HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

RESOLVING TO END HOMELESSNESS ON MAUI

1 2 3	WHEREAS, Hawai'i has one of the most severe homelessness epidemics In the U.S.A.; and
5 4 5 6 7	WHEREAS, the 2023 point in time count determined there were 6223 homeless in the state of Hawaii and 704 on Maui before the August 8, 2023 wildfires; and
8 9 10 11	WHEREAS, per the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's 2023 Annual Homeless Assessment Report, Hawai'i had the highest percentage of people experiencing chronic homelessness; and
12 13 14 15	WHEREAS, Hawai'i also had the third highest rate of homeless youth staying in unsheltered locations; and
16 17	WHEREAS, recent Maui Fires have increased homelessness ; and
18 19 20 21 22 23 24	WHEREAS, homelessness can have many causes including family violence, limited housing opportunities, lack of adequate employment, substance addiction, mental/physical health conditions, trauma, lack of adequate employment and other factors; and
25 26	WHEREAS, Hawai'i's housing costs are extremely high and average incomes fails to meet criteria for many rentals; and
27 28 29 30	WHEREAS, the price of housing in Hawai'i is a large factor in why the homeless population is growing; and
31 32	WHEREAS, it is extremely difficult to find affordable housing in Hawai'i; and

1 WHEREAS, native Hawai'ians are particularly susceptible to 2 3 homelessness; and 4 5 WHEREAS, housing people reduces suffering; and 6 7 WHEREAS, housing people reduces medical costs; and 8 WHEREAS, living on the streets frequently leads to an early 9 death; now, therefore, 10 11 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-12 second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 13 2024, the Senate concurring, that significantly increased 14 efforts must be made to house people in Hawai'i; and 15 16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we request the Governor and his 17 Coordinator on Homelessness and Housing Solutions to secure a 18 19 viable location on Maui and build at least 450 homes for the 20 displaced victims of the Lahaina wildfires; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that request the Governor and his Coordinator on Homelessness and Housing Solutions to secure at 23 24 least two different geographic locations on Maui to build a Kauhale for any displaced Lahaina wildfire victims as well as 25 homeless prior to the August 8, 2023 wildfires and ensure 26 outreach services to provide for mental health, crisis 27 stabilization, along with any wraparound social services for all 28 29 residents of the new housing units; and 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Maui needs to house an 31 estimated 800 homeless and the State will move forward with 32 compassion and aloha to help these people by constructing new 33 housing housing units on Maui; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State and the people of 36 Hawai'i want to house the houseless, shelter those with no 37 shelter, and find homes for all of the housing insecure; and 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 40 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to The Honorable Governor 41 Joshua Green, the Honorable State Coordinator on Homelessness 42
