#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

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### Report Title:

Firearms; Licenses; Reporting

### Description:

Amends annual reporting requirement for the Department of the Attorney General concerning firearms concealed carry licenses.

PURPOSE:

To amend annual reporting requirements for the Department of the Attorney General concerning firearms concealed carry

licenses.

MEANS:

Amend section 134-9.6, HRS (section 134-F in section 2 of Act 52, Session Laws of Hawaii 2023).

JUSTIFICATION:

The bill deletes the reporting and analysis of demographic information of conceal carry license applicants and licensees that includes age, gender, and race. This will allow the report to provide data on the license in general without attaching any unintended stigma to a particular age, gender, or racial group, while affirming a constitutional right to bear arms. Removal of the deadline for the department to publish its annual report will allow the department time to do the required aggregation of the data it receives from the county police departments. The report is still due annually.

The bill extends the date that the county police departments provide the data to the department from February 1 to March 31 of each year to allow the police departments additional time to gather the required data and provide it to the department.

The violations of section 134-9.1, HRS, (carrying or possessing a firearm in certain locations and premises prohibited) may be embedded in the narrative section of the police report, which may require analysis of case-level records.

Impact on the public: In the wake of New York State Rifle and Pistol Association v.

Bruen, 597 U.S. 1 (2022), and the subsequent amendment to part I of chapter 134, HRS, the report can be of value to policy makers, researchers, educators, and the public interested in laws regulating the ownership or use of firearms.

Impact on the department and other agencies:
The bill will allow the department to
complete the report with its existing
resources. The county police departments
will have 58 additional days to provide the
reportable data without time-consuming
analysis of case-level records.
