A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SEARCH AND RESCUE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State and
2	counties of Hawaii incur significant costs associated with the
3	rescue of hikers who choose to go on illegal hikes and often
4	ignore prohibitionary access signs. Each rescue costs upwards
5	of thousands of dollars, and nearly one thousand rescues are
6	made every year in Hawaii. The legislature further finds that
7	it is important to address increasing costs in the State due to
8	more searches and rescues being carried out and to open public
9	discussion on hiking etiquette and the associated potential
10	risks of hiking, whether legal or not.
11	The legislature additionally finds that the COVID-19
12	pandemic has increased outdoor activity around the world,
13	specifically hiking in Hawaii. An increase in hiking in the
14	State requires more emergency responders to be readily available
15	in case hikers are in need of search and rescue. The more
16	searches and rescues made, the more risks there are to emergency
17	responders. The State and counties should be able to seek

- 1 reimbursement for these rescues from hikers who knowingly
- 2 proceed on illegal hikes.
- 3 The legislature notes that six states, namely Idaho, Maine,
- 4 New Hampshire, Oregon, South Dakota, and Vermont, already have
- 5 laws in place that impose a financial penalty for individuals
- 6 needing to be rescued outdoors because of their lack of
- 7 preparation.
- 8 The purpose of this Act is to deter hikers from entering
- 9 illegal hiking trails and to address rising search and rescue
- 10 costs facing the State and counties due to increased illegal
- 11 hiking traffic by requiring the State to impose and collect a
- 12 search and rescue fee for search and rescue expenses that result
- 13 from a person's entrance on an illegal hiking trail with notice
- 14 of its closure.
- 15 SECTION 2. Section 137-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended to read as follows:
- "[+]\$137-2[+] Reimbursement. (a) Whenever any government
- 18 entity engages in a search or rescue operation for the purpose
- 19 of searching for or rescuing a person, and incurs search and
- 20 rescue expenses therein, the government entity may seek
- 21 reimbursement from the following:

(1)	The person on whose behalf search or rescue operations
	were conducted, including the person's estate,
	guardians, custodians, or other entity responsible for
	the person's safety;
(2)	A person who ultimately benefited from a search or
	rescue operation by being rescued; or
(3)	Any entity responsible for placing the person in the
	position of danger for which the search or rescue
	operation was initiated.
(d) -	Reimbursement under subsection (a) shall be allowed
only if t	he need for search or rescue was caused by any act or
omission	by the person searched for or rescued, constituting
intention	al disregard for the person's safety, including, but
not limit	ed to, intentionally disregarding a warning or notice.
(b)	The State shall impose and collect a search and rescue
fee of \$	to be deposited into the general fund for
search or	rescue expenses from all applicable persons or
entities	from whom reimbursement may be sought pursuant to
subsection	n (a) if the need for the search or rescue was the
result of	the person:

Report Title:

Hiking Trails; Search and Rescue; Trespassing; Reimbursement; Signage

Description:

Repeals the existing conditions under which government entities may seek reimbursement for search or rescue expenses and instead requires the State to impose and collect a fee for search or rescue expenses for persons who require rescue after leaving a hiking trail to enter an area closed to the public or hiking on a trail closed to the public, with a sign giving notice of the closure.

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
