WHEREAS, GLEN MIYASATO was recently named the National
 Association of Elementary School Principals' (NAESP) 2023
 National Distinguished Principal for Hawai'i; and

5 WHEREAS, GLEN MIYASATO holds a Bachelor of Education in
6 Secondary Education and Master of Education in Educational
7 Administration from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa; and
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9 WHEREAS, with more than four decades of outstanding service 10 to the Hawai'i State Department of Education, GLEN MIYASATO has 11 led Mayor Joseph J. Fern Elementary School as its Principal 12 since 2018; he oversees a diverse student body of approximately 13 400, including half of those students with limited English 14 proficiency and 95 percent of them eligible for free or reduced-15 price meals; and

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WHEREAS, affectionately known as Po'o Kumu, GLEN MIYASATO has been pivotal in fostering a learning environment based on trust, cultural competency, and community; this approach has been crucial in addressing the unique needs and strengthening the assets of a linguistically and culturally diverse student population situated within an urban community adversely impacted by poverty; and

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WHEREAS, GLEN MIYASATO has proactively implemented renowned 1 2 social and emotional learning programs, cultivated mental health 3 partnerships, and extended his leadership beyond the school by participating in a coalition that provides access to broader 4 5 community social, health, and education resources; and 6 7 WHEREAS, with an unwavering dedication to building a safe and inclusive school environment, GLEN MIYASATO personally leads 8 the Walking School Bus program, ensuring the safe passage of 9 nearly 40 students to Mayor Joseph J. Fern Elementary School on 10 11 high-traffic streets; and 12 13 WHEREAS, SHARON BECK was recently named the National Association of Secondary School Principals' (NASSP) 2023 State 14 Principal of the Year for Hawai'i and selected as the 2023 15 Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in School Leadership awardee; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, with a career spanning over three decades, SHARON BECK's ability to inspire and improve academic outcomes has made 19 20 her a driving force in education since embarking on her teaching 21 career in 1992 at Ka'ū High and Pāhala Elementary School; and 22 23 WHEREAS, in 1999, SHARON BECK started to support schools 24 across Hawai'i Island as a District Resource Teacher; in 2003, she served as the Vice Principal at Nāʿālehu Elementary School, 25 and just three years later, she returned to Ka'ū High and Pāhala 26 Elementary School as its Principal; and 27 28 29 WHEREAS, serving the Ka'ū area, the Hawai'i State Department of Education's largest geographic district in the State, SHARON 30 BECK has built a strong educational institution in spite of many 31 32 challenges, including long commutes for students and limited access to resources and opportunities; and 33 34 WHEREAS, captivated by the spirit of Ka'ū, SHARON BECK 35 fosters a sense of unity and collaboration among students and 36 their families, faculty and staff, and the broader community; 37 38 and 39



WHEREAS, DR. BEBI DAVIS was recently named the NAESP 2023 1 National Outstanding Assistant Principal and the NASSP 2023 2 State Assistant Principal of the Year for Hawai'i; and 3 4 WHEREAS, DR. BEBI DAVIS' journey from a celebrated teacher 5 to an inspiring administrator at Prince David Kawānanakoa Middle 6 School is marked by her continuous advocacy for innovative 7 teaching and efforts in cultivating an empowering culture for 8 9 educators and students alike; and 10 WHEREAS, motivated by the belief that teachers are the soul 11 of society, DR. BEBI DAVIS received the 2005 Milken Educator 12 Award and was honored as the 2009 Hawai'i State Teacher of the 13 Year while teaching at Governor Wallace Rider Farrington High 14 School; and 15 16 WHEREAS, fostering 21st century, student centered 17 instruction, DR. BEBI DAVIS promotes the practice of integrative 18 19 teaching, which encourages problem solving, creativity, collaboration, equity, and social and emotional learning; her 20 efforts at Prince David Kawānanakoa Middle School have helped 21 22 improve academic performance and increase student engagement; 23 and 24 25 WHEREAS, GRANT TOYOOKA recently received the Hawai'i Association of School Librarians' 2023 Outstanding Library 26 27 Service Award; and 28 29 WHEREAS, GRANT TOYOOKA has showcased his versatility and talents as an educator with over two decades of service to the 30 Hawai'i State Department of Education; he demonstrates dedication 31 and passion as a district resource teacher, and during his 32 tenure at Wahiawā Elementary School, he took on various roles, 33 including temporary vice principal, math coach, curriculum 34 coordinator, A+ head coordinator, and counselor; and 35 36 WHEREAS, a forward thinker and innovator, GRANT TOYOOKA 37 plays a crucial role in workforce readiness; he developed 38 valuable partnerships with Cultivate Hawai'i, an organization 39 that focuses on workforce development in central O'ahu, and 40

1 Leilehua Alumni and Community Association, an organization that 2 serves the Leilehua-Mililani-Waialua Complex Area; and 3 WHEREAS, GRANT TOYOOKA presented to industry leaders and 4 community members on the importance of having certified 5 librarians on staff at schools; he also transformed innovative 6 ideas into practical solutions by spearheading the formation of 7 professional learning communities for librarians that enhanced 8 9 student learning and strengthened librarian positions; and 10 WHEREAS, GRANT TOYOOKA also collaborated with librarians 11 from area schools to initiate a series of workshops for parents 12 13 and students; these workshops, which focused on Sora, a digital reading app, parent-child reading practices, and digital safety, 14 15 underscore his dedication to educational excellence and library 16 service advocacy; and 17 18 WHEREAS, NICOLE GOFF recently received the Hawai'i Association of School Librarians' 2023 Golden Key Award; and 19 20 WHEREAS, NICOLE GOFF is a librarian at Mid-Pacific 21 22 Institute and the Chair of the Nēnē Award Committee, which 23 manages Hawai'i's Children's Choice Book Award; she was 24 instrumental in maintaining continuity of the Nēnē Award during 25 the challenging times of the COVID-19 pandemic; and 26 27 WHEREAS, a respected speaker and innovator, NICOLE GOFF has 28 delivered numerous presentations at state and national 29 conferences on how school librarians can effectively teach 30 students to interpret information presented on various media platforms; and 31 32 33 WHEREAS, even though Mid-Pacific Institute does not have an 34 elementary library, NICOLE GOFF has advocated for access to 35 comprehensive library services by offering classes to its 36 elementary students and helping pull books for them, 37 demonstrating her adaptability and dedication to information accessibility for students and their growth; and 38 39 40 WHEREAS, NICOLE GOFF's work is a testament to the care and aloha she feels for her students at Mid-Pacific Institute; and 41



1 2 WHEREAS, RITELA "SHEILA" SPROULE recently received the 2023 3 State of Hawai'i Teacher of Promise Award from the Milken 4 Educators of Hawai'i; and 5 WHEREAS, RITELA "SHEILA" SPROULE attended the University of 6 Panama, where she earned her diploma in education and went on to 7 obtain a certification in special education from Leeward 8 9 Community College; and 10 WHEREAS, over the course of her career at Red Hill 11 Elementary School, RITELA "SHEILA" SPROULE showcased her 12 versatility and dedication in various roles that positively 13 impacted students and staff; she served as a part-time teacher 14 15 and fulfilled duties as a substitute teacher in inclusion and fully self-contained special education classrooms; and 16 17 WHEREAS, during the COVID-19 pandemic, RITELA "SHEILA" 18 19 SPROULE went above and beyond to ensure her students would not regress; she not only took numerous professional development 20 courses to stay up-to-date with the latest technology and 21 22 distance learning trends, but also utilized that training to creatively establish bitmoji classrooms for each student to help 23 24 ease navigation into virtual learning; and 25 26 WHEREAS, devoted to the development of her students 27 personally and professionally, RITELA "SHEILA" SPROULE expresses profound gratitude to her colleagues, mentors, and family for 28 29 their unwavering support throughout her journey as an educator; with a steadfast commitment to ongoing growth and development, 30 within and beyond the classroom, she eagerly anticipates 31 32 continuing to serve her community through education; and 33 34 WHEREAS, KA'ELEPULU ELEMENTARY SCHOOL was recently recognized as a 2023 National Blue Ribbon School; and 35 36 37 WHEREAS, previously honored as a National Blue Ribbon

38 School in 2015, KA'ELEPULU ELEMENTARY SCHOOL stands out for
39 exceptional student performance that excels beyond statewide
40 averages and surpassed English language arts by 28 percentage



1 points, math by 31 percentage points, and science by an 2 impressive 42 percentage points; and 3 4 WHEREAS, as a top performing school, KA'ELEPULU ELEMENTARY 5 SCHOOL has made major strides in narrowing the achievement gap between high-needs and non-high needs students, particularly in 6 English language arts by a remarkable 19 points over the last 7 four years; and 8 9 WHEREAS, under the leadership of Principal Cherilyn Inouye, 10 KA'ELEPULU ELEMENTARY SCHOOL has flourished by supporting the 11 12 growth and success of students and fostering lifelong learners who are proactive members of society; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, the holistic approach to education that has been adopted by KA'ELEPULU ELEMENTARY SCHOOL includes social-emotional 16 learning programs, such as the "Choose Love" initiative, which 17 18 incorporates life concepts of courage, gratitude, forgiveness, and compassion into academic lessons; these programs and co-19 curricular classes, such as sewing, pickleball, running, art, 20 and nature journaling, help ensure the enrichment of students; 21 and 22 23 24 WHEREAS, KA'ELEPULU ELEMENTARY SCHOOL has established a 25 strong 'ohana with dedicated teachers, staff, and families who 26 all work together in supporting the comprehensive development of 27 students; and 28 WHEREAS, MAUNAWILI ELEMENTARY SCHOOL was recently 29 recognized as a 2023 National Blue Ribbon School; and 30 31 32 WHEREAS, MAUNAWILI ELEMENTARY SCHOOL stands out for its 33 exceptional performance, surpassing statewide averages in English language arts by 26 percentage points, math by 30 34 percentage points, and science by 31 percentage points; and 35 36 WHEREAS, as a top performing school, MAUNAWILI ELEMENTARY 37 38 SCHOOL is being honored for the second time by meeting the 39 performance award criteria for Exemplary High Performing schools

1 and ranking in the top 15 percent of Hawai'i schools in achievement; and 2 3 WHEREAS, under the leadership of Principal Kau'i Tanaka, 4 5 MAUNAWILI ELEMENTARY SCHOOL creates an engaging learning environment that emphasizes rigorous and forward-thinking 6 7 teaching methods that are relevant to all students; and 8 9 WHEREAS, MAUNAWILI ELEMENTARY SCHOOL will soon introduce Career & Technical Education pathways for grades 4-6 with 10 curriculum that will align with secondary schools and offer 11 12 early insights into potential career paths; and 13 14 WHEREAS, a holistic approach to education is encouraged by MAUNAWILI ELEMENTARY SCHOOL in the many opportunities offered to 15 students for community service and civic engagement activities, 16 such as student council, broadcasting, music, wellness, and 17 gardening; the school's dedicated staff ensure a well-rounded 18 19 education tailored to students' academic, behavioral, and 20 social-emotional strengths and needs; now, therefore, 21 22 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 23 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2024, that this body hereby congratulates GLEN 24 25 MIYASATO for being named the NAESP 2023 National Distinguished Principal for Hawai'i, SHARON BECK for being named the NASSP 2023 26 State Principal of the Year for Hawai'i and receiving the 2023 27 28 Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in School Leadership Award, DR. BEBI DAVIS for being named the NAESP 2023 National Outstanding 29 Assistant Principal and the NASSP 2023 State Assistant Principal 30 of the Year for Hawai'i, GRANT TOYOOKA for receiving the Hawai'i 31 32 Association of School Librarians' 2023 Outstanding Library 33 Service Award, NICOLE GOFF for receiving the Hawai'i Association of School Librarians' 2023 Golden Key Award, RITELA "SHEILA" 34 SPROULE for receiving the 2023 State of Hawai'i Teacher of 35 36 Promise Award from the Milken Educators of Hawai'i, and KA'ELEPULU ELEMENTARY SCHOOL and MAUNAWILI ELEMENTARY SCHOOL for 37 being recognized as 2023 National Blue Ribbon Schools, commends 38 their outstanding accomplishments and community involvement, and 39
