A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MISSING PERSONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State must
- 2 protect vulnerable kupuna and persons with cognitive impairments
- 3 or developmental disabilities who are missing. More than half
- 4 of states nationwide have established silver alert programs
- 5 modeled after the AMBER Alert program.
- 6 Broadcasters use systems like the emergency alert system,
- 7 formerly known as the emergency broadcast system, or wireless
- 8 emergency alert, to communicate emergency alerts and warning
- 9 messages to the public.
- 10 There are many emergency situations where the use of these
- 11 broadcast systems could save lives by helping to identify
- 12 missing elderly individuals or persons with cognitive
- 13 impairments or developmental disabilities. However, there is no
- 14 statutory process that requires its use.
- 15 The purpose of this Act is to establish a silver alert
- 16 program within the department of law enforcement to alert the
- 17 public of missing persons for whom there is a credible threat to



- 1 their health and safety. To the greatest extent possible, the
- 2 alert shall provide protection of the privacy, dignity, and
- 3 independence of the missing person by including standards aimed
- 4 at preventing the inadvertent or unnecessary broadcasting or
- 5 dissemination of sensitive health and diagnostic information.
- 6 SECTION 2. Chapter 353C, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 7 amended to read as follows:
- 8 "\$353C- Silver alert program; missing vulnerable
- 9 persons. (a) The department shall develop and implement a
- 10 silver alert program to rapidly disseminate information about a
- 11 person subject to the silver alert.
- 12 (b) If a person is reported missing to a law enforcement
- 13 agency and that agency determines that the conditions of
- 14 subsection (g) are met, the agency may request the department to
- 15 activate a silver alert. If the department concurs that the
- 16 conditions of subsection (g) are met, the department shall
- 17 activate a silver alert within the geographical area requested
- 18 by the investigating law enforcement agency.
- 19 (c) Radio, television, cable, and satellite systems are
- 20 encouraged to, but not required to, cooperate with disseminating
- 21 the information contained in a silver alert.

I	<u>(d)</u>	Upon activation of a silver alert, the department
2	shall assi	ist the investigating law enforcement agency by issuing
3	a be-on-th	ne-lookout alert, issuing an electronic flyer, or
4	activating	g a changeable message sign, as permissible.
5	(e)	The department, as permitted, may use the Wireless
6	Emergency	Alerts System.
7	<u>(f)</u>	The department, as permitted, may use a changeable
8	message si	Ign if the following conditions are met:
9	(1)	The investigating law enforcement agency determines
10		that a vehicle may be involved in the missing person
11		incident; and
12	(2)	Specific vehicle identification is available for
13	•	public dissemination.
14	(g)	A law enforcement agency may request from the
15	department	that a silver alert be activated if the agency
16	determines	s that all of the following conditions are met
17	regarding	the investigation of the missing person:
18	(1)	The missing person is sixty-five years of age or
19		older, cognitively impaired, or developmentally
20		disabled;

1	(2)	The law enforcement agency has utilized all available
2	•	<pre>local resources;</pre>
3	(3)	The law enforcement agency determines that the person
4		has gone missing under unexplained or suspicious
5		circumstances;
6	(4)	The law enforcement agency believes that the missing
7		person is in danger because of age, health, mental or
8		physical disability, or environment or weather
9		conditions; the missing person is in the company of a
10		potentially dangerous person; or there are other
11		factors indicating that the missing person may be in
12		peril; and
13	(5)	There is information available that, if disseminated
14		to the public, could assist in the safe recovery of
15		the missing person.
16	(h)	For purposes of this section:
17	"Cogi	nitively impaired" means affected by a cognitive
18	impairment	t, as defined in section 431:10H-201.
19	"Deve	elopmentally disabled" means affected by a severe,
20	chronic d	isability of a person that:

1	(1)	Is attributable to a mental or physical impairment or	
2		combination of mental and physical impairments;	
3	(2)	Is manifested before the person attains age	
4		twenty-two;	
5	(3)	Is likely to continue indefinitely;	
6	(4)	Results in substantial functional limitations in three	
7		or more of the following areas of major life activity:	
8		self-care, receptive and expressive language,	
9	•	learning, mobility, self-direction, capacity for	
10		independent living, and economic sufficiency; and	
11	<u>(5)</u>	Reflects the person's need for a combination and	
12		sequence of special, interdisciplinary, or generic	
13		care, treatment, or other services that are of	
14		lifelong or extended duration and are individually	
15		planned and coordinated.	
16	"Sil	ver alert" means a notification system, activated	
17	pursuant	to this section, designed to issue and coordinate	
18	alerts wi	th respect to a situation that meets conditions of	
19	subsection (g)."		
20	SECT	ION 3. There is appropriated out of the general	
21	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so	

- 1 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for
- 2 establishing and operating the silver alert program.
- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 4 law enforcement for the purposes of this Act.
- 5 SECTION 4. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of
- 6 the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,
- 7 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the
- 8 appropriations contained in H.B. No. , will cause the state
- 9 general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be
- 10 exceeded by \$ or per cent. In addition, the
- 11 appropriation contained in this Act will cause the general fund
- 12 expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be further
- 13 exceeded by \$ or per cent. The combined total
- 14 amount of general fund appropriations contained in only these
- 15 two Acts will cause the state general fund expenditure ceiling
- 16 for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by
- 17 \$ or per cent. The reasons for exceeding the
- 18 general fund expenditure ceiling are that:
- 19 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
- serve the public interest; and

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- (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
 addressed by this Act.
- 3 SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
- 4 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
