

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE TO ESTABLISH A TWO-YEAR AGRICULTURAL CRIME PILOT PROJECT TO EXAMINE AND ASSESS THE EFFECTIVENESS OF PROSECUTING AGRICULTURAL CRIME CASES, INCLUDING THOSE OF AGRICULTURAL THEFT AND AGRICULTURAL VANDALISM, IN THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU COUNTY OF KAUAI, AND COUNTY OF MAUI.

1 WHEREAS, agricultural crimes, which include agricultural 2 theft and vandalism, are a persistent issue affecting farmers 3 and ranchers of the State; and

5 WHEREAS, according to a recent publication by the United 6 States Department of Agriculture and Hawaii Department of 7 Agriculture, in 2019, there were nearly nineteen thousand 8 incidents of theft, vandalism, and trespassing on farms in the 9 State; and

WHEREAS, these incidents cost Hawaii farms approximately \$14,400,000, or ten percent of the estimated 2018 Hawaii net farm income, in theft and vandalism losses and security costs; and

16 WHEREAS, some individuals often trespass onto farm 17 property, often armed with weapons and accompanied by dogs, to 18 illegally hunt, which can be particularly dangerous and 19 destructive for farming operations and can result in destroyed 20 crops, lost livestock, illegal drug use, litter, and discarded 21 animal carcasses on farm property; and

23 WHEREAS, agricultural crimes, including agricultural theft 24 and vandalism, increase the costs of production and decrease the 25 chances for farming and ranching operations to succeed; and 26



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WHEREAS, despite the prevalence and cost of agricultural 2 crimes, many incidents go unreported and few result in convictions; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, of the nearly nineteen thousand incidents in 2019, only nine hundred seventy incidents were reported to law 6 7 enforcement, which resulted in seventy-nine arrests and sixtyseven convictions; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, recognizing the challenges that local farmers face regarding agricultural crimes, the Legislature passed Act 217, 11 Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, which established a two-year 12 Agricultural Theft and Vandalism Project Program to examine the 13 effectiveness of prosecuting agricultural theft and vandalism 14 cases in the counties of Hawaii and Maui, and included cases of 15 theft and vandalism that affect individuals who are not full-16 17 time farmers or ranchers; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the City and County of Honolulu suffered the highest rates of theft or vandalism of all farms in the State 20 and the County of Kauai suffered the third highest rates of 21 theft or vandalism of all farms in the State; and 22 23 WHEREAS, this body believes that it is time to replicate 24 25 the Agricultural Theft and Vandalism Pilot Project in the City 26 and County of Honolulu, County of Kauai, and County of Maui as it will provide resources to suppress incidences of agricultural 27 crimes and losses to farmers, ranchers, aquaculturists, and 28 29 floriculturists in the State; now, therefore, 30 31 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 32 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, the Senate concurring, that the Department of 33 Agriculture is urged to establish a two-year Agricultural Crime 34 35 Pilot Project to examine and assess the effectiveness of prosecuting agricultural crime cases, including those of 36 37 agricultural theft and agricultural vandalism, in the City and County of Honolulu, County of Kauai, and County of Maui; and 38 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Agriculture is also requested to examine and assess the effectiveness of 41 prosecuting agricultural crimes, including the theft of 42 agricultural products produced for personal or commercial use on 43

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1 legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 2 the Regular Session of 2025; and 3 4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Agriculture 5 is requested to submit a final report to the Legislature of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed 6 7 legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2026; and 8 9 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the 11 Board of Agriculture; Director of Law Enforcement; Prosecuting 12 13 Attorneys for the City and County of Honolulu, County of Kauai, and County of Maui; and Chiefs of Police of the Honolulu Police 14 15 Department, Kauai Police Department, and Maui Police Department. 16
