A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDICAL TRANSPORTATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that between 2020 and
- 2 2021, Molokai and Lanai lost access to two air carriers, leaving
- 3 both islands with a single air carrier available to the public
- 4 for departures from each island. Since then, residents have
- 5 been plagued with inconsistent and undependable air
- 6 transportation services, including frequent and last-minute
- 7 flight changes, cancellations, and lengthy delays. As rural
- 8 communities, residents of Molokai and Lanai are medically
- 9 underserved, which means that residents are routinely referred
- 10 to providers on Maui or Oahu for medical care. Delays,
- 11 cancellations, and flight changes may cause residents traveling
- 12 for medical treatment to miss important and potentially
- 13 life-saving treatments, including surgeries and chemotherapy
- 14 treatments that were scheduled months earlier and may take weeks
- 15 to months to reschedule.
- 16 The purpose of this Act is to establish a two-year
- 17 essential rural medical air transport pilot project to make

4	SECT	ION 2. (a) There is established within the department
5	of health	the essential rural medical air transport pilot
6	project.	
7	(b)	The purpose of the pilot project shall be to provide
8	residents	in rural islands with increased access to medical
9	care.	
10	(c)	The pilot project shall charter flights and:
11	(1)	Allow insurance companies to reserve and pay for seats
12		on those flights for:
13		(A) Insured individuals residing on a rural island to
14		be transported to and from an urban island for
15		medical and health care services, including
16		appointments with medical providers; and
17		(B) The companions of insured individuals to
18		accompany the insured individuals; and
19	(2)	Allow companions of insured individuals to reserve and
20		pay for seats on those flights to accompany the

insured individuals.

1	(d) The pilot project shall seek reimbursement or payment
2	from insurers to the maximum extent possible.
3	(e) Subject to available funds and demand, the pilot
4	project shall attempt to offer at least roundtrip
5	flights per week.
6	(f) The department of health shall consult with
7	appointment schedulers, patient navigators, provider staff, and
8	insurers to coordinate patient appointment times with flight
9	times.
10	(g) The department of health may contract with a private
11	entity to administer the pilot project.
12	(h) The department of health shall submit a report to the
13	legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
14	the regular session of 2026. The report shall contain:
15	(1) The expenses and revenues of the pilot project;
16	(2) The number of seats sold to:
17	(A) Insured individuals seeking transportation to
18	obtain medical services;
19	(B) Companions of insured persons; and
20	(C) Other residents of a rural island,

who used the pilot project;

1 (3) Any other relevant findings; and 2 (4) Recommendations about whether the pilot project should 3 be extended, amended, made permanent, or terminated, 4 and any proposed legislation. 5 The pilot program shall cease to exist on June 30, (i) 6 2026. 7 (j) For the purpose of this Act: 8 "Rural island" means an island within the State that has a 9 population of more than one thousand, but less than ten 10 thousand. 11 "Urban island" means an island within the State that: 12 (1)Has a population of more than nine hundred thousand; 13 or 14 (2) Has a population of more than one hundred thousand but 15 less than one hundred eighty thousand. SECTION 3. This Act shall not be construed to limit or 16 prevent any individual from obtaining transportation to another 17 18 location for medical treatment or to reduce or limit any 19 insurance reimbursement or coverage for those transportation

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costs.

- 1 SECTION 4. In accordance with section 9 of article VII, of
- 2 the Constitution of the State of Hawaii and sections 37-91 and
- 3 37-93, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined
- 4 that the appropriation contained in this Act will cause the
- 5 state general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025
- 6 to be exceeded by \$, or per cent. The reasons
- 7 for exceeding the general fund expenditure ceiling are that the
- 8 appropriation made in this Act is necessary to serve the public
- 9 interest and to meet the needs provided for by this Act.
- 10 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 11 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 12 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for
- 13 necessary positions and the other expenses of the essential
- 14 rural medical air transport pilot project.
- 15 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 16 health for the purposes of this Act.
- 17 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.

Establishes within the Department of Health a 2-year pilot project to charter flights from rural islands to an urban island to provide rural island residents with reliable transportation to medical care on urban islands. Appropriates funds. Sunsets 6/30/2026. Effective 7/1/3000. (HD1)

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
