## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO VALUE-ADDED PRODUCTION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that local food 2 production is integral to the State's economic development and 3 food security. The legislature recognizes that what the department of health calls "homemade food" is what most states 4 5 define as "cottage food". Cottage food, or homemade food that 6 is sold directly to consumers, is a small but growing industry 7 and is preferred among many consumers who are mindful of 8 responsible sourcing and healthy eating options and those who 9 want to support the local communities and individuals producing 10 the foods they consume.

11 The legislature further finds that there is great interest 12 in small-scale homemade food operations in the State, but the 13 existing regulatory framework creates several challenges for 14 entrepreneurs, including those in rural areas who do not have 15 access to commercial or certified kitchens or those who no 16 longer have access to commercial or certified kitchens. In 17 fact, Hawaii is one of only a few remaining states that does not

provide certain exemptions from its department of health for homemade food products. The legislature further recognizes that expanding access to local homemade food products should require the same food safety training and certification as that required of other food establishments in the State.

6 The legislature further believes that permitting homemade food operations in the State would grow small businesses; foster 7 8 innovation and economic growth; offer locally made alternatives 9 to imported brands; create local employment opportunities; keep 10 more money within the local economy; and increase tax revenues 11 to support the growing needs of the State, including ongoing 12 wildfire relief efforts. Notably, the legislature also believes 13 that implementing exemptions for small-scale homemade food 14 operations will provide a valuable opportunity for local 15 entrepreneurs to bring their homemade food products to market 16 and can serve as an essential lifeline for producers impacted by 17 the recent Maui wildfires.

18 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish the 19 Access to Local Value-Added Products Act and allow homemade food 20 operations to sell homemade food products, under certain 21 conditions.

1 SECTION 2. Chapter 328, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and 3 to read as follows: 4 . ACCESS TO LOCAL VALUE-ADDED PRODUCT'S ACT: HOMEMADE "PART 5 FOOD OPERATIONS 6 §328-A Definitions. For purposes of this part, the 7 following definitions shall apply: 8 "Delivered" means to be transferred from a homemade food 9 operator to a consumer, either immediately upon sale or at a 10 time thereafter. 11 "Department" means the department of health. "Farm kitchen" means a kitchen that is designed for private 12 13 use, is located in a building on a farm and not in a private 14 home, and complies with all applicable building and zoning laws. 15 "Home kitchen" means a kitchen designed and intended for 16 use by the residents of a private home. A home kitchen may 17 contain one or more stoves, ovens, and other pieces of equipment 18 designed for residential use as allowed by county building 19 ordinances. A home kitchen may also contain one or more pieces of equipment designed for commercial use if allowed by county 20 21 building ordinances.

1 "Homemade food operation" means an enterprise that is 2 operated by a homemade food operator and produces homemade food 3 products only in the home kitchen of the homemade food 4 operator's private home or in a farm kitchen pursuant to this 5 part. 6 "Homemade food operator" means person who operates a 7 homemade food operation in the home kitchen of the person's 8 private home or in a farm kitchen and who is the owner of the 9 homemade food operation. 10 "Homemade food product" means food prepared for sale in the 11 home kitchen of a homemade food operator's private home or in a farm kitchen pursuant to this part. 12 "Potentially hazardous homemade food product" means a food 13 14 that requires time or temperature control for safety to limit 15 pathogenic microorganism growth or toxin formation. 16 "Prepared" means a homemade food product that has been 17 acidified, baked, cooked, cut, dehydrated, dried, fermented, 18 grown, mixed, pickled, preserved, raised, or otherwise 19 processed. 20 "Private home" means a dwelling, including an apartment or

other leased space where individuals reside, that complies with

1 For the purposes of this subsection, "direct sale" means a 2 transaction between a homemade food operator and a consumer, 3 whereby the consumer purchases the homemade food product 4 directly from the homemade food operation and not from a third 5 party. The term includes but is not limited to transactions at 6 holiday bazaars, bake sales, food swaps, or other temporary 7 events; transactions at farm stands and farmers' markets; or 8 transactions occurring in person at the site of the homemade 9 food operation.

10 (c) No homemade food operator shall sell a potentially 11 hazardous homemade food product to a consumer either in-person 12 or remotely, including by telephone or the Internet, unless only 13 the homemade food operator delivers the potentially hazardous 14 homemade food product to the consumer.
