A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO VALUE-ADDED PRODUCTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that local food 2 production is integral to the State's economic development and food security. The legislature recognizes that what the 3 department of health calls "homemade food" is what most states 4 5 define as "cottage food". Cottage food, or homemade food that is sold directly to consumers, is a small but growing industry, 6 and is preferred among many consumers who are mindful of 7 responsible sourcing and healthy eating options and those who 8 9 want to support the local communities and individuals producing 10 the foods they consume.

11 The legislature further finds that there is great interest 12 in small-scale homemade food operations in the State, but the 13 existing regulatory framework creates several challenges for 14 entrepreneurs, including those in rural areas who do not have 15 access to commercial or certified kitchens or those who no 16 longer have access to commercial or certified kitchens. In 17 fact, Hawai'i is one of only a few remaining states that does not



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provide certain exemptions from its department of health for
 homemade food products. The legislature further recognizes that
 expanding access to local homemade food products should require
 the same food safety training and certification as that required
 of other food establishments in the State.

The legislature further believes that permitting homemade 6 food operations in the State would grow small businesses; foster 7 innovation and economic growth; offer locally made alternatives 8 to imported brands; create local employment opportunities; keep 9 more money within the local economy; and increase tax revenues 10 to support the growing needs of the State, including ongoing 11 wildfire relief efforts. Notably, the legislature also believes 12 that implementing exemptions for small-scale homemade food 13 operations will provide a valuable opportunity for local 14 15 entrepreneurs to bring their homemade food products to market 16 and can serve as an essential lifeline for producers impacted by the recent Maui wildfires. 17

18 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish the 19 Access to Local Value-Added Products Act and allow homemade food 20 operations to sell homemade food products, under certain 21 conditions.

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"Homemade food operation" means an enterprise that is
 operated by a homemade food operator and produces homemade food
 products only in the home kitchen of the homemade food
 operator's private home or in a farm kitchen pursuant to this
 part.

6 "Homemade food operator" means a person who operates a
7 homemade food operation in the person's private home kitchen or
8 farm kitchen and who is the owner of the homemade food
9 operation.

10 "Homemade food product" means a food prepared for sale in 11 the private home kitchen or farm kitchen of a homemade food 12 operation.

13 "Potentially hazardous homemade food product" means a food 14 that requires time or temperature control for safety to limit 15 pathogenic microorganism growth or toxin formation.

16 "Prepared" means a homemade food product that has been 17 acidified, baked, cooked, cut, dehydrated, dried, fermented, 18 grown, mixed, pickled, preserved, raised, or otherwise 19 processed.

20 "Private home" means a dwelling, including an apartment or
21 other leased space where individuals reside, that complies with



all applicable county ordinances if used in the production of
 homemade food products.

3 "Seller" means a person or entity, other than a homemade
4 food operator, who sells a non-potentially hazardous homemade
5 food product to a consumer.

6 §328-B Requirements for homemade food operations; rules.
7 (a) A homemade food operation shall be required to obtain a
8 permit from the department pursuant to section 328-C.

9 (b) A homemade food operation shall submit proof of a
10 valid food handlers education certificate, issued by the
11 department or other food handler training certificate program
12 accredited by the American National Standards Institute, for
13 each homemade food operator.

14 (c) A homemade food operation that sell products using the 15 preservation methods of:

- 16 (1) Freeze drying;
- 17 (2) Jelly, jam, preserve, and conserve making;
- 18 (3) Acidifying and pasteurizing low-acid products;
- 19 (4) Pasteurized pickling;
- 20 (5) Pasteurized fermenting; or
- 21 (6) Dehydrating;



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shall submit proof of a valid certificate from Hawaii Master
 Food Preservers, Inc. or a comparable department-approved
 certificate for each homemade food operator in addition to the
 requirements of subsection (b).

In lieu of a valid certificate from Hawaii Master Food 5 (d) Preservers, Inc. or comparable department-approved certificate, 6 7 a homemade food operation that sells products using the preservation methods under subsection (c) shall submit a food 8 9 sample of the product to be sold to consumers to a departmentapproved laboratory or food testing facility to have the food 10 tested and the recipe approved for appropriate pH and water 11 values for food safety. A homemade food operation that sells a 12 product made through the use of preservation methods that does 13 not have proof of a valid certificate from Hawaii Master Food 14 Preservers, Inc. or a comparable department-approved certificate 15 16 shall:

17 (1) Only sell products made from recipes that have been18 approved by:

19 (A) The department pursuant to this subsection;
20 (B) Organizations and institutions such as the
21 National Center for Home Food Preservation;

16 (f) The homemade food permit shall be valid for one year 17 after the date of issuance and shall authorize the homemade food 18 operator to sell homemade food products for a three hundred 19 sixty-five-day period; provided that, if the homemade food 20 operator's permit remains valid and unencumbered within the



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first year of issuance, subsequently renewed permits shall 1 2 remain valid for two years. (g) Any food permit issued to a homemade food operation 3 prior to July 1, 2024, shall remain in full force and effect 4 5 until the department issues the homemade food operation a new 6 permit pursuant to this section. §328-D Homemade food products; labeling requirements. 7 (a) Any homemade food product produced by a homemade food operation 8 9 shall be labeled as a homemade food product. 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For the purposes of this subsection, "direct sale" means a 1 transaction between a homemade food operator and a consumer, 2 3 whereby the consumer purchases the homemade food product directly from the homemade food operation and not from a third 4 5 party. The term includes but is not limited to transactions at 6 holiday bazaars, bake sales, food swaps, or other temporary events; transactions at farm stands and farmers' markets; or 7 transactions occurring in person at the site of the homemade 8 9 food operation.

10 (c) A homemade food operator may sell a potentially hazardous homemade food product to a consumer either in-person 11 or remotely, including by telephone or the Internet; provided 12 13 that only the homemade food operator shall deliver the potentially hazardous homemade food product to the consumer. 14 (d) Homemade food operations shall be allowed to the 15 maximum extent permitted by federal law. The following food 16 17 shall be allowed:

18 (1) Poultry, poultry byproducts, or poultry food products;19 provided that:

9	section 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
10	appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
11	the new sections in this Act.
12	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.
