A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HOUSING SHORTAGE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 Section 225M-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows: 3 "(b) The office of planning and sustainable development 4 shall gather, analyze, and provide information to the governor, 5 the legislature, and state and county agencies to assist in the 6 overall analysis and formulation of state policies and 7 strategies to provide central direction and cohesion in the 8 allocation of resources and effectuation of state activities and 9 programs and effectively address current or emerging issues and 10 opportunities. More specifically, the office shall engage in the following activities: 11 12 (1) State comprehensive planning and program coordination. 13 Formulating and articulating comprehensive statewide 14 goals, objectives, policies, and priorities, and 15 coordinating their implementation through the 16 statewide planning system established in part II of 17 chapter 226;

Planning, coordinating, and maintaining a (B) comprehensive, shared statewide planning and geographic information system and associated geospatial database. The office shall be the lead agency responsible for coordinating the maintenance of the [multi-agency, multiagency, statewide planning and geographic information system and coordinating, collecting, integrating, and disseminating geospatial data sets that are used to support a variety of state agency applications and other spatial data analyses to enhance decision-making. The office shall promote and encourage free and open data sharing among and between all government agencies. To ensure the maintenance of a comprehensive, accurate, up-to-date geospatial data resource that can be drawn upon for decision-making

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1		related to essential public policy issues such as
2		land use planning, resource management, homeland
3		security, and the overall health, safety, and
4		well-being of Hawaii's citizens, and to avoid
5		redundant data development efforts, state
6		agencies shall provide to the shared system
7		either their respective geospatial databases or,
8		at a minimum, especially in cases of secure or
9		confidential data sets that cannot be shared or
10		must be restricted, metadata describing existing
11		geospatial data. In cases where agencies provide
12		restricted data, the office of planning and
13		sustainable development shall ensure the security
14		of that data; and
15		(C) Maintaining a centralized depository of state and
16		national planning references;

2		the department of health's healthy Hawaii
3		initiative and the Hawaii clean energy

7		recognizing the potential for smart growth

9	(C)	Clarify state goals for transit-oriented
10		development and smart growth that support the
11		principles of the Hawaii State Planning Act by
12		preserving non-urbanized land, improving worker
13		access to jobs, and reducing fuel consumption;
14	(D)	Target transit-oriented development areas for
15		significant increase in affordable housing and
16		rental units;
17	(E)	Conduct outreach to state agencies to help
18		educate state employees about the ways they can
19		support and benefit from transit-oriented
20		development and the State's smart growth goals;

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1		(F)	Publicize coordinated state efforts that support
2			smart growth, walkable neighborhoods, and
3			transit-oriented development;
4		(G)	Review state land use decision-making processes
5			to identify ways to make transit-oriented
6			development a higher priority and facilitate
7			better and more proactive leadership in creating
8			walkable communities and employment districts,
9			even if transit will only be provided at a later
10			date; and
11		(H)	Approve all state agencies' development plans for
12			parcels along the rail transit corridor. For the
13			purposes of this subparagraph, "development
14			plans" means conceptual land use plans that
15			identify the location and planned uses within a
16			defined area; [and]
17	(11)	Envi	ronmental review. Performing duties set forth
18		unde	r chapter 343, serving the governor in an advisory
19		capa	city on all matters relating to environmental
20		revi	ew, and having [such] powers delegated by the
21		gove	rnor as are necessary to coordinate and, when

1		reque	ested by the governor, direct all state	
2		governmental agencies in matters concerning		
3		envi	ronmental quality control, including:	
4		(A)	Advising and assisting private industries,	
5			government [department] departments and agencies,

15		sites	s for housing, including rental housing, factory-	
16		built	housing, and emergency shelters, sufficient to

- 8 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Requires the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development to identify and analyze existing and projected housing needs and identify adequate sites for housing sufficient to meet housing demands for all income levels each year. Appropriates funds for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position within the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD1)

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
