RELATING TO PROCUREMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 103D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended by adding a new section to part III to be appropriately
- 3 designated and to read as follows:
- 4 "\$103D- Alternative procurements. (a) A procuring
- 5 agency may select an alternative procurement method when the
- 6 alternative procurement method is made part of a federal
- 7 statute, federal regulation, federal special experimental, or
- 8 demonstration project, or by federal approval of the alternative
- 9 procurement method.
- 10 (b) Before selecting the use of the alternative
- 11 procurement method, the head of a purchasing agency shall
- 12 determine in writing that it is neither practicable nor
- 13 advantageous to the State to procure using the other methods in
- **14** section 103D-301.
- (c) <u>Documentation of the federal statute</u>, federal

6	(H)	Goods and services for commercial resale by the

8	(I)	Services of printers, rating agencies, support
9		facilities, fiscal and paying agents, and
10		registrars for the issuance and sale of the
11		State's or counties' bonds;
12	(J)	Services of attorneys employed or retained to
13		advise, represent, or provide any other legal
14		service to the State or any of its agencies, on
15		matters arising under laws of another state or
16		foreign country, or in an action brought in
17		another state, federal, or foreign jurisdiction,
18		when substantially all legal services are
19		expected to be performed outside this State;
20	(K)	Financing agreements under chapter 37D: and

20	SECTION	3. Section 103D-301, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21	amended to re	ead as follows:

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1 "§103D-301 Methods of source selection. Unless otherwise 2 authorized by law, all contracts shall be awarded pursuant to 3 the following sections, as applicable: (1) Section 103D-302 (Competitive sealed bids); 4 5 (2) Section 103D-303 (Competitive sealed proposals); 6 (3) Section 103D-304 (Professional services procurement); 7 . (4) Section 103D-305 (Small purchases); 8 (5) Section 103D-306 (Sole source procurement); [and] 9 (6) Section 103D-307 (Emergency procurements) [-]; and 10 (7) Section 103D- (Alternative procurements)." 11 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 12 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 13 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2491.

Report Title:

Methods of Source Selection; Alternative Procurement; Government Services

Description:

Adds alternative procurement methods to the types of methods of source selection. Allows an alternative procurement method when the federal government provides for or approves the alternative procurement method and the head of the purchasing agency makes a written determination that it is neither practicable nor advantageous to use the existing statutory procurement methods. Exempts from the Hawaii Public Procurement Code contracts by government bodies to procure certain construction projects. Takes effect 7/1/2491. (SD1)
