A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO POLICING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that public trust in law
- 2 enforcement is critical to ensuring justice for all under the
- 3 law. The legislature further finds that data collection is one
- 4 essential tool to allow the public, police, and policymakers to
- 5 analyze the effectiveness of existing practices, determine which
- 6 policies work and do not work, and support policy decisions with
- 7 clear and relevant data.
- 8 Numerous states and the District of Columbia have enacted
- 9 laws to standardize the collection of complete and accurate
- 10 policing stop data to increase community trust, transparency,
- 11 and internal accountability for public safety through data
- 12 analysis. Similarly, in 2020, Hawaii enacted Act 47, Session
- 13 Laws of Hawaii 2020, to standardize best practices for the use
- 14 of force between the counties.
- 15 The purpose of this Act is to enhance the public's trust in
- 16 law enforcement and continue to standardize best practices for
- 17 the data collection of police stops, arrests, and use of force

between the counties in Hawaii by requiring each county police 2 department to collect, report, and publicly publish certain data 3 regarding police stops, arrests, uses of force, and trends. 4 SECTION 2. Chapter 52D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 5 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 6 and to read as follows: 7 Police stops; arrests; uses of force; data 8 collection; report to legislature. (a) The chief of each 9 county police department shall submit to the legislature no 10 later than January 31 of each year an annual report with a 11 summary of data and visual displays, including but not limited 12 to graphs and charts, relating to police stops, arrests, uses of 13 force, and trends relating to police stops, arrests, and uses of 14 force. The reporting period of each report shall be from 15 January 1 to December 31 of the year immediately before the year 16 of the report submission. 17 (b) The report shall include data concerning: 18 (1)All police stops, including the following information: 19 The date, time, and location of the stop; (A) 20 (B) The approximate duration of the stop; 21 (C) The reason for the initial stop;

12		(E)	The limited English speaking ability or perceived
13			limited English speaking ability of the person
14			arrested;
15		<u>(F)</u>	The disability status or perceived disability
16			status of the person arrested;
17		(G)	The mental health status or perceived mental
18			health status of the person arrested;
19		<u>(H)</u>	The use or perceived use of alcohol or drugs of
20			the person arrested;

1		<u>(1)</u>	The residential zip code of the person arrested
2			or if the person is houseless;
3		(J)	The name of the arresting officer and other
4			officers involved with the arrest; and
5		(K)	The final disposition of the case; and
6	(3)	All	uses of force, including the following
7		info	rmation:
8		(A)	The total number of use of force incidents and
9			type of force used;
10		<u>(B)</u>	The total number of officers involved in each use
11			of force incident;
12		<u>(C)</u>	Clarification on whether the use of force report
13			was filed by the officer using force or another
14			officer observing the use of force;
15		<u>(D)</u>	The total number of persons involved in each use
16			of force incident;
17		<u>(E)</u>	The number of civilian complaints about use of
18			force, including the applicable department
19			policy, outcome, and any disciplinary action;
20		<u>(F)</u>	If an arrest was made, the criminal offense or
21			offenses charged;

1	<u>(G)</u>	The age, race, ethnicity, and sex or perceived
2		age, race, ethnicity, and sex of each person
3		involved in the use of force incident;
4	<u>(H)</u>	The age, race, ethnicity, and sex of each officer
5		involved in the use of force incident;
6	<u>(I)</u>	The limited English speaking ability or perceived
7		limited English speaking ability of each person
8		involved in the use of force incident;
9	<u>(J)</u>	The disability status or perceived disability
10		status of each person involved in the use of
11		<pre>force incident;</pre>
12	<u>(K)</u>	The mental health status or perceived mental
13		health status of each person involved in the use
14		of force incident; and
15	<u>(L)</u>	The use or perceived use of alcohol or drugs of
16		the person or persons involved in each use of
17		force incident.
18	(c) The	chief of each county police department shall post
19	a copy of the	report submitted to the legislature pursuant to
20	this section o	n the department's website on an annual basis.

1	(d) The chief of each county policy department shall
2	establish and maintain an online repository in a searchable
3	format for the policing data collection of aggregate and
4	disaggregate information that is accessible to the public on the
5	department's website.
6	(e) The chief of each county police department shall
7	retain the electronic and paper records relating to policing
8	stops, arrests, and uses of force in accordance with law, the
9	department's record retention policy, or at least five years
10	after the annual report is submitted, whichever period is
11	longer.
12	(f) For the purposes of this section, "stop" means a
13	temporary investigation detention of a person for the purpose of
14	determining whether probable cause exists to make an arrest. A
15	"stop" is a seizure of an individual's person and occurs
16	whenever an officer uses the officer's authority to compel a
17	person to halt or remain in a certain place."
18	SECTION 3. Section 52D-3.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19	amended by amending its title to read as follows:
20	"§52D-3.5 [Reports] Annual report to legislature[-] of
21	misconduct incidents."
