A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE REPEAL OF ACT 192, SESSION LAWS OF HAWAII 2007.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to repeal Act 192, 2 Session Laws of Hawaii 2007 (Act 192), which requires the
- $oldsymbol{3}$ Employees' Retirement System of the State of Hawaii, identified
- $oldsymbol{4}$ as the "public fund", to divest itself of investments in
- 5 companies that provide significant support for genocide in
- 6 Darfur, Sudan, and provide to the legislature annual publicly
- 7 available reports regarding the status of the divestment and
- 8 related duties of the public fund under Act 192.

at least twelve months:

- 9 Under section 8 of Act 192, that Act shall be repealed upon 10 the occurrence of any of the following:
- "(1) The Congress or President of the United States

 declares that the Darfur genocide has been halted for
- 14 (2) The United States revokes all sanctions imposed
 15 against the government of Sudan;
- 16 (3) The Congress or President of the United States
 17 declares that the government of Sudan has honored its

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2		and demilitarize the Janjaweed and associated
3		militias, grant free and unfettered access for
4		deliveries of humanitarian assistance, and allow for
5		the safe and voluntary return of refugees and
6		internally displaced persons; or
7	(4)	The Congress or President of the United States,
8		through legislation or executive order, declares that
9		mandatory divestment of the type provided for in this
10		chapter interferes with the conduct of United States
11		foreign policy."
12	In 2	017, the United States revoked longstanding economic
13	sanctions against Sudan. In United States Presidential	
14	Executive Order No. 13761, President Barack H. Obama noted	
15	"Sudan's positive actions over the past 6 months. These actions	
16	include a marked reduction in offensive military activity,	
17	culminating in a pledge to maintain a cessation of hostilities	
18	in conflict areas in Sudan, and steps toward the improvement of	
19	humanitarian access throughout Sudan, as well as cooperation	
20	with the United States on addressing regional conflicts and the	
21	threat of	terrorism." Executive Order No. 13761 provided for

commitments to cease attacks on civilians, demobilize

- 1 revocation of the sanctions if the United States Secretary of
- 2 State published notice in the Federal Register that Sudan had
- 3 sustained the positive actions by a certain date, which was
- 4 subsequently extended. On October 11, 2017, the Secretary of
- 5 State published such notice of sustained positive actions in the
- 6 Federal Register. As a result, U.S. persons are generally able
- 7 to trade and do business with individuals and entities in Sudan,
- 8 according to the U.S. Department of State.
- 9 In President Donald J. Trump's Memorandum of October 26,
- 10 2020, he certified pursuant to section 6(e) of the Comprehensive
- 11 Peace in Sudan Act of 2004 (Public Law 108-497, as amended by
- 12 the Darfur Peace and Accountability Act of 2006 (Public Law 109-
- 13 344) that the Government of Sudan had taken demonstrable steps
- 14 as follows to:
- "(A) [E] nsure that the armed forces of Sudan and any
- 16 associated militias are not committing atrocities or
- 17 obstructing human rights monitors or the provision of
- humanitarian assistance;
- 19 (B) [D]emobilize and disarm militias supported or created
- by the Government of Sudan;

1	(C)	[A]llow full and unfettered humanitarian assistance to
2		all regions of Sudan, including the Darfur region;
3	(D)	[A]llow an international commission of inquiry to
4		conduct an investigation of atrocities in the Darfur
5		region, in a manner consistent with United Nations
6		Security Council Resolution 1564 (September 18, 2004),
7		to investigate reports of violations of international
8		humanitarian law and human rights law in the Darfur
9		region by all parties, to determine also whether or
10		not acts of genocide have occurred and to identify the
11		perpetrators of such violations with a view to
12		ensuring that those responsible are held accountable;
13	(E)	[C]ooperate fully with the African Union, the United
14		Nations, and all other observer, monitoring, and
15		protection missions mandated to operate in Sudan;
16	(F)	[P]ermit the safe and voluntary return of displaced
17		persons and refugees to their homes and rebuild the
18		communities destroyed in the violence; and
19	(G)	[I]mplement the final agreements reached in the
20		Naivasha peace process and install a new coalition
21		government based on the Nairobi Declaration on the

- 1 Final Phase of Peace in the Sudan signed on June 5,
- 2004."
- 3 Based on the foregoing certification of President Donald Trump,
- 4 the designation of Sudan as a state sponsor of terrorism was
- 5 rescinded.
- 6 On October 26, 2020, President Trump in his Certification
- 7 of Rescission of Sudan's Designation as a State Sponsor of
- 8 Terrorism that the Government of Sudan has not provided any
- 9 support for acts of international terrorism during the preceding
- 10 6-month period, and the Government of Sudan has provided
- 11 assurances that it will not support acts of international
- 12 terrorism in the future.
- 13 Therefore, one or more of the occurrences that shall
- 14 trigger repeal of Act 192, Session Laws of Hawaii 2007, have
- 15 been satisfied.
- 16 SECTION 2. Act 192, Session Laws of Hawaii 2007, is
- 17 repealed.
- 18 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Employees' Retirement System; Repeal; Act 192, Session Laws of Hawaii 2007

Description:

Repeals Act 192, Session Laws of Hawaii 2007, which requires the employees' retirement system to divest itself of investments in companies that provide support for genocide in Darfur, Sudan, and provide annual reports to the legislature on the status of divestment. (HD1)

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
