A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO GIFTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that from time to time, 2 legislators accept protocol gifts on behalf of the State or 3 either house of the legislature from foreign officials, federal 4 officers, or state officials from other states. These gifts may 5 symbolize goodwill or strengthen international or national 6 friendships. Failure to accept such a gift may cause 7 embarrassment to the donor and the recipient. These gifts may be small tokens, such as a fountain pen or a gift that a state 8 9 is famous for, or may be larger gifts, such as a painting, musical instrument, or commemorative plate. 10

11 The legislature further finds that unlike the federal 12 government, where several federal offices and agencies abide by 13 a system for the receipt, valuation, and disposition of gifts to 14 the President of the United States, the treatment of protocol 15 gifts accepted by legislators on behalf of the State or either 16 house of the legislature from government officials is not 17 established under state law. Furthermore, since these gifts



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1 were not accepted on the legislator's own behalf, these gifts 2 are not required to be reported in the legislator's gifts 3 disclosure statement. Many legislators keep an inventory of 4 these types of protocol gifts they receive in accordance with 5 rules adopted by the state senate or state house of 6 representatives. However, without a uniform set of procedures 7 regarding the custody, inventory, and maintenance of these 8 protocol gifts, gifts may be inadvertently lost, misplaced, or 9 not reasonably maintained.

10 Furthermore, because these gifts are not accepted on the 11 elected official's or state employee's own behalf, these gifts 12 may not be required to be reported under the gifts disclosure 13 law of the state ethics code. Many elected officials and state 14 employees keep an inventory of protocol gifts they receive in 15 accordance with rules adopted by their respective agencies. 16 However, without a uniform set of procedures regarding the 17 custody, inventory, and maintenance of these protocol gifts, 18 gifts may be inadvertently lost, misplaced, or not reasonably maintained. It is in the best interest of the State and its 19 20 people that these protocol gifts be cataloged and organized in 21 order to preserve the symbolic relationships behind the gifting,

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1 along with the legacy of the state employees or legislators that 2 forged those bonds of friendship. When doing so, these protocol 3 gifts may be occasionally displayed and enjoyed by future 4 delegations, state employees, legislators, and the people of 5 Hawaii as a way of honoring and remembering those who initially 6 participated in the gift exchange.

7 The purpose of this Act is to establish procedures for the
8 custody, inventory, and care of protocol gifts received by
9 legislators on behalf of the State or either house of the
10 legislature.

SECTION 2. Chapter 84, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

14 "<u>\$84-</u> Protocol gifts; written record; legislators. (a)
15 A legislator or employee shall report to the state archives any
16 protocol gift received by the legislator or employee within
17 thirty days of receipt. The report shall be in the form
18 provided by the state archives, which shall include the
19 following:

20 (1) A description of the protocol gift;

21 (2) The date on which the protocol gift was received;

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1	(3)	The identity of the individual donor, government
2		agency, entity, or organization that gave the gift or
3		on whose behalf the protocol gift was given; and
4	(4)	The location of the protocol gift, or if the gift was
5		transferred to the state archives, the date of the
6	• •	transfer.
7	(b)	Each recipient of a protocol gift shall be responsible
8	for maint	aining a written record for any protocol gift received.
9	The writt	en record shall be readily available for public
10	inspectio	n upon request.
11	(c)	Each recipient of a protocol gift shall exercise
12	reasonabl	e care in the maintenance of any protocol gift while in
13	the recip	ient's possession. All protocol gifts listed on the
14	written r	ecord shall be the property of the State regardless of
15	whether t	he recipient who received the protocol gift is
16	currently	in office or employed by the State.
17	(d)	The recipient of the protocol gift is encouraged to
18	display t	he protocol gift in their office but may transfer the
19	gift to t	he state archives at any time. Upon leaving the
20	position	held when the protocol gift was received, the recipient
21	may:	



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1	(1)	Update the registered location of the gift on the		
2		protocol gift form if moving to a new position within		
3		the State and submit the update to the archives within		
4		thirty days of the move;		
5	(2)	Transfer the protocol gift to their position's		
6		successor by updating the protocol gift form		
7		indicating the new custodian within thirty days of the		
8		transfer; or		
9	(3)	Transfer the protocol gift to the state archives prior		
10		to leaving the position."		
11	SECT	ION 3. Section 84-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
12	amended by adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted			
13	and to read as follows:			
14	" <u>"</u> Pr	""Protocol gift" means a tangible and nonperishable present		
15	tendered to or received by a legislator or employee on behalf of			
16	the State	the State or either house of the legislature from an individual		
17	donor, a	government agency, an entity, or an organization,		
18	including a foreign official, federal officer, state official			
19	from another state, or other representative of a government			
20	agency, a	n entity, or an organization, as a gesture of goodwill		

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1	and frien	dship between the institution of the gifter and the
2	State or	a house of the legislature."
3	SECT	ION 4. Section 84-11.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended b	y amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
5	"(d)	[Excluded] The following are excluded from the
6	reporting	requirements of this section [are the following]:
7	(1)	Gifts received by will or intestate succession;
8	(2)	Gifts received by way of distribution of any inter
9		vivos or testamentary trust established by a spouse or
10		ancestor;
11	(3)	Gifts from a spouse, fiance, fiancee, any relative
12		within four degrees of consanguinity or the spouse,
13		fiance, or fiancee of such a relative. A gift from
14		any such person is a reportable gift if the person is
15		acting as an agent or intermediary for any person not
16		covered by this paragraph;
17	(4)	Political campaign contributions that comply with
18		state law;
19	(5)	Anything available to or distributed to the public
20		generally without regard to the official status of the
21	· .	recipient;

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1	(6)	[Gifts] <u>Non-protocol gifts</u> that, within thirty days
2		after receipt, are returned to the giver or delivered
3		to a public body or to a bona fide educational or
4		charitable organization without the donation being
5		claimed as a charitable contribution for tax purposes;
6		[and]
7	(7)	Protocol gifts; and
8	[(7)]	(8) Exchanges of approximately equal value on
9		holidays, [birthday,] <u>birthdays,</u> or special
10		occasions."
