HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT TO DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A U VISA CERTIFICATION POLICY.

WHEREAS, Congress enacted the Victims of Trafficking and 1 Violence Prevention Act of 2000 to encourage undocumented 2 3 immigrant victims to report crimes, contribute to investigations and prosecutions, and support law enforcement efforts to 4 investigate and prosecute crimes committed against undocumented 5 immigrant victims by creating the U visa certification policy; 6 and 7 8 WHEREAS, the United States Department of Homeland Security 9 has created the U Visa Law Enforcement Certification Resource 10 Guide to assist local government jurisdictions in creating their 11 own U visa certification document; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, in California, the Coroner Division of the Orange County Sheriff's Department has already implemented a U visa 15 certification policy; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the U visa is an immigration benefit for 18 undocumented immigrant victims of certain crimes who will 19 assist, are currently assisting, or have previously assisted law 20 enforcement in the investigation or prosecution of these types 21 22 of crimes; and 23 WHEREAS, the U visa provides eligible undocumented 24 immigrant victims with nonimmigrant status that allows them to 25 temporarily remain and work in the United States while assisting 26 law enforcement; and 27 28 WHEREAS, undocumented immigrant victims may otherwise be 29 30 reluctant to help in the investigation or prosecution of

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criminal activity for fear of removal from the United States; 1 and 2 3 WHEREAS, immigrants, especially women and children, can be 4 particularly vulnerable to crimes like human trafficking, 5 domestic violence, sexual assault, and other types of abuse; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, any eligible undocumented immigrant victim may 9 apply for a U visa, which must first be certified by a qualifying agency, such as the Department of Law Enforcement, 10 before being reviewed and acted upon by the United States 11 12 Citizenship and Immigration Services; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the certification verifies that a qualifying criminal activity occurred and that the victim was helpful or 15 will be helpful in the investigation or prosecution of the 16 17 qualifying crime; and 18 WHEREAS, the State currently does not have a U visa 19 certification policy in place; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, the State would benefit from having a U visa certification policy to ensure that victims of certain crimes 23 have a safe opportunity to report these crimes without fear of 24 deportation; now, therefore, 25 26 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 27 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 28 Session of 2024, the Senate concurring, that the Department of 29 30 Law Enforcement is urged to develop and implement a U visa certification policy; and 31 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Law Enforcement is requested to submit: 34 35 36 (1)An interim report on the development of a U visa certification policy, including any proposed 37 legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty 38 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 39 2025; and 40 41



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(2) A final report on the implementation of the U visa policy, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2026; and
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor and Director of Law Enforcement.



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
