A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State's public
schools have been facing a severe teacher shortage for years
with little support to address this issue. The teaching
workforce in Hawaii is now increasingly made up of out-of-state
teachers, creating a classroom environment where teaching
faculty do not adequately reflect the socioeconomic, racial,
ethnic, and cultural diversity of Hawaii's students.

8 The legislature further finds that the lack of 9 apprenticeship programs to assist teachers in obtaining the 10 necessary licenses and gaining workforce experience contributes 11 to poor teacher retention, lack of diversity, and lack of 12 recruitment of local teachers in public schools. Hawaii needs a 13 structured teacher apprenticeship program to boost retention, 14 diversity, and recruitment among the State's public school 15 teachers.

4	SECI	TION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
. 5	amended b	by adding a new section to part III, subpart D, to be
6	appropria	tely designated and to read as follows:
7	" <u>§30</u>	2A- Hawaii teacher apprenticeship program. (a)
8	There is	established the Hawaii teacher apprenticeship program
9	to be adm	inistered by the Hawaii teacher standards board to
10	<u>create pa</u>	thways for individuals to enter the teaching profession
11	in the St	ate.
12	(b)	To participate in the Hawaii teacher apprenticeship
13	program,	an individual shall meet the following minimum
14	eligibili	ty requirements to become an apprentice teacher, the
15	individua	l shall have:
16	(1)	Received an associate degree from an accredited
17		postsecondary institution in the State;
18	(2)	Earned a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 in the
19		degree program for the degree received in accordance
20		with paragraph (1);



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1	(3)	Successfully passed a background screening by the
2		department; and
3	(4)	Been accepted into program by the Hawaii teacher
4		standards board.
5	(c)	As a condition of participating in the Hawaii teacher
6	apprentic	eship program, an apprentice teacher shall:
7	(1)	Commit to spending the first two years of the program
8		in the classroom of a mentor teacher using team
9		teaching strategies as identified by the Hawaii
10		teacher standards board;
11	(2)	Fulfill the on-the-job training component and any
12		additional requirements and standards;
13	(3)	Obtain a teacher's license pursuant to section
14		<u>302A-805; and</u>
15	(4)	Be hired by the department as an education
16		paraprofessional; provided that the compensation for
17		the apprentice teacher shall be in accordance with the
18		current salary schedule negotiated for bargaining unit
19		(6).
20	(d)	An apprentice teacher may change schools after the
21	first yea	r of apprenticeship if the current school the



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1	apprentice teacher is employed at has agreed to fund the
2	remaining year of the apprenticeship.
3	(e) A teacher serving as mentor in the Hawaii teacher
4	apprenticeship program shall mentor an apprentice teacher using
5	team teaching strategies and shall, at a minimum, meet the
6	following requirements:
7	(1) Have at least seven years of teaching experience in
8	the State; and
9	(2) Satisfy any other requirements as established by the
10	department and Hawaii teacher standards board.
11	(f) Subject to legislative appropriation, a mentor teacher
12	may receive a bonus; provided that fifty per cent of the bonus
13	shall be paid to the mentor teacher after:
14	(1) The first year of mentoring an apprentice teacher; and
15	(2) Completion of the Hawaii teacher apprentice program
16	with the same apprentice teacher.
17	(g) Upon completion of the Hawaii teacher apprenticeship
18	program, the apprentice teacher shall be eligible for hire as a
19	teacher by a department school or public charter school in the
20	State.

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1	(h) The Hawaii teacher standards board may impose		
2	additional requirements for completion of the Hawaii teacher		
3	apprenticeship program."		
4	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general		
5	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so		
6	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to		
7	establish the Hawaii teacher apprenticeship program pursuant to		
8	section 302A- , Hawaii Revised Statutes.		
9	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of		
10	education for the purposes of this Act.		
11	SECTION 4. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of		
12	the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,		
13	Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the		
14	appropriations contained in H.B. No. , will cause the state		
15	general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be		
16	exceeded by \$ or per cent. In addition, the		
17	appropriation contained in this Act will cause the general fund		
18	expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be further		
19	exceeded by \$ or per cent. The combined total		
20	amount of general fund appropriations contained in only these		
21	two Acts will cause the state general fund expenditure ceiling		

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1	for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by
2	\$ or per cent. The reasons for exceeding the
3	general fund expenditure ceiling are that:
4	(1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
5	serve the public interest; and
6	(2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
7	addressed by this Act.
8	SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
9	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
10	provided that section 3 shall take effect on July 1, 2024.
