A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII CHILD NUTRITION PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii child
 nutrition programs is the state agency link between the United
 States Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service and
 local program operators. The agency conducts audits, provides
 technical assistance, and disburses federal funds while ensuring
 the programs are managed according to federal requirements.

7 The legislature further finds that the Hawaii child 8 nutrition programs has a critical role in ensuring the 9 department of education reaches the programmatic goal 10 established in Act 175, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, to provide 11 at least thirty per cent locally grown food in the State's 12 public schools by 2030. However, additional resources and staff 13 dedicated to farm-to-school connections are needed to ensure the 14 department of education meets its "30 by 30" goal.

15 The legislature also finds that the Hawaii child nutrition 16 programs is an agency attached to the department of education 17 under the board of education. However, it is critical from an

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1	ethical standpoint for the Hawaii child nutrition programs to be		
2	independent of the department of education's school food		
3	services branch to prevent its preferential treatment. The		
4	Hawaii child nutrition programs office should be moved from the		
5	department of education to the department of human services to		
6	allow the Hawaii child nutrition programs to conduct compliance		
7	audits and fiscal reviews without interference from the school		
8	food services branch.		
9	The purpose of this Act is to:		
10	(1) Establish the Hawaii child nutrition programs in the		
11	department of human services;		
12	(2) Fund grant-based programs to be administered through		
13	the Hawaii child nutrition programs; and		
14	(3) Establish three permanent full-time equivalent (3.0		
15	FTE) within the Hawaii child nutrition programs to		
16	support the State's programmatic goals.		
17	SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by		
18	adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read		
19	as follows:		
20	"CHAPTER		
21	HAWAII CHILD NUTRITION PROGRAMS		

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\$ -1 Definitions. As used in this chapter, "agency"
 means the Hawaii child nutrition programs agency.

\$ -2 Hawaii child nutrition programs agency; purpose.
4 (a) There is established within the department of human
5 services for administrative purposes only, the Hawaii child
6 nutrition programs agency. The agency shall serve as the state
7 link between the United States Department of Agriculture Food
8 and Nutrition Services and local program operators.

9 (b) The purpose of the Hawaii child nutrition programs
10 agency is to conduct audits, provide technical assistance,
11 disburse federal funds to local program operators, and
12 administer and award grants to promote the purchasing of locally
13 grown foods by all schools in the State participating in the
14 United States Department of Agriculture child nutrition
15 programs.

16 § -3 Positions. (a) The farm to school division within
17 the agency shall be headed by a farm to school coordinator who
18 shall execute, administer, and award grants to develop farm to
19 school programs to purchase local goods for consumption in
20 school food programs; purchase cafeteria equipment and provide

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1 facilities upgrades for school production kitchens; train school 2 cafeteria staff; and develop school garden cafeteria curriculum. 3 (b) The agency shall employ two permanent full-time 4 equivalent positions as follows:

5 A Hawaii child nutrition program accountant who shall (1)6 disburse funds to grantees; review quarterly reports 7 submitted by grantees for compliance; provide 8 technical assistance to schools related to United 9 States Department of Agriculture resource management 10 and procurement regulations, if appropriate; and 11 provide an annual accounting report to the legislature 12 on the disbursement of funds to the school complex 13 areas; and

14 (2) A farm to school farmer support position to assist the 15 farm to school coordinator; provide technical 16 assistance to farmers and producers to navigate the 17 procurement process to comply with United States 18 Department of Agriculture regulations; engage more 19 small farmers and producers to conduct businesses with 20 schools; and assist farmer and producers in improving 21 channels of communication with schools.

4	(b)	Funding shall be used for the purposes described in
5	subsection	n (c); provided that no more than two per cent of the

7	costs. Fi	unding retained by project partners for data
8	collection	n, outreach, and training may not exceed one per cent
9	for each p	project partner.
10	(c)	Grants shall be awarded to:
11	(1)	Fund purchase of minimally processed local food
12		products;
13	(2)	Fund equipment to increase the use and preparation of
14		minimally processed local foods in school meals;
15	(3)	Fund professional development to educate children
16		about good nutrition and farm-to-school connections;
17		and
18	(4)	Fund technical assistance to increase participation in
19		federal child nutrition programs.
20	(d)	In determining recipients for grants related to farm-
21	to-school	education and increase in participation in federal

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1	child nutrition programs, the agency shall prefer grantees who		
2	propose educational activities that meet one or more of the		
3	following:		
4	(1) Promotion of healthy food activities;		
5	(2) Clear educational objectives;		
6	(3) Involvement of parents or the community;		
7	(4) Connect to a school or child care center's farm-to-		
8	school or farm-to-early-child-care procurement		
9	activities; and		
10	(5) Marketing and promoting the program, which will lead		
11	to increased pupil knowledge and consumption of		
12	Hawaii-grown products.		
13	§ -5 Reports to the legislature. The agency shall		
14	submit a report on the disbursement of funds awarded pursuant to		
15	section -4 to the legislature no later than twenty days prior		
16	to the convening of each regular session."		
17	SECTION 3. All employees of the Hawaii child nutrition		
18	program who occupy civil service positions and whose functions		
19	are transferred to the department of human services by this Act		
20	shall retain their civil service status, whether permanent or		
21	temporary. Employees shall be transferred without loss of		

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1 salary, seniority (except as prescribed by applicable collective 2 bargaining agreements), retention points, prior service credit, 3 any vacation and sick leave credits previously earned, and other 4 rights, benefits, and privileges, in accordance with state 5 personnel laws and this Act; provided that the employees possess 6 the minimum qualifications and public employment requirements 7 for the class or position to which transferred or appointed, as 8 applicable; provided further that subsequent changes in status 9 may be made pursuant to applicable civil service and 10 compensation laws.

11 Any employee who, prior to this Act, is exempt from civil 12 service and is transferred as a consequence of this Act may 13 retain the employee's exempt status, but shall not be appointed 14 to a civil service position as a consequence of this Act. An 15 exempt employee who is transferred by this Act shall not suffer 16 any loss of prior service credit, vacation or sick leave credits 17 previously earned, or other employee benefits or privileges as a 18 consequence of this Act; provided that the employees possess 19 legal and public employment requirements for the position to 20 which transferred or appointed, as applicable; provided further

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1 that subsequent changes in status may be made pursuant to 2 applicable employment and compensation laws. 3 SECTION 4. All appropriations, records, equipment, 4 machines, files, supplies, contracts, books, papers, documents, 5 maps, and other personal property heretofore made, used, 6 acquired, or held by the department of education relating to the 7 functions transferred to the department of human services shall 8 be transferred with the functions to which they relate. 9 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 11 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and 12 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 13 year 2024-2025 to fund grants administered by the Hawaii child 14 nutrition programs agency for the 2023-2024 school year. 15 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 16 of human services for the purposes of this Act. 17 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general 18 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 19 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and 20 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 21 year 2024-2025 for the establishment of:

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1	(1)	One permanent full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) farm to
2		school coordinator;
3	(2)	One permanent full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) Hawaii
4		child nutrition programs accountant; and
5	(3)	One permanent full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) farm to
6		school farmer support position.
7	The	sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
8	of human	services for the purposes of this Act.
9	SECT	ION 7. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000.
