H.B. NO. 2143

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BEACH PARK RESTORATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Kahalu'u bay, Hawai'i island, is located 4.5 miles south of the town of Kailua-Kona, 2 and is situated in a major resort area. While the State has 3 jurisdiction over the bay's shoreline until the high water mark, 4 5 the county of Hawai'i owns and operates the Kahalu'u beach park facility, which is heavily utilized by both residents and 6 tourists. As Kahalu'u beach park is a highly visited beach park 7 on Hawai'i island, recording over four hundred thousand visitors 8 annually, the county of Hawai'i uses an innovative public-private 9 partnership with the Kohala Center's Kahalu'u Bay Education 10 Center to provide daily stewardship management, intended to 11 12 promote long-term preservation.

13 The legislature further finds that in 2022, the county of 14 Hawai'i and the United States Army Corps of Engineers, under 15 Section 206 of the Water Resources Development Act of 1996, 16 requested federal assistance for the aquatic ecosystem



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restoration due to impacts of climate change, overuse, trampling 1 of live coral and other marine life, and sunscreen chemicals 2 degrading the Kahalu'u bay marine area, a crucial spawning area 3 for cauliflower and other corals. The legislature further finds 4 that funding can supplement interagency efforts that require 5 sea-level rise studies and reports to preserve vulnerable 6 sections of the State's coastline, including at Kahalu'u bay. 7 Kahalu'u bay has historically been regarded as a sacred 8 place to Native Hawaiians, adorned with heiau, fishponds, and 9 barrier rock walls that provided for better fishing conditions 10 for hunter-gatherers in the area. Due to its historic nature 11 and popularity among visitors, there have been recent efforts by 12 the county of Hawai'i, in partnership with the Kahalu'u Bay 13 Education Center, to preserve the beach park for future 14 generations through the promotion of reef-friendly practices. 15 The legislature finds that, thanks to the tireless advocacy of 16 17 the education center, Kahalu'u bay was designated as a Mission Blue Hope Spot in 2022, demonstrating how smaller bays can 18 integrate networks powered by modern technology with traditional 19 knowledge to care for these places. In 2023, the Kahalu'u Bay 20 21 Education Center further illustrated its reliability as a



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governmental partner through its Visitor Parking Fee Pilot
Project in partnership with the county of Hawai'i, which requires
all out-of-state visitors to pay a parking fee in four-hour
intervals from 7:00 a.m. through 7:00 p.m. daily with revenues
directed towards ongoing protection, stewardship, and
restoration of the natural and cultural resources at Kahalu'u
beach park.

The legislature also finds that the Kahalu'u Bay Education 8 Center's efforts have greatly benefited Kahalu'u beach's marine 9 10 and coastal ecosystem. However, they do not shield the beach park from the impacts of global warming. Thus, during the 2021 11 Regular Session, the senate adopted Senate Concurrent Resolution 12 No. 52, S.D. 1 (2021), which requested the department of land 13 and natural resources and the county of Hawai'i to collaborate to 14 identify sea level rise at Kahalu'u bay to avoid further 15 deterioration and damage caused by rising sea levels. The 16 resulting interagency Kahalu'u bay restoration working group, 17 comprised of state and county officials, as well as community 18 leaders, have been planning for the restoration of Kahalu'u beach 19 park. The legislature believes that the group's findings 20 21 warrant a prioritization of Hawai'i island's overall coastal



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1 planning, as well as the need for a sea level rise study and 2 coastal engineering input to help guide the planning process. 3 The legislature further believes that as a public resource with 4 intergovernmental jurisdictions, the restoration of Kahalu'u 5 beach park should be a state and county partnership and can 6 serve as a model for the restoration of other public natural 7 resources throughout the State.

8 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to provide matching 9 grant-in-aid funds to the county of Hawai'i to hire an 10 engineering firm to study, plan, assist, and conduct preliminary 11 design and concept work for a two-phase project to restore the 12 Kahalu'u beach park in the county of Hawai'i.

SECTION 2. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of 13 the Constitution of the State of Hawaii and sections 37-91 and 14 37-93, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined 15 that the appropriations contained in this Act will cause the 16 state general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 17 per cent. The reasons to be exceeded by \$, or 18 19 for exceeding the general fund expenditure ceiling are that the appropriations made in this Act are necessary to serve the 20 public interest and to meet the needs addressed by this Act. 21



SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 1 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 2 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for a 3 grant-in-aid to the county of Hawai'i to hire an engineering firm 4 to study, plan, and assist in phase one of the Kahalu'u beach 5 park restoration project in the county of Hawai'i; provided that 6 no funds shall be made available under this Act unless the 7 county of Hawai'i provides matching funds of \$ for the 8 purpose for which the sum is appropriated. 9

10 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the county of11 Hawai'i for the purposes of this Act.

The appropriation made by this section for fiscal year 12 2024-2025 for a grant-in-aid to the county of Hawai'i shall not 13 14 lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that 15 are unencumbered as of June 30, 2026, shall lapse as of that 16 date; provided further that all moneys unencumbered before 17 June 30, 2026, shall remain available to aid in carrying out the 18 improvements prescribed by the design and concept work of phase 19 one of the Kahalu'u beach park restoration project in the county 20 21 of Hawai'i.



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SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general 1 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 2 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for a 3 grant-in-aid to the county of Hawai'i to hire an engineering firm 4 to conduct preliminary design and concept work, which includes 5 sequencing of events, studies, and plans, to assist in phase two 6 of the Kahalu'u beach park restoration project in the county of 7 Hawai'i; provided that no funds shall be made available under 8 this Act unless the county of Hawai'i provides matching funds of 9 for the purpose for which this sum is appropriated. 10 \$ The sum appropriated shall be expended by the county of 11 12 Hawai'i for the purposes of this Act. 13 The appropriation made by this section for fiscal year 2024-2025 for a grant-in-aid to the county of Hawai'i shall not 14 lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation 15 is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that 16 are unencumbered as of June 30, 2026, shall lapse as of that 17 date; provided further that all moneys unencumbered before 18 19 June 30, 2026, shall remain available to aid in carrying out the improvements prescribed by the design and concept work of phase 20

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3 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.
