HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING STATE AND COUNTY AGENCIES RESPONSIBLE FOR REMOVING DECEASED DOGS AND CATS FROM PUBLIC ROADWAYS TO CHECK FOR, SCAN, AND RECORD THE MICROCHIP OF THE DECEASED DOG OR CAT, IF ANY, AND CERTAIN OTHER INFORMATION; AND TIMELY NOTIFY COUNTY ANIMAL SERVICES OR ANIMAL SERVICE CONTRACTORS OF THE DECEASED DOG OR CAT, INCLUDING THE RECORDED INFORMATION.

WHEREAS, pet dogs and cats are an integral part of many 1 2 people's lives and it has been reported that approximately sixty 3 percent of the State's households have at least one dog or cat; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the loss of a pet animal can be a sad experience 6 for the pet's owner and other people who cared for the pet; and 7 8 WHEREAS, not knowing how a pet died or if a lost pet is 9 still alive can be traumatic; and 10 11 WHEREAS, providing closure for pet owners and other people 12 who cared for the pet is of deep importance; and 13 14 WHEREAS, animals, including pet dogs and cats, are often 15 killed on state or county roadways and are picked up by the 16 appropriate state or county agency, such as the refuse division 17 or road maintenance, for disposal; and 18 19 WHEREAS, state and county agencies do not routinely scan 20 deceased animals for an identifying microchip or take other 21 steps to ascertain the animals' owners, such as inspecting a tag 22 worn on the animal's collar for a contact phone number or 23 24 address; and 25 WHEREAS, since January 1, 2022, dog and cat owners have 26 27 been required to have a microchip implanted in their pet dog or cat, and to register the microchip number and the owner's 28

contact information with a microchip registration company, 1 pursuant to Act 5, Session Laws of Hawaii, Special Session of 2 2021; and 3 4 WHEREAS, durable microchip scanners cost approximately \$350 5 and are readily available; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, nonprofit and volunteer agencies that support pets have microchip scanners and are familiar with the process of 9 looking up pet owners and their contact information, which is 10 one of the main ways that lost pets that have been turned into 11 pet shelters are reunited with their owners; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, there are active social media groups connecting lost pets with owners across the State; now, therefore, 15 16 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 17 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 18 Session of 2024, the Senate concurring, that state and county 19 agencies responsible for removing deceased dogs and cats from 20 public roadways are requested to check for, scan, and record the 21 microchip of the deceased dog or cat, if any, along with the 22 location found, descriptive information about the pet, and any 23 contact phone number, name, or address shown on the pet's tag or 24 25 collar; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that these state and county agencies are requested to timely notify county animal services or animal 28 service contractors of the deceased dog or cat, including the 29 microchip number, if any, location found, descriptive 30 information about the pet, and any contact phone number, name, 31 or address shown on the pet's tag or collar, and allow those 32 33 entities to use their staff or volunteers to follow up with the registered pet owners; and 34 35 36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 37 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture, Deputy Director of the Department of 38 Transportation Highways Division, mayor of each county, 39 President of the Hawaiian Humane Society, Executive Director of 40 41 the Kauai Humane Society, and Chief Executive Officer of the Maui Humane Society. 42
