A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SCHOOL-BASED HEALTH SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii keiki: 2 healthy and ready to learn program (Hawaii keiki program) is 3 designed to improve access to quality school-based health 4 services for Hawaii's public school students by providing direct 5 services and coordinating care with primary and tertiary care 6 providers. Further, the Hawaii keiki program screens, 7 identifies, and meets needs, such as for oral and mental health 8 services, by seeking and obtaining private funds as needed. 9 This partnership program with the university of Hawaii at Manoa 10 Nancy Atmospera-Walch school of nursing supports the department 11 of education in achieving student, school, and system success by 12 providing health nursing services to public schools, thus 13 allowing school and department staff to focus on their mission 14 to educate the State's children.

15 In the last three years, the Hawaii keiki program has 16 provided direct on-site services in over one hundred seventy-one 17 schools, and indirect support to all department of education

1 schools, complexes, and complex areas. Critical to the 2 expansion of services are health technicians who are community 3 health workers, medical assistants, and certified nurse 4 assistants. Under the supervision of the registered nurses, 5 health technicians support on-site health room visits; implement 6 nursing orders; facilitate virtual nursing visits; facilitate health screening efforts; support staff, parent, and student 7 8 health education; and provide health support to the campus. 9 The legislature finds that health technicians have significantly increased the capacity of the registered nurses 10 11 and advanced practice registered nurses to complete high-level 12 nursing tasks. Hawaii keiki program visits increased from 8,188 in school year 2019-2020 to 126,994 in school year 2022-2023, an 13 14 increase of 1,451 per cent, due to services provided by health 15 technicians. In addition, the legislature finds that student

16 and staff education encounters increased from 3,911 to 17,339, 17 an increase of three hundred forty-three per cent; keiki health 18 screenings increased from 3,962 to 11,027, an increase of one 19 hundred seventy-eight per cent; and support for individual 20 student health care plans, such as plans pursuant to section 504 21 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1993 individualized education

programs, increased from two hundred to five hundred twenty-1 2 five, an increase of one hundred sixty-three per cent. The 3 legislature notes that with regard to output of Hawaii keiki 4 services, health technicians increase productivity by up to 5 sixty per cent compared to nursing care alone. Health 6 technicians are critical team members of the Hawaii keiki 7 program and enable more students to receive the screenings, 8 care, and health plans needed to support their optimal learning 9 environments and maintain their health while at school.

10 The legislature further recognizes that the unique 11 partnership of the Hawaii keiki program between department of 12 education public schools and the university of Hawaii at Manoa 13 Nancy Atmospera-Walch school of nursing enhances support to 14 school staff and increases health services to children. 15 Notably, with the addition of health technicians, school health 16 assistants have seen visits increase from 40,941 to 279,475, an 17 increase of five hundred eighty-three per cent, and an increase 18 of school health assistant utilization of electronic records by 19 22.4 per cent.

20 The legislature envisions a future with one nurse on site21 at every school but recognizes that achieving that goal requires

1 a substantial increase in fiscal and human resources. Health technicians are an efficient and cost-effective approach to 2 3 increasing access to the available nursing services, assisting 4 the department of education to meet the goal of student and 5 school academic success by ensuring students are healthy and 6 ready to learn. The legislature finds that maintaining seventy-7 five health technician positions throughout the State will 8 maintain the optimized Hawaii keiki environment within department of education schools. Of the seventy-five health 9 10 technicians, fifty-eight are partnered with registered nurses or 11 advanced practice registered nurses to allow nurses to engage in 12 direct clinical care and maximize the team approach that creates 13 efficiency, increased visits, case management, preventative 14 services, and individual health care plans; and seventeen are 15 distributed to complex areas with challenging geographic spread 16 and high needs.

17 The legislature is committed to providing continued support 18 to children enrolled in department of education schools by 19 ensuring that they are healthy and ready to learn, and commends 20 health technicians in playing a critical function in the Hawaii 21 keiki program, including rapidly responding to high-demand

complex area needs and processing data entry for department of
 education student health records.

3 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate 4 funds to maintain seventy-five health technician positions 5 within the department of education for the Hawaii keiki program. 6 SECTION 2. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of 7 the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93, 8 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the 9 appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, 10 and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure 11 ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by 12 \$ per cent. This current declaration takes or 13 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal 14 year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act 15 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure

16 ceiling are that:

17 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to18 serve the public interest; and

19 (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
20 addressed by this Act.

1	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
3	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to
4	maintain seventy-five health technician positions within the
5	department of education for the Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready
6	to learn program.
7	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
8	education for the purposes of this Act.
9	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
