the department of education to establish a 4 braille literacy resource center; and 5 (3) Make an appropriation. 6 SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 7 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and 8 to read as follows: 9 "PART . BRAILLE INSTRUCTION 10 §302A-A Purpose. It is the policy of the State to promote 11 braille literacy and support opportunities for blind students to 12 obtain reading and writing skills to the maximum extent 13 achievable for each blind individual. 14 \$302A-B Definitions. As used in this part, unless the 15 context otherwise requires: 16 "Braille" has the same meaning as in section 302A-442.5. "Braille instructional materials" means print instructional 17 18 materials, as defined in section 302A-442.5, that are printed in 19 braille.

"Eligible blind student" means an elementary or secondary

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school student who:

13		with the department of human services pursuant to
14		section 347-6;
15	(6)	For each student registered pursuant to paragraph (5),
16		provide the parent or legal guardian and, as
17		appropriate, the student with comprehensive
18		information about braille literacy instruction,
19		braille instructional materials, assistive technology
20		devices, and assistive technology services, including

1		tools and options available to assess the student's
2		braille literacy needs; and
3	<u>(7)</u>	When requested by a member of an individualized
4		education program team or, as appropriate, an eligible
5		blind student, participate in the development of the
6		student's individualized education program.
7	(b)	The department shall designate an individual from the
8	braille 1	iteracy resource center to serve as the ex officio
9	member of	the board of trustees of the American Printing House
10	for the B	lind pursuant to the federal Act to Promote the

1 "Eligible blind student" has the same meaning as in section 2 302A-B. "Individualized education program" has the same meaning as 3 4 in section 302A-B. "Individualized education program team" has the same 5 6 meaning as in section 302A-B." 7 SECTION 4. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of 8 the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93, 9 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the 10 appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, 11 and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure 12 ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by 13 per cent. This current declaration takes or14 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act 15 16 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure ceiling are that: 17 18 (1)The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to 19 serve the public interest; and

The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs

addressed by this Act.

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- 1 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 3 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to
- 4 the department of education to make grants or enter into
- 5 contracts with one or more qualified entities to provide in-
- 6 state braille transcription services or provide financial
- 7 support to a qualified entity, in whole or in part, for the
- 8 establishment of braille transcription services.
- 9 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 10 education for the purposes of this Act.
- 11 SECTION 6. Beginning fiscal year 2025-2026 and each fiscal
- 12 year thereafter, the department of education shall include in
- 13 its annual budget request any sums necessary for the provision
- 14 of braille transcription services pursuant to section 3 of this
- 15 Act.
- 16 SECTION 7. In codifying the new sections added by sections
- 17. 2 and 3 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 18 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 19 the new sections in this Act.
- 20 SECTION 8. New statutory material is underscored.

1 SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
