A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that low teacher pay 2 adversely impacts the State's ability to recruit and retain 3 quality classroom leaders. A 2020 study conducted by Augenblick, Palaich, and Associates Consulting on behalf of the 4 5 department of education found that, when compared with other high cost of living geographic locations, Hawaii teachers are 6 7 paid \$7,700 to \$26,000 less than their peers, depending on 8 length of service.

9 The legislature further finds that there is an increasing 10 demand for capable and qualified employees in Hawaii's business 11 and industry sectors to serve as teachers. Career and technical 12 education teachers with professional industry knowledge and 13 experience provide authentic educational opportunities that enable students to obtain industry-specific skills that position 14 15 them as employable, attractive candidates for high-skill, 16 high-wage careers in Hawaii. However, low teacher pay 17 discourages individuals from the business and industry sectors



1	from becoming teachers. The inability of the department of		
2	education to recruit and retain teachers with professional		
3	industry knowledge and experience limits schools' ability to		
4	provide career and technical education courses.		
5	The legislature further finds that instituting differential		
6	pay increases led to significant progress in reducing		
7	longstanding teacher shortages in other high-demand areas.		
8	Providing shortage differential pay increases is critical to		
9	strengthening the State's efforts to recruit and retain		
10	high-quality career and technical education teachers and sustain		
11	a strong workforce pipeline in Hawaii.		
12	The purpose of this Act is to:		
13	(1) Facilitate statewide and regional economic		
14	development;		
15	(2) Promote career and technical education;		
16	(3) Address the State's career and technical education		
17	teacher workforce shortage; and		
18	(4) Appropriate funds to support career and technical		
19	education.

Section 304A-302, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 6 amended to read as follows: 7 "[+]§304A-302[+] Board's power and [authority.] authority; 8 federal funds. The board may cooperate with the United States 9 Department of Education in the administration of the provisions 10 of the Acts of Congress mentioned in section [+]304A-2403[+], 11 and may do all things necessary to entitle the State to receive 12 the benefits of each of the respective funds appropriated by the 13 Acts including: 14 Represent the State in any and all matters arising out (1) 15 of or connected with the administration of the Acts of Congress insofar as the same shall apply to the State; 16 17 Represent the State in any or all matters in reference (2) to the expenditure, distribution, and disbursements of 18 moneys received from the Acts of Congress; 19 20 (3) Designate [such] colleges, schools, departments, or 21 classes as may be entitled to participate in the

5 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University6 of Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.

7 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general 8 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 9 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and 10 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 11 year 2024-2025 for differential pay increases for career and 12 technical education teachers; provided that the teachers meet 13 the requirements for a standard limited license in career and 14 technical education issued by the Hawaii teacher standards 15 board, as negotiated between the employer and the exclusive 16 representative of collective bargaining unit (5) in a memorandum 17 of understanding; provided further that no funds shall be 18 released until the memorandum of understanding between the 19 superintendent of education and the exclusive representative of 20 collective bargaining unit (5) is executed.



The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
 of education for the purposes of this Act.

3 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 4 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and 5 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 6 7 year 2024-2025 for differential pay increases for career and 8 technical education teachers; provided that the teachers meet 9 the requirements for a standard limited license in career and 10 technical education issued by the Hawaii teacher standards board, as negotiated between the employer and the exclusive 11 12 representative of collective bargaining unit (5) in a memorandum of understanding; provided further that no funds shall be 13 14 released until the memorandum of understanding between the 15 superintendent of education and the exclusive representative of collective bargaining unit (5) is executed. 16

17 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 18 of education to the state public charter school commission for 19 the purposes of this Act.

20 SECTION 9. In codifying the new sections added by section
21 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute



1 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating

2 the new sections in this Act.

3 SECTION 10. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed4 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

5 SECTION 11. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2050.

Description:

Authorizes the State Board for Career and Technical Education to cooperate with the Legislature to advise on provisions of all nonfederal funds received that are earmarked for career and technical education. Requires the State Board for Career and Technical Education, in collaboration with the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism and Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, to develop and implement workforce development pathways. Amends the membership composition of the Career and Technical Education Coordinating Advisory Council. Requires annual reports to the Legislature. Appropriates funds for the development and implementation of workforce development pathways and differential pay increases for career and technical education teachers. Effective 1/1/2050. (SD2)
