A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that supporting local
2	agriculture and strengthening local food systems are a matter of
3	statewide concern that can improve the resilience of Hawaii's
4	economy, environment, culture, and public health. The
5	legislature further finds that setting clear and ambitious
6	target goals for the purchase of locally grown food ensures that
7	the State plays its role in supporting local farmers and
8	guarantees that revenue derived from local produce remains in
9	the State and feeds local people. Act 175, Session Laws of
10	Hawaii 2021, established a programmatic goal for the department
11	cf education to provide a minimum of thirty per cent locally
12	sourced food in Hawaii public school meals by 2030. In
13	addition, the legislature also passed Act 176, Session Laws of
14	Hawaii 2021, which established five-year benchmarks ensuring a
15	certain percentage of produce that is purchased by state
16	departments is locally grown.

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1	The legislature also finds that the existing goals set
2	different standards for various state departments.
3	Specifically, the programmatic goal for the department of
4	education is to locally source at least thirty per cent of food
5	served in public schools by 2030, which is higher than other
6	state departments. Furthermore, the department of education's
7	progress towards its goal suggests that other state departments
8	should be held to the same standard for the benefit of the
9	people of Hawaii. The legislature believes that the goals to
10	provide locally-sourced food should be consistent across all
11	pertinent state departments to avoid any confusion between
12	departments.
13	Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
14	(1) Increase the percentages of local agricultural
15	products that certain state departments and the
16	University of Hawaii system are required to purchase
17	by certain deadlines;
18	(2) Expand the annual reporting requirements to include
19	total spending by certain market channels;
20	(3) Require each relevant state department and the
21	University of Hawaii system to include a corrective

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1		action plan in its respective report to the
2		legislature, should it not meet its benchmark;
3	(4)	Repeal the separate benchmark for the department of
4		education that requires thirty per cent of food served
5		in public schools to consist of locally sourced
6		products by 2030; and
7	(5)	Appropriate funds for the establishment of a farm-to-
8		state liaison within the office of the governor to
9		facilitate with reporting requirements and procurement
10		of locally grown food.
11	SECT	ION 2. Section 27-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended b	y amending subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows:
13	"(a)	The department of education, department of health,
14	departmen	t of public safety, department of defense, and
15	Universit	y of Hawaii system shall each ensure that a certain
16	percentag	e of the food purchased for public schools, youth
17	campuses,	public hospitals, public prisons, and any purchases
18	made dire	ctly by the University of Hawaii for use in its
19	academic	programs, as applicable, is fresh local agricultural
20	products	and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or food
21	products	as follows:

- (2) By January 1, 2030, fresh local agricultural products and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or food products shall constitute a minimum of [eighteen] thirty per cent of the total food purchased during each calendar year, as measured by the per cent of total food cost;
- (3) By January 1, 2035, fresh local agricultural products and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or food products shall constitute a minimum of [twenty-six] thirty-five per cent of the total food purchased during each calendar year, as measured by the per cent of total food cost;
- 19 (4) By January 1, 2040, fresh local agricultural products
 20 and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or
 21 food products shall constitute a minimum of [thirty-

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1		four forty per cent of the total food purchased
2		during each calendar year, as measured by the per cent
3		of total food cost;
4	(5)	By January 1, 2045, fresh local agricultural products
5		and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or
6		food products shall constitute a minimum of [forty-
7		two] forty-five per cent of the total food purchased
8		during each calendar year, as measured by the per cent
9		of total food cost; and
10	(6)	By January 1, 2050, fresh local agricultural products
11		and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or
12		food products shall constitute a minimum of fifty per
13		cent of the total food purchased during each calendar
14		year, as measured by the per cent of total food cost.
15	(b)	The department of education, department of health,
16	departmen	t of public safety, department of defense, and
17	Universit	y of Hawaii system shall each submit a report to the
18	legislatu	re no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
19	each regu	lar session on progress made toward meeting the
20	henchmark	a described in subsection (a) including:

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•	(±)	The total cost of food parenased during the carendar
2		year preceding that regular session, or in the case of
3		the department of education, during the school year
4		preceding that regular session;
5	(2)	The percentage of the total cost of food purchased
6		during the calendar year preceding that regular
7		session, accounted for by the total cost of fresh

9		processed, agricultural, or food products purchased,
10		or in the case of the department of education, during
11		the school year preceding that regular session; [and]
12	(3)	Total spending by the following market channels:
13		(A) Directly from a farmer, fisher, rancher, or food
14		processor;
15		(B) A food hub or farmer cooperative focused on local
16		sourcing; and
17		(C) A specialty or broadline distributor; and
18	[-(3)-]	(4) If the department or University of Hawaii system
19		did not meet the relevant benchmark described in
20		subsection (a), an explanation of why the department
21		or University of Hawaii system did not meet that

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              benchmark[-] and a corrective action plan with
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              specific steps and deadlines to meet the benchmark."

There is appropriated out of the general 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 5 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and 6 7 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 8 year 2024-2025 for the establishment of one full-time equivalent 9 (1.0 FTE) permanent farm-to-state liaison position within the 10 office of the governor to facilitate the reporting requirements 11 and procurement of locally grown food to meet the requirements 12 of section 27-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes. 13 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of 14 the governor for the purposes of this Act. 15 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 16 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 17 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000; 18 provided that section 3 shall take effect on January 1, 2024,

and section 5 shall take effect on July 1, 2023.

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Report Title:

Food Contracts; Local Agricultural Products; Benchmarks; Reporting Requirements; Farm-to-state Liaison; Appropriation

Description:

Increases the percentages of local agricultural products that certain departments are required to purchase by certain deadlines. Expands annual reporting requirements to include the total spending by certain market channels. Requires the University of Hawaii system to include a corrective action plan in its respective report to the legislature, should it not meet its benchmark. Repeals the separate benchmark for the department of education that requires thirty per cent of food served in public schools to consist of locally sourced products by 2030. Appropriates funds for the establishment of a farm-to-state liaison within the office of the governor. Effective 6/30/3000. (HD1)

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
