## HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO CONTRACT WITH A QUALIFIED NONPROFIT ORGANIZATION TO ESTABLISH AN AQUATIC SAFETY EDUCATION PROGRAM FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL STUDENTS.

1	WHEREAS, aquatic injuries and deaths by drowning in the
2 3	State are tragic but preventable, especially among children; and
4	WHEREAS, the Department of Health has found that drowning
5	was the leading cause of injury-related mortality for Hawaii's
6	children between 2014 and 2018, accounting for more deaths of
7	children than motor vehicle and pedestrian accidents combined;
8	and
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10 11	WHEREAS, although visitors made up a slight majority of the total fatal drownings that occurred in the State between 2014
12	and 2018, an alarmingly large proportion of child drownings
13	ninety-six percentwere among resident children; and
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15	WHEREAS, during the same period, there was an annual
16	average of seventy non-fatal child drowning incidents attended
17	by emergency medical services; and
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19 20	WHEREAS, although individuals who experience non-fatal drowning incidents escape with their lives, some are left with
20 21	severe brain damage and may face long-term disabilities,
22	including memory problems, learning disabilities, or permanent
23	losses of basic functions, a disorder often referred to as a
24	persistent vegetative state; and
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26	WHEREAS, given the potential for death or severe long-term
27	injuries, the State should prioritize the prevention of fatal
28 29	and non-fatal drownings; and
29 30	WHEREAS, many drowning deaths could be prevented through
31	deliberate government action; and

WHEREAS, the International Life Saving Federation's 1 Position Statement for Swimming and Safety Education recommends 2 that everyone have access to training in water safety, personal 3 survival, and water rescue; and 4 5 WHEREAS, ideally, this training should commence at a young 6 7 age and be available regardless of ability and background; and 8 9 WHEREAS, in addition, the International Life Saving Federation recommends that knowledge and understanding of water 10 environments and their associated hazards should be taught to 11 12 everyone at the earliest possible age; and 13 WHEREAS, despite these recommendations, many of Hawaii's 14 15 youth do not have the opportunity to receive aquatic safety instruction with less than ten percent of public and public 16 charter elementary schools integrating aquatic safety education 17 into their physical education curriculums; and 18 19 WHEREAS, outside of schools, municipal aquatic safety 20 programs lack the resources to meet public demand, and obtaining 21 22 private lessons is often cost-prohibitive for many local families, leaving many children inadequately prepared for water-23 related emergencies; and 24 25 26 WHEREAS, an assessment of Hawaii students conducted by the 27 Hawaii Aquatics Academy during the 2018-2019 school year found that only thirty-one percent of participating students could 28 swim for twenty-five yards, only twelve percent could float for 29 30 thirty seconds, and only thirteen percent could tread water for sixty seconds; and 31 32 33 WHEREAS, all children should be provided equal access to 34 standards-based aquatic safety education programs, and to achieve this, aquatic safety education should be integrated into 35 36 the health and physical education curriculums of public schools; and 37 38 39 WHEREAS, providing proper training in water safety, 40 personal survival, and water rescue will help to ensure that the 41 State's youth, especially those from low- and moderate-income

1 communities, know how to avoid and recover from hazardous aquatic situations; and 2 3 WHEREAS, proper training in water safety, personal 4 survival, and water rescue would also be consistent with the 5 Department of Health's Hawaii Injury Prevention Plan 2018-2023, 6 which aims to decrease the incidence of drownings in the State; 7 8 now, therefore, 9 10 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 11 Session of 2024, that the Department of Education is urged to 12 contract with a qualified nonprofit organization to establish an 13 aquatic safety education program for elementary school students; 14 15 and 16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 17 Resolution be transmitted to the Superintendent and Chairperson 18 19 of the Board of Education. 20 21 22
