A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LOCAL AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that supporting local
- 2 agriculture and strengthening local food systems are a matter of
- 3 statewide concern that can improve the resilience of Hawaii's
- 4 economy, environment, culture, and public health. The
- 5 legislature further finds that setting clear and ambitious
- 6 target goals for the purchase of locally grown food ensures that
- 7 the State plays its role in supporting local farmers and
- 8 guarantees that revenue derived from local produce remains in
- 9 the State and feeds local people. Act 175, Session Laws of
- 10 Hawaii 2021, established a programmatic goal for the department
- 11 of education to provide a minimum of thirty per cent locally
- 12 sourced food in Hawaii public school meals by 2030. In
- 13 addition, the legislature also passed Act 176, Session Laws of
- 14 Hawaii 2021, and Act 144, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022, which
- 15 established five-year benchmarks ensuring a certain percentage
- 16 of produce that is purchased by the department of education,

- 1 department of health, department of public safety, department of
- 2 defense, and university of Hawaii system is locally grown.
- 3 The legislature also finds that the existing goals set
- 4 different standards for various state departments.
- 5 Specifically, pursuant to Act 175, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021,
- 6 the programmatic goal for the department of education is to
- 7 locally source at least thirty per cent of food served in public
- 8 schools by 2030, which is higher than other state departments.
- 9 The legislature believes that the goals to provide locally-
- 10 sourced food should increase at a consistent and predictable
- 11 pace across all pertinent state departments to avoid any
- 12 confusion between departments, however the legislature does
- 13 recognize that benchmark goals for certain departments should be
- 14 assessed on a more frequent basis than the department of
- 15 education.
- 16 The purpose of this Act is to resolve some of the
- 17 discrepancies between the locally sourced food benchmarks for
- 18 the department of education and those of other state entities.
- 19 SECTION 2. Section 27-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 20 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

18		and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or
19		food products shall constitute a minimum of eighteen
20		per cent of the total food purchased during each
21		calendar year, as measured by the per cent of total

1		food cost; provided that the department of education
2		shall be exempt from the requirements of this
3		paragraph and instead shall be subject to the
4		requirements in section 302A-405.6(a)(1);
5	(3)	By January 1, 2035, fresh local agricultural products
6		and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or
7		food products shall constitute a minimum of twenty-six
8		per cent of the total food purchased during each
9		calendar year, as measured by the per cent of total
10		food cost; provided that the department of education
11		shall be exempt from the requirements of this
12		paragraph;
13	(4)	By January 1, 2040, fresh local agricultural products
14		and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or
15		food products shall constitute a minimum of thirty-
16		four per cent of the total food purchased during each
17		calendar year, as measured by the per cent of total
18		food cost;
19	(5)	By January 1, 2045, fresh local agricultural products
20		and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or
21		food products shall constitute a minimum of forty-two

1		per cent of the total food purchased during each
2		calendar year, as measured by the per cent of total
3		food cost; and
4	(6)	By January 1, 2050, fresh local agricultural products
5		and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or
6		food products shall constitute a minimum of fifty per
7		cent of the total food purchased during each calendar
8		year, as measured by the per cent of total food cost."
9	SECT	ION 3. Section 302A-405.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended b	y amending its title and subsection (a) to read as
11	follows:	•
12	"[+]	§302A-405.6[] Farm to school meals. (a) [By 2030,
13	the depar	tment shall meet the local farm to school meal goal
14	that thir	ty per cent of food served in public schools shall
15	consist o	f locally sourced products, as measured by the

17	ensure th	at a certain percentage of the food purchased for

7		and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or
8		food products shall constitute a minimum of thirty-
9		four per cent of the total food purchased during each

12	(3)	By January 1, 2045, fresh local agricultural products
13		and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or
14		<pre>food products shall constitute a minimum of forty-two</pre>
15		per cent of the total food purchased during each
16		calendar year, as measured by the per cent of total
17		food cost; and
18	(4)	By January 1, 2050, fresh local agricultural products
19		and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or
20		food products shall constitute a minimum of fifty per

2	year, as measured by the per cent of total food cost.
3	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
4	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
5	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
