<u>H.B. NO. 240</u>

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO A STATE FIRE MARSHAL'S OFFICE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in 1978 the 2 legislature repealed the state fire marshal's office and 3 established the state fire council. The state fire council 4 comprises the four county fire chiefs, the fire chief of the 5 state aircraft rescue fire-fighting unit, and a representative 6 of the division of forestry and wildlife of the department of 7 land and natural resources. Additionally, the state fire 8 council functions, for all intents and purposes, as Hawaii's 9 equivalent to a state fire marshal's office.

10 The legislature further finds that Hawaii is the only state 11 without a state fire marshal office in the country. The tragic 12 wildfires of August 8, 2023, in the counties of Hawaii and Maui, 13 which caused extensive loss of life and damage to the city of 14 Lahaina, has renewed interest in reestablishing the state fire 15 marshal position.

16 The purpose of this Act is to reestablish the state fire
17 marshal's office to provide support to the State and the state

3	SECT	ION 2. Section 132, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
4	amended b	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated	
5	and to re	ad as follows:	
6	"§132- State fire marshal's office; established. (a)		
7	There is	established a state fire marshal's office, which shall	
8	be placed	within the department of labor and industrial	
9	relations	for administrative purposes. The state fire marshal's	
10	office sh	all consist of the state fire marshal and one staff	
11	position.		
12	(b)	The state fire marshal shall:	
13	(1)	Review and assess the fire risk to the State;	
14	(2)	Review and propose amendments to the state fire code	
15		and submit the proposed amendments to the state fire	
16		council for the state fire council's consideration in	
17		its adoption of or amendments to the state fire code;	
18	(3)	Review the emergency resources that are available in	
19		the State to be deployed to address fires;	
20	(4)	Assess whether the State would benefit from a	
21		statewide public fire safety messaging program; and	

1	(5)	Prepare an annual report on the state fire marshal's
2		review or assessment, or both, of the items described
3		in subsection (b)(1) through (4). The annual report
4		shall be submitted to the governor and state fire
5		council no later than November 30 of each calendar
6		year.
7	(c)	The state fire marshal may employ, on a full-time
8	basis, one	e staff person to support the state fire marshal's
9	office.	
10	(d)	The state fire marshal shall be nominated by the
11	governor a	and, by and with the advice and consent of the senate,
12	appointed	by the governor without regard to chapters 76 and 89.
13	<u>(e)</u>	The state fire marshal shall hold office for a term to
14	expire at	the end of the term for which the governor was
15	elected, u	unless sooner removed by the governor."
16	SECT:	ION 3. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended by	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

1 Commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Hawaii (1)2 National Guard as such, and positions in the Hawaii 3 National Guard that are required by state or federal laws or regulations or orders of the National Guard to 4 5 be filled from those commissioned or enlisted 6 personnel; 7 Positions filled by persons employed by contract where (2) 8 the director of human resources development has 9 certified that the service is special or unique or is 10 essential to the public interest and that, because of 11 circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel to perform the service cannot be obtained through 12 13 normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any such contract may be for any period not exceeding one year; 14 15 (3) Positions that must be filled without delay to comply with a court order or decree if the director 16 17 determines that recruitment through normal recruitment 18 civil service procedures would result in delay or

19 noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent

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1 any support staff for the criminal and juvenile 2 justice resources coordination functions, and law 3 clerks; Teachers, principals, vice-principals, complex 4 (11)(A) 5 area superintendents, deputy and assistant superintendents, other certificated personnel, no 6 7 more than twenty noncertificated administrative, 8 professional, and technical personnel not engaged 9 in instructional work; 10 Effective July 1, 2003, teaching assistants, (B) educational assistants, bilingual/bicultural 11 school-home assistants, school psychologists, 12 13 psychological examiners, speech pathologists, athletic health care trainers, alternative school 14 work study assistants, alternative school 15 educational/supportive services specialists, 16 17 alternative school project coordinators, and 18 communications aides in the department of 19 education; 20 (C) The special assistant to the state librarian and 21 one secretary for the special assistant to the

1 the director of human services; four additional 2 deputies in the department of health, each in charge of one of the following: behavioral health, 3 environmental health, hospitals, and health resources 4 administration, including other functions within the 5 6 department as may be assigned by the director of 7 health, with the approval of the governor; two 8 additional deputies in charge of the law enforcement 9 programs, administration, or other functions within 10 the department of law enforcement as may be assigned 11 by the director of law enforcement, with the approval 12 of the governor; three additional deputies each in 13 charge of the correctional institutions, 14 rehabilitation services and programs, and 15 administration or other functions within the department of corrections and rehabilitation as may be 16 17 assigned by the director of corrections and rehabilitation, with the approval of the governor; an 18 19 administrative assistant to the state librarian; and 20 an administrative assistant to the superintendent of 21 education;

12		safely the duties of the positions;
13	(24)	The sheriff;
14	(25)	A gender and other fairness coordinator hired by the
15		judiciary;
16	(26)	Positions in the Hawaii National Guard youth and adult
17		education programs;
18	(27)	In the state energy office in the department of
19		business, economic development, and tourism, all
20		energy program managers, energy program specialists,
21		energy program assistants, and energy analysts;

2		personnel; provided that for state warning point	
3		personnel, the director shall determine that	
4		recruitment through normal civil service recruitment	
5		procedures would result in delay or noncompliance;	
6	(33)	The executive director and seven full-time	
7		administrative positions of the school facilities	
8		authority;	
9	(34)	Positions in the Mauna Kea stewardship and oversight	
10		authority;	
11	(35)	In the office of homeland security of the department	
12		of law enforcement, the statewide interoperable	
13		communications coordinator; [and]	
14	(36)	In the social services division of the department of	
15		human services, the business technology analyst[-];	
16		and	
17	(37)	In the state fire marshal's office within the	
18		department of labor and industrial relations, the	
19		state fire marshal.	
20	The	director shall determine the applicability of this	
21	section to specific positions.		

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1	Nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect the civil		
2	service s	tatus of any incumbent as it existed on July 1, 1955."	
3	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general		
4	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$340,000 or so much	
5	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for the		
6	following:		
7	(1)	\$150,000 for the establishment of one full-time	
8		equivalent (1.00 FTE) permanent state fire marshal	
9		position;	
10	(2)	\$90,000 for the establishment of one full-time	
11		equivalent (1.00 FTE) permanent position to support	
12		the state fire marshal; and	
13	(3)	\$100,000 for training, office supplies, rent, and	
14		other operating and administrative costs to support	
15		the state fire marshal,	
16	in carryi	ng out the purposes of this Act.	
17	The	sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of	
18	labor and industrial relations for the purposes of this Act.		
19	SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed		
20	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.		
21	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;		
22	provided	that section 4 shall take effect on July 1, 2024.

TITLE:

A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A STATE FIRE MARSHAL'S OFFICE.

PURPOSE: Reestablishes the State Fire Marshal's Office within the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations to support the State's fire prevention and mitigation efforts, review and assess the State's fire risk, and advise the Governor and State Fire Council related to statewide fire prevention and mitigation.

MEANS: Add a new section to chapter 132, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and appropriate general funds.

JUSTIFICATION: In 1978, the Legislature eliminated the State Fire Marshal's Office and established the State Fire Council. While the State Fire Council functions, for all intents and purposes, as Hawaii's equivalent to the State Fire Marshal's Office, Hawaii remains the only state in the nation without a designated fire marshal office.

> The tragic events of the August 8, 2023, wildfires in the Hawaii and Maui counties, which caused extensive loss of life and damage to the city of Lahaina, reinforced the potential benefits of reestablishing the State Fire Marshal's Office so that there is better coordination among all government agencies related to statewide fire prevention and mitigation.

> <u>Impact on the public:</u> Reestablishment of the State Fire Marshal's Office will provide support to the State and State Fire Council related to priorities, policies, initiatives, and other areas related to statewide fire prevention and mitigation.

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Impact on the department and other agencies: The State Fire Marshal's Office would provide support to the State Fire Council and Department of Land and Natural Resources, Division of Forestry and Wildlife.
