A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HAWAII EDUCATOR LOANS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii educator 2 loan program was established to recruit college students to become educators and ensure that these graduates teach in the 3 4 State's public schools. The program provides loans to students 5 who agree to teach in hard-to-fill positions at public schools 6 or at public schools located in rural areas. Loan recipients who successfully complete their teaching education program and 7 8 go on to teach in a position that meets the requirements of the 9 program are eligible for forgiveness of the loan.

10 The legislature further finds that the State continues to 11 face a growing shortage of qualified teachers. The legislature 12 believes that reducing the service requirement for total loan 13 forgiveness under the Hawaii educator loan program will increase 14 participation in the program. The legislature additionally 15 believes that increasing the amount of funds available to issue 16 loans under the Hawaii educator loan program will help to encourage more students to teach in hard-to-fill positions 17

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1 within the department of education or in public charter schools, 2 including those at rural schools. 3 The purpose of this Act is to: 4 (1)Amend the Hawaii educator loan program to: 5 Open eligibility for students and teachers who (A) 6 agree to teach as a full-time teacher in a public 7 charter school; (B) Decrease the service requirement for total loan 8 9 forgiveness to five years; and 10 (C) Increase the percent of the total loan award to 11 be waived annually to twenty percent; and 12 (2)Appropriate funds for the Hawaii educator loan 13 program. 14 SECTION 2. Section 304A-701, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended as follows: 16 1. By amending subsections (a) and (b) to read: 17 "(a) There is created the Hawaii educator loan program to 18 be administered by the University of Hawaii, in partnership with 19 a financial institution whose operations are principally 20 conducted in Hawaii, to provide financial support to students and teachers who complete a state-approved teacher education 21

16			department of education who has met standards as

19	(2)	At a	school located in a rural area in the State, as	
20		dete	rmined by the superintendent of education.	

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1 Eligibility shall be determined by the university on a 2 competitive basis. The amount to be loaned to a student shall 3 be determined by the board of regents based on need for financial aid and proof of acceptance into a state-approved 4 5 teacher education program at the university. The maximum amount 6 of loans that a student may receive under this program shall be 7 an aggregate amount equivalent to tuition payments and costs of textbooks and other instructional materials necessary to 8 9 complete a state-approved teacher education program.

10 (b) All loans made under this subpart shall bear interest 11 at five per cent simple interest. Repayment of principal and 12 interest charges shall commence one year after graduation or 13 three months after a loan recipient ceases to be enrolled in a 14 state-approved teacher education program and shall be paid in periodic installments within a [seven-year] five-year period. 15 16 The university may charge late fees and all other reasonable 17 costs for the collection of delinquent loans."

2. By amending subsection (e) to read:

"(e) Upon a showing of proof that the loan recipient has
completed a state-approved teacher education program and for
each year that the loan award recipient teaches in the Hawaii

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1	public school system pursuant to subsection (a)(1) or (2), loan				
2	forgiveness shall be provided to the recipient as follows:				
3	(1) [Ten] <u>Twenty</u> per cent of the total amount of the loan				
4	award and interest shall be waived every year for the				
5	[first] five years of repayment[; and				
6	(2) Twenty-five per cent of the total amount of the loan				
7	award and interest shall be waived every year for the				
8	sixth and seventh years of repayment]."				
9	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general				
10	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so				
11	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be				
12	deposited into the Hawaii educator loan program revolving fund.				
13	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the Hawaii				
14	educator loan program revolving fund the sum of \$ or				
15	so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to				
16	be used for the Hawaii educator loan program.				
17	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the university of				
18	Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.				
19	SECTION 5. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of				
20	the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,				
21	Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the				
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1	appropriations contained in H.B. No. , will cause the state				
2	general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be				
3	exceeded by \$ or per cent. In addition, the				
4	appropriation contained in this Act will cause the general fund				
5	expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be further				
6	exceeded by \$ or per cent. The combined total				
7	amount of general fund appropriations contained in only these				
8	two Acts will cause the state general fund expenditure ceiling				
9	for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by				
10	\$ or per cent. The reasons for exceeding the				
11	general fund expenditure ceiling are that:				
12	(1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to				
13	serve the public interest; and				
14	(2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs				
15	addressed by this Act.				
16	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.

Description:

Opens eligibility under the Hawaii Educator Loan Program for students and teachers who agree to teach as a full-time teacher in a public charter school. Decreases the service requirement for total loan forgiveness to five years and increases the percent of the total loan award to be waived annually under the Hawaii Educator Loan Program. Appropriates funds into and out of the Hawaii educator loan program revolving fund to provide financial assistance for students participating under the Hawaii educator loan program. Effective 7/1/3000. (HD1)
