A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MENTAL HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

PART I

2 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State has 3 repeatedly and consistently been recognized by the federal 4 government as a health professional shortage area, meaning the 5 State sorely lacks a sufficient number of mental health 6 professionals, including psychiatrists, psychologists, social 7 workers, marriage and family therapists, and mental health 8 counselors having a focus on marriage and family life, to meet 9 the overwhelming demand for these services in the State. These 10 barriers to access create unnecessarily long wait times for appointments, causing many individuals, especially those 11 12 individuals living in rural areas, to experience prolonged 13 suffering or to choose not to seek any help at all. The result 14 is a domino effect of mass losses in workforce development, 15 increased instances of abuse within families, statistically higher rates of substance abuse, and high debt loads. 16

1 Currently, associate-level practitioners who have completed 2 rigorous educational and other professional development requirements must render professional mental health treatment to 3 4 clients to fulfill the post-degree, pre-license hours required for full licensure. However, unlike many other professions and 5 6 trades that have similar requirements, almost all of these mental health professionals go unpaid for the life-changing 7 services because no laws exist to allow for health insurance 8 reimbursements of their services. 9

10 This regulatory oversight causes undue hardships on these 11 professionals and their families as they are essentially forced 12 to work one very difficult and taxing job for free and a second 13 job to meet personal needs. Unfortunately, this model of living 14 is unsustainable and causes too much homegrown talent to 15 permanently move to one of the many other states in which 16 insurance reimbursements are allowed.

17 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to expand access to18 high-quality mental health services by:

19 (1) Establishing provisional, associate-level licensure
 20 requirements and reimbursement allowances for certain
 21 mental health practitioners in training; and
