HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE TO ESTABLISH A TWO-YEAR AGRICULTURAL CRIME PILOT PROJECT TO EXAMINE AND ASSESS THE EFFECTIVENESS OF PROSECUTING AGRICULTURAL CRIME CASES, INCLUDING THOSE OF AGRICULTURAL THEFT AND AGRICULTURAL VANDALISM, IN THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU AND COUNTY OF KAUAI.

WHEREAS, agricultural crimes, which include agricultural 1 theft and vandalism, are a persistent issue affecting farmers 2 and ranchers of the State; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, according to a recent publication by the United States Department of Agriculture and Hawaii Department of 6 7 Agriculture, in 2019, there were nearly nineteen thousand 8 incidents of theft, vandalism, and trespassing on farms in the 9 State; and 10 WHEREAS, these incidents cost Hawaii farms approximately 11 \$14,400,000, or ten percent of the estimated 2018 Hawaii net 12 farm income, in theft and vandalism losses and security costs; 13 14 and 15 WHEREAS, some individuals often trespass onto farm 16 17 property, often armed with weapons and accompanied by dogs, to illegally hunt, which can be particularly dangerous and 18 19 destructive for farming operations and can result in destroyed crops, lost livestock, illegal drug use, litter, and discarded 20 21 animal carcasses on farm property; and 22 WHEREAS, agricultural crimes, including agricultural theft 23 and vandalism, increase the costs of production and decrease the 24 chances for farming and ranching operations to succeed; and 25 26 WHEREAS, despite the prevalence and cost of agricultural 27 crimes, many incidents go unreported and few result in 28 29 convictions; and 30



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WHEREAS, of the nearly nineteen thousand incidents in 2019, 1 2 only nine hundred seventy incidents were reported to law enforcement, which resulted in seventy-nine arrests and sixty-3 seven convictions; and 4 5 WHEREAS, recognizing the challenges that local farmers face 6 regarding agricultural crimes, the Legislature passed Act 217, 7 Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, which established a two-year 8 9 Agricultural Theft and Vandalism Project Program to examine the effectiveness of prosecuting agricultural theft and vandalism 10 cases in the counties of Hawaii and Maui, and included cases of 11 12 theft and vandalism that affect individuals who are not full-13 time farmers or ranchers; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the City and County of Honolulu suffered the highest rates of theft or vandalism of all farms in the State 16 and the County of Kauai suffered the third highest rates of 17 theft or vandalism of all farms in the State; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, this body believes that it is time to replicate the Agricultural Theft and Vandalism Pilot Project in the City 21 and County of Honolulu, County of Kauai, and County of Maui as 22 23 it will provide resources to suppress incidences of agricultural crimes and losses to farmers, ranchers, aquaculturists, and 24 25 floriculturists in the State; now, therefore, 26 27 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 28 Session of 2024, that the Department of Agriculture is urged to 29 establish a two-year Agricultural Crime Pilot Project to examine 30 and assess the effectiveness of prosecuting agricultural crime 31 cases, including those of agricultural theft and agricultural 32 33 vandalism, in the City and County of Honolulu and County of Kauai; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Agriculture 36 37 is also requested to examine and assess the effectiveness of 38 prosecuting agricultural crimes, including the theft of 39 agricultural products produced for personal or commercial use on any land, regardless of land classification, and agricultural 40 vandalism; and 41 42
