A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ORAL HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's oral health program is not meeting the needs of residents. Unlike forty-two other states, this State's department of health does not retain
- 4 dedicated oral health staff to assess and monitor the
- 5 population's oral health status, community needs, and assets;
- 6 inform and educate people about oral health; mobilize community
- 7 partners to leverage resources; develop, champion, and implement
- 8 policies, laws, and plans that support oral health efforts;
- 9 reduce barriers to care; assure a competent and skilled public
- 10 and private oral health workforce; and improve public oral
- 11 health functions through ongoing evaluation and continuous
- 12 quality improvement.
- 13 The legislature further finds that the adult medicaid
- 14 population has limited access to dental care. While there are
- 15 more than 288,000 adults with medicaid dental benefits, there is
- 16 a lack of dental providers for this population. Additionally,
- 17 while federally qualified health centers in each county are a

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- 1 critical medical and oral health safety net, approximately
- 2 forty-two thousand people of all ages and covered by all types
- 3 of health insurance were served by the health centers in 2021.
- 4 The legislature additionally finds that while the
- 5 department of health operates five small dental clinics and also
- 6 serves individuals who are elderly, blind, intellectually
- 7 disabled, developmentally disabled, and mentally ill, all
- 8 clinics are located in the city and county of Honolulu. The
- 9 State does not operate dental clinics to serve similar
- 10 populations in other counties. The legislature notes that three
- 11 hundred thirty-nine dentists in the State currently accept and
- 12 treat adults covered by medicaid.
- While the legislature allocated more than \$25,000,000 in
- 14 2022 to reinstate adult medicaid dental benefits, the
- 15 legislature is concerned that the current oral health
- 16 infrastructure is insufficient to deliver oral health services
- 17 to those most in need.
- 18 The purpose of this Act is to:
- (1) Establish an oral health task force to review
- 20 information and data on the status of oral health in

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1		the state and make recommendations to improve the
2		State's oral health infrastructure; and
3	(2)	Appropriate funds to help facilitate the work of the
4		oral health task force.
5	SECT	ION 2. (a) There is established an oral health task
6	force to	be placed within the department of health for
7	administr	ative purposes.
8	(b)	The oral health task force shall:
9	(1)	Review all information and data relating to the status
10		of oral health in Hawaii, including the Hawaii Oral
11		Health Coalition 2022-2023 environmental scan, for
12		evidence of key oral health issues and evident areas
13		for action;
14	(2)	Review all information and data relating to the
15		department of health oral health program functions and
16		processes and make recommendations regarding
17		organizational structure, personnel needs, contracted
18		service needs, required resources, and potential
19		additional funding and support;
20	(3)	Review and analyze systemic issues in oral health
21		services and processes statewide and make

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1		recommendations for systemic changes and improvements
2		to improve equity in oral health;
3	(4)	Develop an oral health strategic blueprint that
4		includes goals, objectives, specific actions, and
5		resources needed;
6	(5)	Act as a systemic facilitator for key oral health
7		stakeholders so that complex and problematic issues
8		can be discussed and addressed in a timely and
9		effective manner;
10	(6)	Ensure that there are agreed-upon community metrics
11		for analyzing the development and implementation of
12		medicaid funding for oral health; and
13	(7)	Make recommendations to state and county policymakers
14		regarding systemic actions recommended to improve oral
15		health in Hawaii.
16	(c)	The oral health task force shall consist of the
17	following	members:
18	(1)	One representative of the family health services
19		division of the department of health, to be appointed
20		by the director of health;

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1	(2)	One representative of the developmental disabilities
2		division of the department of health, to be appointed
3		by the director of health;
4	(3)	One representative of the med-QUEST division of the
5		department of human services, to be appointed by the
6		director of human services;
7	(4)	One representative of the student services branch of
8		the department of education, to be appointed by the
9		superintendent of education;
10	(5)	One representative of the state council on
11		developmental disabilities, to be appointed by the
12		speaker of the house of representatives;
13	(6)	One faculty member of the university of Hawaii at
14		Manoa Nancy Atmospera-Walch school of nursing dental
15		hygiene program, to be appointed by the speaker of the
16		house of representatives;
17	(7)	One representative of the university of Hawaii John A.
18		Burns school of medicine, to be appointed by the
19		president of the senate;
20	(8)	One representative of the county of Hawaii who is a
21		department of health employee or community oral health

1		representative, to be appointed by the president of
2		the senate;
3	(9)	One representative of the county of Maui who is a
4		member of the private practice dental community who is
5		working with the adult medicaid population or other
6		medicaid-associated dentists, to be appointed by the
7		speaker of the house of representatives;
8	(10)	One representative of the county of Kauai who is a
9		community oral health representative, to be appointed
10		by the president of the senate;
11	(11)	One representative of the city and county of Honolulu
12		who is a member of the private practice dental
13		community who is working with the adult medicaid
14		population or other medicaid-associated dentists, to
15		be appointed by the speaker of the house of
16		representatives;
17	(12)	One representative of the Hawaii Oral Health
18		Coalition, to be invited by the president of the
19		senate;

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1	(13)	One representative of the Hawaii Dental Association,
2		to be invited by the speaker of the house of
3		representatives;
4	(14)	One representative of the Hawaii Dental Service, to be
5		invited by the president of the senate;
6	(15)	One representative of the Hawaii Dental Service
7		Foundation, to be invited by the speaker of the house
8		of representatives;
9	(16)	One representative of a Hawaii dental medicaid
10		insurer, to be invited by the president of the senate;
11	(17)	Two community advocates for medicaid and oral health,
12		one each to be invited by the speaker of the house of
13		representatives and president of the senate,
14		respectively;
15	(18)	One representative of the Hawaii Primary Care
16		Association, to be invited by the president of the
17		senate;
18	(19)	One representative of the Native Hawaiian Health Care
19		Systems, to be invited by the speaker of the house of
20		representatives;

1	(20)	one representative of Papa Ola Lokani, to be invited
2	h	by the president of the senate; and
3	(21) C	one representative of the Hawaii Dental Hygienists'
4	A	Association, to be invited by the speaker of the house
5	C	of representatives.
6	(d) I	The representative of the family health services
7	division of	the department of health shall serve as the
8	chairperson	of the task force. If the representative of the
9	family heal	th services division of the department of health is
10	unable to s	serve as the chairperson of the task force, the
11	members of	the task force shall select a chairperson from among
12	the remaini	ng members.
13	(e) T	he oral health task force shall submit an interim
14	report of i	ts findings and recommendations to the legislature no
15	later than	twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular
16	Session of	2025. The department of health shall submit a final
17	report of t	he oral health task force's findings and
18	recommendat	ions, as part of its annual report submitted pursuant
19	to section	321-63, Hawaii Revised Statutes, including any
20	proposed le	gislation, to the legislature no later than twenty
21	days prior	to the convening of the Regular Session of 2027.

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2 (g) Less than a quorum of task force members may discuss 3 task force business together outside of a duly noticed meeting; provided that the members report the matters discussed at the 4 5 next duly noticed meeting of the task force, and that no 6 commitment to vote is made or sought. These discussions shall 7 be a permitted interaction under section 92-2.5, Hawaii Revised 8 Statutes. 9 SECTION 3. In accordance with section 9 of article VII, of 10 the Constitution of the State of Hawaii and sections 37-91 and 11 37-93, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined 12 that the appropriations contained in this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 13 14 to be exceeded by \$ per cent. The reasons , or 15 for exceeding the general fund expenditure ceiling are that the 16 appropriations made in this Act are necessary to serve the 17 public interest and to meet the needs provided for by this Act. 18 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 20 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for 21 the family health services division of the department of health

(f) The task force shall cease to exist on June 30, 2027.

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1	to contract with a consultant to facilitate the work of the oral
2	health task force, including completing the interim and final
3	reports required by subsection (e) of section 2 of this Act.
4	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
5	health for the purposes of this Act.
6	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
7	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
8	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for
9	the establishment of permanent full-time equivalent
10	(FTE) program specialist V positions within the family
11	health services division of the department of health.
12	This position shall:
13	(1) Collect, analyze, and evaluate information relevant to
14	specific oral health policy issues and related
15	material to enable oral health task force members to
16	develop informed policy recommendations affecting oral
17	health care;
18	(2) Serve as the representative of the department of
19	health oral health program to the Hawaii Oral Health
20	Coalition;

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1	(3)	Develop, administer, monitor, and provide oversight of
2		the contract for a consultant to facilitate the work
3		of the oral health task force; and
4	(4)	Serve as a liaison between the department of health
5		and other state agencies on the oral health task
6		force.
7	The	sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
8	health fo	r the purposes of this Act.
9	SECT	ION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
10	provided	that sections 4 and 5 shall take effect on July 1,
11	2024.
