#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

SECTION 1. The legislature recognizes that pursuant to

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

2 current emergency management law in chapter 127A, Hawaii Revised 3 Statutes, when the governor or a mayor declares a state of 4 emergency, all commodities prices are frozen across the State or 5 the respective county for the duration of the emergency period. 6 The legislature finds that the broad scope of price "freezing" 7 has unintended consequences, as it effects businesses that are 8 not in the area where the emergency is occurring, and affects 9 prices of commodities that are not necessarily implicated by the emergency. The legislature notes, for example, that during the 10 11 emergency period declared several years ago for lava inundation 12 on Hawaii island, businesses on other islands were unable to 13 raise their prices to adjust to rising costs, even though those 14 products were not affected by the emergency situation. 15 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to amend

section 127A-30, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to provide that any

prohibition on the increase of prices of essential commodities

1 during a state of emergency shall apply only to those 2 commodities specifically listed for price protection within the 3 geographic area specified for that price protection by the 4 governor's or mayor's proclamation. 5 SECTION 2. Section 127A-30, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 6 amended as follows: 7 1. By amending subsections (a) to (c) to read: 8 "(a) Whenever the governor declares a state of emergency 9 for the entire State or any portion thereof, or a mayor declares 10 a local state of emergency for the county or any portion 11 thereof, or when the State, or any portion thereof, is the 12 subject of a severe [weather] warning: 13 (1)There shall be prohibited any increase in the selling 14 price of any commodity[-] specifically listed for 15 price protection in the governor's or mayor's 16 proclamation, or any supplementary proclamation, 17 whether at the retail or wholesale level, in the 18 geographic area that is [the subject of] specified for 19 price protection by the proclamation, or [the severe 20 weather warning; any supplementary proclamation; and

1	(2)	No landiold shall terminate any tenancy for a	
2		residential dwelling unit in the area that is the	
3		subject of the proclamation or [the] severe [weather]	
4		warning, except for a breach of a material term of a	
5		rental agreement or lease, or if the unit is unfit for	
6		occupancy as defined in this chapter; provided that:	
7		(A) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to	
8		extend a fixed-term lease beyond its termination	
9		date, except that a periodic tenancy for a	
10		residential dwelling unit may be terminated by	
11		the landlord upon forty-five days' written	
12		notice:	
13		(i) When the residential dwelling unit is sold	
14		to a bona fide purchaser for value; or	
15		(ii) When the landlord or an immediate family	
16		member of the landlord will occupy the	
17		residential dwelling unit; or	
18		(B) Under a fixed-term lease or a periodic tenancy,	
19		upon forty-five days' written notice, a landlord	
20		may require a tenant or tenants to relocate	
21		during the actual and continuous period of any	

1	repa	ir to render a residential dwelling unit fit
2	for	occupancy; provided that:
3	(i)	Reoccupancy shall first be offered to the
4		same tenant or tenants upon completion of
5		the repair;
6	(ii)	The term of the fixed-term lease or periodic
7		tenancy shall be extended by a period of
8		time equal to the duration of the repair;
9		and
10	(iii)	It shall be the responsibility of the tenant
11		or tenants to find other accommodations
12		during the period of repair.
13	(b) Notwithst	anding this section, any additional operating
14	expenses incurred b	y the seller or landlord because of the
15	emergency [ <del>or</del> ], dis	aster or [ <del>the</del> ] severe [ <del>weather, and which</del> ]
16	warning that can be	documented[-] may be passed on to the
17	consumer. In the c	ase of a residential dwelling unit, if rent
18	increases are conta	ined in a written instrument that was signed
19	by the tenant [prio	<del>r to</del> ] <u>before</u> the declaration or severe
20	[weather] warning,	the increases may take place pursuant to the
21	written instrument.	

- 1 (c) The prohibitions under subsection (a) shall remain in
- 2 effect until twenty-four hours after the severe [weather]
- 3 warning is canceled by the National Weather Service[+], Pacific
- 4 Tsunami Warning Center, United States Geological Survey, or
- 5 other public authority, as applicable; or in the event of a
- 6 declaration, the later of a date specified by the governor or
- 7 mayor in the declaration or ninety-six hours after the effective
- 8 date and time of the declaration, unless such prohibition is
- 9 continued by a supplementary declaration issued by the governor
- 10 or mayor. Any proclamation issued under this chapter that fails
- 11 to state the time at which it will take effect, shall take
- 12 effect at [twelve] noon of the day on which it takes effect."
- 13 2. By amending subsection (f) to read:
- "(f) As used in this section:
- "Breach of a material term" means the failure of a party to
- 16 perform an obligation under the rental agreement or lease, which
- 17 constitutes the consideration for entering into the contract and
- 18 includes the failure to make a timely payment of rent.
- 19 "Commodity" means any good or service necessary for the
- 20 health, safety, and welfare of the people of Hawaii; provided
- 21 that this term shall include[-] but not be limited to:

- 1 materials; merchandise; supplies; equipment; resources; and
- 2 other articles of commerce that shall include food; water; ice;
- 3 chemicals; petroleum products; construction materials; or
- 4 residential dwellings.
- 5 "Fixed-term lease" means a lease for real property that
- 6 specifies its beginning date and its termination date as
- 7 calendar dates, or contains a formula for determining the
- 8 beginning and termination dates; and the application of the
- 9 formula as of the date of the agreement will produce a calendar
- 10 date for the beginning and termination of the lease.
- 11 "Periodic tenancy" means a tenancy wherein real property is
- 12 leased for an indefinite time with monthly or other periodic
- 13 rent reserved. A periodic tenancy may be created by express
- 14 agreement of the parties, or by implication upon the expiration
- 15 of a fixed-term lease when neither landlord nor tenant provides
- 16 the other with written notice of termination and the tenant
- 17 retains possession of the premises for any period of time after
- 18 the expiration of the original term.
- 19 "Severe warning" means the issuance, by the National
- 20 Weather Service, Pacific Tsunami Warning Center, United States
- 21 Geological Survey, or other public authority, of a public



- notification that a dangerous condition exists that could impact 1
- 2 the State, or any portion of it, within a specified period of
- 3 time. "Severe warning" includes warnings of coastal inundation,
- 4 high surf, flash flooding, volcano, tsunami, or hurricane.
- "Unfit for occupancy" means that a residential dwelling 5
- 6 unit has been damaged to the extent that the appropriate county
- 7 agency determines that the unit creates a dangerous or
- 8 unsanitary situation and is dangerous to the occupants or [to
- 9 the] neighborhood."
- 10 SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 11 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- begun before its effective date. 12
- 13 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval. 15
