A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STATE FOUNDATION ON CULTURE AND THE ARTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTIO	N 1. Chapter 9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
2	by adding a	new section to part II to be appropriately
3	designated	and to read as follows:
4	" <u>§</u> 9-	Standing selection committee; cultural grants.
5	(a) There	is established within the foundation a standing
6	selection co	ommittee to review applications and award cultural
7	grants under	r section 9-3(16).
8	(b) Th	he standing selection committee shall consist of the
9	following me	embers:
10	<u>(1)</u> <u>T</u>	ne president and chief executive officer of the
11	<u>Ha</u>	awaii tourism authority, or the president and chief
12	<u>e</u> 2	xecutive officer's designee;
13	<u>(2)</u> <u>T</u>	ne executive director of the foundation, or the
14	<u>e></u>	xecutive director's designee;
15	<u>(3)</u> Or	ne member appointed by the governor, who shall not be
16	sı	abject to the advice and consent of the senate;
17	<u>(4)</u> Or	ne member appointed by the president of the senate;

1	(5)	One member appointed by the speaker of the house of
2		representatives; and
3	<u>(6)</u>	Two members who are recognized as practitioners of
4		native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices;
5	provided	that of the seven members, no more than three members
6	shall be	a resident of the city and county of Honolulu."
7	SECT	TION 2. Section 9-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
8	amended t	to read as follows:
9	"§9-	Duties. The foundation shall:
10	(1)	Assist in coordinating the plans, programs, and
11		activities of individuals, associations, corporations,
12		and agencies concerned with the preservation and
13		furtherance of culture and the arts and history and
14		the humanities;
15	(2)	Establish written standards and criteria by which
16		grant contracts shall be evaluated;
17	(3)	Appraise the availability, adequacy, and accessibility
18		of culture and the arts and history and the humanities
19		to all persons throughout the State and devise
20		programs whereby culture and the arts and history and

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1		the humanities can be brought to those who would			
2		otherwise not have the opportunity to participate;			
3	(4)	Stimulate, guide, and promote culture and the arts and			
4		history and the humanities throughout the State;			
5	(5)	Devise and recommend legislative and administrative			
6		action for the preservation and furtherance of culture			
7		and the arts and history and the humanities;			
8	(6)	Study the availability of private and governmental			
9		grants for the promotion and furtherance of culture			
10		and the arts and history and the humanities;			
11	(7)	Through its executive director:			
12		(A) Administer funds allocated by grant, gift, or			
13		bequest to the foundation; accept, hold,			
14		disburse, and allocate funds that may become			
15		available from other governmental and private			
16		sources; provided that all those funds shall be			
17		disbursed or allocated in compliance with any			
18		specific designation stated by the donor and in			
19		the absence of any designation, the funds shall			
20		be disbursed or allocated for the promotion and			

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1		furtherance of culture and the arts and history
2		and the humanities; and
3		(B) Accept, hold, disburse, and allocate public funds
4		that are made available to the foundation by the
5		legislature for disbursement or allocation,
6		pursuant to the standards and procedures
7		established in part II, for the promotion and
8		furtherance of culture and the arts and history
9		and the humanities;
10	(8)	Submit an annual report with recommendations to the
11		governor and legislature, prior to February $1[_{ au}]$ of
12		each year. Annual reports shall include the total
13		number and amount of gifts and other grants and income
14		received, payroll disbursements, contracts entered
15		into, and progress and accomplishments made during the
16		year, including the efforts of the Hawaii arts
17		education partners and its progress in implementing
18		the Hawaii arts education strategic plan and the
19		accomplishments of the art in public places and
20		relocatable works of art programs and the state art
21		museum;

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1	(9)	Convene the Hawaii arts education partners, which is			
2		composed of the department of education, the colleges			
3		of education and arts and humanities of the University			
4		of Hawaii at Manoa, the Hawaii Association of			
5		Independent Schools, and the Hawaii Alliance for Art			
6		Education, to fully implement the terms of the Hawaii			
7		arts education strategic plan;			
8	(10)	Display student art works in public buildings, sponsor			
9		student art displays, promote arts education, and in			
10		other ways encourage the development of creative			
11		talent among the young people of Hawaii;			
12	(11)	In cooperation with qualified organizations, conduct			
13		research, studies, and investigations in the fields of			
14		ethnohistory and the humanities:			
15		(A) Make, publish, and distribute works documenting			
16		the contributions of individual ethnic groups in			
17		their relationship to one another and to the			
18		whole population of Hawaii;			
19		(B) Place ethnohistorical and cultural materials			
20		developed by the foundation or received by the			
21		foundation as gifts and donations in public			

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1		archives, libraries, and other suitable			
2		institutions accessible to the public; and			
3		(C) Maintain a register of the location of [such] the			
4		materials;			
5	(12)	Cooperate with and assist the department of land and			
6		natural resources and other state agencies in			
7		developing and implementing programs relating to			
8		historic preservation, research, restoration, and			
9		presentation, as well as museum activities;			
10	(13)	Establish an individual artist fellowship program to			
11		encourage artists to remain and work in Hawaii and to			
12		reaffirm the importance of Hawaii's artists and their			
13		cultural and economic contributions to the State by:			
14		(A) Recognizing and honoring Hawaii's exceptionally			
15		talented visual and performing artists for their			
16		outstanding work in and commitment to the arts;			
17		and			
18		(B) Enabling these artists to further their artistic			
19		goals;			
20	(14)	In consultation with the comptroller and affected			
21		agencies and departments, administer the art in public			

1		places and relocatable works of art programs
2		established pursuant to section 103-8.5; [and]
3	(15)	Administer the operations of the state art museum
4		established pursuant to section 9-22[-]; and
5	(16)	Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, award
6		and administer any cultural grants that perpetuate the
7		uniqueness of the native Hawaiian culture and
8		community, and their importance to the quality of the
9		visitor experience."
10	SECT	ION 3. Section 201B-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
11	amended by	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
12	"(b)	The authority shall be responsible for:
13	(1)	Creating a vision and developing a long-range
14		strategic plan for tourism in Hawaii;
15	(2)	Promoting, marketing, and developing the tourism
16		industry in the State;
17	(3)	Arranging for the conduct of research through
18		contractual services with the University of Hawaii or
19		any agency or other qualified persons concerning
20		social, economic, and environmental aspects of tourism
21		development in the State;

1	(4)	Prov	riding technical or other assistance to agencies
2		and	private industry upon request;
3	(5)	Perp	petuating the uniqueness of the native Hawaiian
4		cult	cure and community, and their importance to the
5		qual	ity of the visitor experience, except through the
6		awar	ding and administration of cultural grants to
7		nonp	rofit and community groups, by ensuring that:
8		(A)	The Hawaiian culture is accurately portrayed by
9			Hawaii's visitor industry;
10		(B)	Hawaiian language is supported and normalized as
11			both an official language of the State as well as
12			the foundation of the host culture that draws
13			visitors to Hawaii;
14		(C)	Hawaiian cultural practitioners and cultural
15			sites that give value to Hawaii's heritage are
16			supported, nurtured, and engaged in sustaining
17			the visitor industry; and
18		(D)	A native Hawaiian cultural education and training
19			program is provided for the visitor industry
20			workforce having direct contact with visitors;
21			and

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         (6) Reviewing annually the expenditure of public funds by
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              any visitor industry organization that contracts with
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              the authority to perform tourism promotion, marketing,

              and development and making recommendations necessary
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              to ensure the effective use of the funds for the
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              development of tourism."
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         SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
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    revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of $

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    much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025
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        full-time equivalent ( FTE) grant administrator
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    positions.
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         The sum appropriated shall be expended by the state
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    foundation on culture and the arts for the purposes of this Act.
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         SECTION 5. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of
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    the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,
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    Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the
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    appropriations contained in H.B. No. , will cause the state
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    general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be
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    exceeded by $

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    appropriation contained in this Act will cause the general fund
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    expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be further
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- 1 exceeded by \$ or per cent. The combined total
- 2 amount of general fund appropriations contained in only these
- 3 two Acts will cause the state general fund expenditure ceiling
- 4 for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by
- 5 \$ or per cent. The reasons for exceeding the
- 6 general fund expenditure ceiling are that:
- 7 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
- **8** serve the public interest; and
- 9 (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
- 10 addressed by this Act.
- 11 SECTION 6. All appropriations, records, equipment,
- 12 machines, files, supplies, contracts, books, papers, documents,
- 13 maps, and other personal property heretofore made, used,
- 14 acquired, or held by the Hawaii tourism authority relating to
- 15 the awarding and administering of cultural grants that
- 16 perpetuate the uniqueness of native Hawaiian culture and
- 17 community, and their importance to the quality of the visitor
- 18 experience, shall be transferred to the state foundation on
- 19 culture and the arts.
- 20 SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 21 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

1 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
