

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STATE HEALTH PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT AGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. Section 323D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
3	amended by adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
4	and to read as follows:
5	""Health care" means the improvement of a person's health
6	through the prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and amelioration
7	or cure of disease, illness, injury, or other physical and
8	mental impairment, regardless of the setting in which those
9	services are delivered. "Health care" includes oral health,
10	behavioral health, and long-term care."
11	SECTION 2. Section 323D-12, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended to read as follows:
13	"§323D-12 Health planning and development functions; state
14	agency. (a) The state agency shall:
15	(1) Have as a principal function the responsibility for
16	promoting [accessibility for all the people of the
17	State to quality health care services at reasonable



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1		cost. The state agency shall conduct such studies and
2		investigations as may be necessary as to the causes of
3		health-care costs including inflation. The state
4		agency may contract for services to implement this
5		paragraph. The certificate of need program mandated
6		under-part V shall-serve this function. The state
7		agency shall promote the sharing of facilities or
8		services by health care providers whenever possible to
9		achieve economies and shall restrict unusual or
10		unusually costly services to individual facilities or
11		<pre>providers where appropriate;] universal access to</pre>
12		high-quality, equitable, and affordable health care
13		for all the people of the State;
14	(2)	[Serve as staff to and provide technical assistance
15		and advice to the statewide council and the subarea
16		councils in the preparation, review, and revision of
17		the state-health-services and facilities plan;]
18		Provide, throughout state government, coordination of
19		activities and resources that affect health care
20		access, costs, and quality, including health insurance
21		coverage rates, health insurance benefits,

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1		affordability, workforce health, reimbursements,
2		quality, administrative simplification, workforce
3		development, and health information technology;
4	(3)	[Conduct the health planning activities of the State
5		in coordination with the subarea councils, implement
6		the state health services and facilities plan, and
7		determine the statewide health needs of the State
8		after consulting with the statewide council; and]
9		Establish a state health services, workforce, and
10		facilities plan and update that plan every four years
11		following consultation with the statewide council;
12	(4)	Administer the state certificate of need program
13		pursuant to part V[$ au$], and serve as staff to and
14		provide technical assistance and advice for the
15		statewide council and subarea councils; and
16	(5)	The state agency shall submit the first state health
17		services, workforce, and facilities plan developed
18		pursuant to paragraph (3) to the legislature no later
19		than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular
20		session of 2026 and the updated plan no later than

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1	twenty days prior to the convening of every fourth
2	regular session of the legislature thereafter.
3	(b) The state agency may:
4	(1) Prepare [such] reports and recommendations on Hawaii's
5	health care costs and public or private efforts to reduce or
6	control costs and <u>improve</u> health care quality as [it] <u>the state</u>
7	agency deems necessary. [The] <u>A</u> report may include [, but not be
8	limited to,] a review of health insurance plans $[\tau]_{\dot{f}}$ the
9	availability of various kinds of health insurance and
10	malpractice insurance to consumers[$ au$]; related health statistics
11	as necessary to monitor and improve health care access,
12	outcomes, equity, quality, costs, and cost-effectiveness; and

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1 [(5)] (3) Determine the need for new health services 2 proposed to be offered within the State [-]; 3 [-(6)] (4) Assess existing health care services and 4 facilities to determine whether there are redundant, 5 excessive, or inappropriate services or facilities and 6 make public findings of any that are found to be so. 7 The state agency shall weigh the costs of the health 8 care services or facilities against the benefits the 9 services or facilities provide and there shall be a 10 negative presumption against marginal services[-]; 11 $\left[\frac{1}{7}\right]$ (5) Provide technical assistance to persons, public 12 or private, in obtaining and filling out the necessary 13 forms for the development of projects and programs [-]; 14 [(8)] (6) Prepare reports, studies, and recommendations on 15 emerging health issues, such as medical ethics, health care rationing, involuntary care, care for the 16 17 indigent, and standards for research and development 18 of biotechnology [and], genetic engineering[-], remote 19 monitoring, artificial intelligence, and workforce 20 development; and



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1	[(9)]	(7) Conduct [such] other activities as are necessary
2		to meet the purposes of this chapter."
3		PART II
4	SECT	YION 3. (a) There is established the hui hoʻomana
5	within th	e state health planning and development agency for
6	administr	ative purposes only, to make recommendations to achieve
7	universal	access and equity to quality health care at an
8	affordabl	e cost for state residents.
9	(b)	The hui hoʻomana shall consist of the following
10	members:	
11	(1)	The administrator of the state health planning and
12		development agency, or the administrator's designee;
13	(2)	The chief of staff from the office of the governor, or
14		the chief of staff's designee;
15	(3)	The director of health, or the director's designee;
16	(4)	The director of human services, or the director's
17		designee;
18	(5)	The director of commerce and consumer affairs, or the
19		director's designee;
20	(6)	The director of corrections and rehabilitation, or the
21		director's designee;

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1	(7)	The director of the executive office on aging, or the
2		director's designee;
3	(8)	The insurance commissioner, or the commissioner's
4		designee;
5	(9)	The chief executive officer of the Hawaii health
6		systems corporation, or the chief executive officer's
7		designee;
8	(10)	The administrator of the Hawaii employer-union health
9		benefits trust fund, or the administrator's designee;
10	(11)	The dean of the university of Hawaii John A. Burns
11		school of medicine, or the dean's designee;
12	(12)	The dean of the university of Hawaii Nancy Atmospera-
13		Walch school of nursing, or the dean's designee;
14	(13)	The dean of the university of Hawaii Daniel K. Inouye
15		college of pharmacy, or the dean's designee; and
16	(14)	Two members selected and invited by the administrator
17		of the state health planning and development agency
18		from the statewide health coordinating council, who
19		shall be confirmed by the senate.

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1	(C)	The administrator of the state health planning and
2	developme	nt agency shall invite the following individuals or
3	their des	ignees to participate on the hui ho'omana:
4	(1)	The president and chief executive officer of the
5		Healthcare Association of Hawaii;
6	(2)	The president of the Hawaii Association of Health
7		Plans; and
8	(3)	Any additional members deemed necessary by the
9		administrator of the state health planning and
10		development agency.
11	(d)	The first meeting of the hui ho'omana shall be held no
12	later tha	n thirty days after the effective date of this Act, at
13	which time	e the members shall elect a chair, vice chair, and any
14	other nec	essary officers from among its members.
15	(e)	A majority of the hui hoʻomana members present at any
16	given mee	ting shall constitute a quorum to conduct business.
17	(f)	The hui hoʻomana shall meet no less than quarterly and
18	may meet n	more often than quarterly. The state health planning
19	and develo	opment agency shall provide administrative and clerical
20	support re	equired by the hui hoʻomana.
21	(g)	The hui hoʻomana shall:



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1 (1)Assist the state health planning and development agency in the development of a state health services, 2 3 workforce, and facilities plan; 4 (2) Identify and prioritize necessary actions for a 5 comprehensive plan to provide universal access to 6 equitable and affordable high-quality health care for 7 state residents; 8 (3) Determine a responsible party, timelines, and deadline 9 for each necessary action identified in the state health services, workforce, and facilities plan; and 10 11 Identify resources required and funding options, which (4) 12 may include financing from private, federal, and state 13 entities. 14 Members of the hui ho'omana shall serve without (h) 15 compensation but may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses

16 necessary for the performance of their duties, including travel 17 expenses.

(i) The hui ho'omana shall submit a preliminary report of
its progress to the legislature no later than twenty days prior
to the convening of the regular session of 2025, and a final
report of the state health services, workforce, and facilities



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1 plan, including its findings, recommendations, and any proposed 2 legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior 3 to the convening of the regular session of 2026. 4 (j) The hui ho'omana shall be dissolved on July 1, 2026. 5 PART III 6 SECTION 4. In accordance with section 9 of article VII, of 7 the Constitution of the State of Hawaii and sections 37-91 and 8 37-93, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined 9 that the appropriation contained in this Act will cause the 10 state general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 , or 11 to be exceeded by \$ per cent. The reasons 12 for exceeding the general fund expenditure ceiling are that the 13 appropriation made in this Act is necessary to serve the public 14 interest and to meet the needs provided for by this Act. 15 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 16 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 17 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for 18 administrative costs and to establish the following positions 19 within the state health planning and development agency: 20 (1) One full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) administrative 21 specialist IV position;

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1	(2)	One full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) research
2		statistician VI position, who shall serve as a state
3		health care informatician;
4	(3)	One full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) research
5		statistician V position, who shall serve as an
6		administrative data specialist;
7	(4)	One full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) program specialist
8		VI position, who shall serve as a state health
9		planner;
10	(5)	One full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) program specialist
11		IV position, who shall serve as a health planning
12		liaison for the county of Hawaii;
13	(6)	One full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) program specialist
14		IV position, who shall serve as a health planning
15		liaison for the county of Kauai;
16	(7)	One full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) program specialist
17		IV position, who shall serve as a health planning
18		liaison for the county of Maui; and
19	(8)	One full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) program specialist
20		IV position, who shall serve as a health planning
21		liaison for the city and county of Honolulu.



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The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
 health for the purposes of this Act.
 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
