A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 139, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 3 to read as follows:
- 4 "PART . MOTOR VEHICLE PURSUITS
- 5 §139-A Definitions. As used in this part:
- 6 "Authorized emergency vehicle" or "police vehicle" means a
- 7 vehicle that is authorized for police service and equipped with
- 8 an operable department-authorized blue light and siren; or a
- 9 police helicopter.
- 10 "Body-worn camera" means a police department-issued,
- 11 compact video-recording device worn by a law enforcement officer
- 12 for the purpose of recording interactions with the public.
- "Motor vehicle pursuit" or "pursuit" means an attempt by a
- 14 law enforcement officer operating or directing the operation of
- 15 a motor vehicle to stop another motor vehicle when an occupant
- 16 of that vehicle is a suspected violator of the law, and the

- 1 driver of that vehicle appears to be ignoring lawful commands to
- 2 stop or to be fleeing from the law enforcement officer.
- 3 "Primary unit" means the authorized emergency vehicle that
- 4 initiates or continues as the lead vehicle in a pursuit.
- 5 "Secondary unit" means any police vehicle that becomes
- 6 involved as a backup to the primary unit.
- 7 "Superior officer" means a law enforcement officer above
- 8 the rank of sergeant.
- 9 §139-B Restrictions. (a) No law enforcement officer
- 10 operating or directing the operation of a motor vehicle not
- 11 equipped with blue lights and sirens authorized by law and the
- 12 applicable police department shall engage in a motor vehicle
- 13 pursuit.
- 14 (b) No law enforcement officer shall engage in a motor
- 15 vehicle pursuit conducted by a different state or county agency
- 16 without receiving authorization from the law enforcement
- 17 officer's respective field supervisor.
- 18 §139-C Initiation of pursuit. (a) Before initiating a
- 19 pursuit, a law enforcement officer shall use the police
- 20 vehicle's blue light and siren to command the subject motor
- 21 vehicle to stop. If the driver exhibits intentions of eluding

3	(b)	Each	law enforcement officer initiating a pursuit	
4	shall:			
5	(1)	Cont	inuously use the flashing blue light and siren;	
6	(2)	Immediately notify a dispatcher by specifically		
7		announcing that the law enforcement officer is		
8		initiating a pursuit;		
9	(3)	Prov	ride to the dispatcher:	
10		(A)	The reason, location, and direction of the	
11			pursuit;	
12		(B)	Each motor vehicle's speed;	
13		(C)	The weather conditions;	
14		(D)	A general description of the pedestrian and	
15			vehicular traffic;	
16		(E)	The description and license plate number of the	
17			pursued vehicle;	
18		(F)	A description of the pursued vehicle's occupants	
19			and	
20		(G)	Frequent updates regarding subparagraphs (B)	
21			through (F); provided that each secondary unit	

1		shall also provide frequent updates in accordance
2		with this subparagraph.
3	(c)	Upon gathering adequate information, the dispatcher
4	shall mak	e timely notification to the appropriate field
5	superviso	rs and the on-duty lieutenant, or lieutenant's
6	designee,	of the division of the police department responsible
7	for publi	c communications. The lieutenant, or lieutenant's
8	designee,	shall monitor the pursuit closely.
9	(d)	The primary dispatcher of the police department shall
10	be respon	sible for handling each pursuit; provided that the
11	primary d	ispatcher shall select how often the police department
12	shall use	the primary dispatcher.
13	(e)	The dispatcher shall:
14	(1)	Use a multicast broadcast to notify all available
15		units of the pursuit;
16	(2)	Be responsible for transmitting all available
17	•	information about the pursuit; and
18	(3)	Contact the applicable helicopter unit of the police
19		department and direct the unit to assist in the
20		pursuit if the unit is available and the dispatcher
21	,	deems it appropriate.

- 1 §139-D Supervisory responsibilities. (a) The applicable
- 2 pursuit supervisor shall be responsible for supervising each
- 3 pursuit; provided that, in the pursuit supervisor's absence, the
- 4 ranking supervisor available at the time shall be responsible
- 5 for supervising the pursuit.
- 6 (b) The individual identified in subsection (a) shall:
- 7 (1) Determine the units to participate in the pursuit;
- 8 (2) Be responsible for determining whether to designate
- 9 the situation as a pursuit; and
- 10 (2) Direct the pursuit throughout its duration;
- 11 provided that if a superior officer instructs or directs law
- 12 enforcement officers involved in the pursuit, the pursuit
- 13 supervisor's responsibilities shall be transferred to that
- 14 superior officer.
- 15 (c) The field supervisor shall terminate any pursuit that
- 16 becomes dangerous.
- 17 (d) The applicable initial patrol district watch commander
- 18 shall ensure that each report prepared pursuant to section 139-G
- 19 is submitted to the district commander in accordance with that
- 20 section.

1	3133	- Fursuit tactics. (a) No more than two porre
2	vehicles	shall pursue a subject vehicle at any time; provided
3	that the	pursuit supervisor may authorize more vehicles to
4	participa	ate in the pursuit if necessary for the safety of the
5	law enfor	cement officers involved.
6	(b)	The operator of a secondary unit that becomes involved
7	as a back	tup to the primary unit shall:
8	(1)	Keep the emergency lights and siren activated at all
9		times during the pursuit;
10	(2)	Inform a dispatcher that the operator is engaging in
11		the pursuit; and
12	(3)	Information a dispatcher if the operator takes over
13		the pursuit.
14	(C)	No law enforcement officer not directed by the pursuit
15	superviso	or to participate in the applicable pursuit shall join
16	in the pu	rsuit; provided that an available law enforcement

officer shall monitor the progress of the pursuit on the law

enforcement officer's radios and position themselves so as to be

prepared to assist if directed to do so; provided further that

no law enforcement officer shall violate any applicable traffic

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- 1 laws or regulations to satisfy the requirements of this
- 2 subsection.
- 3 (d) No law enforcement officer shall attempt to pull
- 4 alongside or pass a pursued vehicle. Each pursuing law
- 5 enforcement officer shall remain at a safe distance behind the
- 6 pursued vehicle and keep the pursued vehicle in the law
- 7 enforcement officer's sight until the driver of the pursued
- 8 vehicle stops voluntarily. Each pursuing police vehicle shall
- 9 remain at a safe distance from any other pursuing police
- 10 vehicle.
- (e) Each pursuing law enforcement officer shall use a
- 12 firearm in the pursuit only in strict compliance with any
- 13 applicable laws and directives relating to the use of firearms.
- 14 (f) Each pursuing law enforcement officer having a
- 15 body-worn camera shall ensure that the camera is activated and
- 16 used in strict compliance with any applicable laws and
- 17 directives throughout the pursuit.
- 18 (g) No police vehicle shall be used to block, contain, or
- 19 ram a pursuing vehicle.
- 20 (h) If available and deemed appropriate to do so, an
- 21 applicable helicopter unit of the police department shall assist



- 1 in each pursuit. Any relevant information obtained from the
- 2 helicopter unit, including the unit's ability to track the
- 3 pursued vehicle, shall be provided to the pursuit supervisor.
- 4 The pursuit supervisor may, based on this information, consider
- 5 directing all ground units to terminate the pursuit and direct
- 6 these units to respond to the location of the pursued vehicle in
- 7 a nonemergency status.
- 8 §139-F Termination of pursuit. (a) Each pursuit shall be
- 9 terminated if:
- 10 (1) The risk created by the pursuit is unreasonable based
- on the nature of the offense for which the suspect is
- being pursued and the conditions under which the
- pursuit is conducted, including the speeds involved,
- volume of traffic on the road, pedestrian traffic,
- 15 weather and roadway conditions, actions of the pursued
- vehicle, actions of the pursuing law enforcement
- officers, actions at intersections, presences of
- school zones, time of day, and any other factors that
- may affect visibility and maneuverability;
- 20 (2) The suspect is identified with sufficient certainty
- that apprehension may be effected at a later time; or

1	(3) The whereabouts of the pursued vehicle are no longer
2	certain;
3	provided that the pursuit supervisor shall be primarily
4	responsible for determining whether to terminate the pursuit;
5	provided further that nothing in this section shall be construed
6	as precluding any other law enforcement officer, including the
7	primary unit, from terminating the pursuit based on the law
8	enforcement officer's knowledge of conditions that are relevant
9	to the pursuit.
10	(b) Any helicopter unit participating in a pursuit may
11	terminate the unit's participation if the pilot of the
12	helicopter or an observer in the helicopter determines that the
13	danger of continuing the pursuit from the air outweighs the need
14	to continue the pursuit.
15	(c) Upon termination of a pursuit:
16	(1) Each pursuing law enforcement officer shall turn off
17	the pursuing vehicle's siren and blue lights, reduce
18	the vehicle's speed to the posted limit, and attempt
19	to maneuver the vehicle out of view of the pursued
20	driver; and

1	(2) The helicopter unit shall bring the helicopter to the			
2	normal cruising altitude and out of view of the			
3	pursuit vehicle unless directed by the pursuit			
4	supervisor to continue monitoring the pursuit vehicle			
5	§139-G Motor vehicle pursuit reports. (a) After each			
6	motor vehicle pursuit, each member of the police department who			
7	participated in the pursuit, including the pursuit supervisor,			
8	each primary and secondary unit, and each law enforcement			
9	officer in the applicable helicopter unit, shall prepare a			
10	report that includes:			
11	(1) The reason for the pursuit;			
12	(2) The date, start time, and end time of the pursuit;			
13	(3) Identification of each party involved in the pursuit;			
14	(4) A summary of the circumstances surrounding the			
15	pursuit; and			
16	(5) Whether a body-worn camera was present and active			
17	during the pursuit.			
18	No later than the next calendar day following the pursuit, each			
19	member shall submit the member's report to the commander of the			
20	element in which the pursuit began, or the commander's designee			
21	Within five calendar days of the pursuit, the commander or			

- 1 commander's designee shall compile, and submit to the applicable
- 2 office of the county that is responsible for professional
- 3 standards for law enforcement officers, all reports prepared in
- 4 response to the pursuit. The professional standards office
- 5 shall forward the compilation of reports to the pursuit review
- 6 board established under section 139-H and the commander of the
- 7 element in which the pursuit began.
- 8 (b) Each report shall be prepared on a form approved by
- 9 the professional standards office; provided that this form shall
- 10 comply with the requirements of subsection (a).
- 11 §139-H Pursuit review boards; composition; duties. (a)
- 12 Each police department in the State shall establish a pursuit
- 13 review board to review each motor vehicle pursuit and recommend
- 14 a course of action to the applicable chief of police.
- 15 (b) Each pursuit review board shall comprise a major, or
- 16 the major's designee, from each bureau of the applicable police
- 17 department. The major of the police department division that is
- 18 responsible for enforcement of the State and applicable county's
- 19 traffic laws shall serve as the chairperson of the pursuit
- 20 review board. The pursuit review board shall select a vice
- 21 chairperson from among its members.

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1	(c) A majority of all members to which the pursuit review
2	board is entitled shall constitute a quorum to do business.
3	(d) Each member of each pursuit review board shall serve a
4	term of at least twelve months. Two members shall be replaced
5	each year.
6	§139-I Pursuit review boards; investigations. (a) After
7	each pursuit:
8	(1) The captain of each element involved in the pursuit
9	shall:
10	(A) Appear before the applicable pursuit review
11	board;
12	(B) Provide the pursuit review board with a summary
13	of the pursuit; and
14	(C) Make recommendations regarding whether:
15	(i) The pursuit was conducted within acceptable
16	parameters; or
17	(ii) An additional investigation is required; and
18	(2) The pursuit review board shall:
19	(A) If the pursuit review board determines that the
20	pursuit was conducted within acceptable
21	parameters, submit the pursuit review board's

1			conc	lusion in writing to the applicable chief of
2			poli	ce; or
3	·	(B)	If t	he pursuit review board determines that the
4			purs	uit was not conducted within acceptable
5			para	meters:
6	·		(i)	But no additional investigation is required,
7				recommend to the applicable chief of police
8				that a non-disciplinary action is
9				appropriate; or
10			(ii)	Direct the commander of each affected
11				employee to conduct a full investigation of
12				the pursuit without determining a final
13	•			disposition or corrective action; provided
14				that, at the discretion of the pursuit
15				review board, the chairperson of the pursuit
16				review board may direct the applicable
17				professional standards office to conduct the
18				investigation.
19	(b)	If a	n inv	estigation is undertaken pursuant to this
20	section,	the c	hairp	erson of the applicable pursuit review board
21	shall di	stribu	te to	each member of the pursuit review board and

- 1 the commander of any accused employee's element a report of the
- 2 completed investigation. At the request of the chairperson of
- 3 the pursuit review board, the captain of any accused employee's
- 4 element shall appear before the pursuit review board and provide
- 5 a summary of the case and testimony about the employee's work
- 6 history and disciplinary record and make recommendations
- 7 regarding the disposition of the investigation.
- 8 (c) Any accused employee may choose to either appear
- 9 before the pursuit review board in person or provide a written
- 10 response to each charge made against the employee; provided
- 11 that, if the accused employee elects to appear in person, the
- 12 accused employee may have a union representative present at the
- 13 hearing. The accused employee may provide the pursuit review
- 14 board with any mitigating circumstances for the pursuit review
- 15 board to consider.
- 16 (d) A written notice of each pursuit review board hearing
- 17 conducted pursuant to this section shall be delivered to any
- 18 applicable accused employee at least fourteen calendar days
- 19 before the hearing date.
- 20 (e) After consideration of all pertinent information, the
- 21 pursuit review board shall submit its recommendations in writing



- to the applicable deputy chief of police, who shall forward the
 recommendations to the applicable chief of police.

 \$139-J Annual report. No later than January 31 of each
 year, the pursuit review board shall submit to the applicable
 chief of police a report that includes:

 (1) An analysis of all pursuit reports to determine
 possible patterns and trends;
- 8 (2) A review of pursuit policies and reporting procedures;9 and
- 10 (3) Any recommendations for training or policy changes, or both."
- SECTION 2. Chapter 139, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 amended by designating sections 139-1 to 139-9 as Part I, and
 inserting a title before section 139-1 to read as follows:

15 "PART I. GENERAL PROVISIONS"

SECTION 3. In codifying the new sections added by
section 1 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
the new sections in this Act.
