A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HISTORIC PRESERVATION.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 127A-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

"(a) In the event of a state of emergency declared by the

4 governor pursuant to section 127A-14, the governor may exercise

the following additional powers pertaining to emergency

6 management during the emergency period:

of persons who are affected with or believed to have been exposed to any infectious, communicable, or other disease that is, in the governor's opinion, dangerous to the public health and safety, or persons who are the source of other contamination, in any case where, in the governor's opinion, the existing laws are not adequate to assure the public health and safety; provide for the care and treatment of the persons; supplement the provisions of sections 325-32 to 325-38 concerning compulsory immunization programs; provide

1		for the isolation of closing of property which is a
2		source of contamination or is in a dangerous condition
3		in any case where, in the governor's opinion, the
4		existing laws are not adequate to assure the public
5		health and safety, and designate as public nuisances
6		acts, practices, conduct, or conditions that are
7		dangerous to the public health or safety or to
8		property; authorize that public nuisances be summarily
9		abated and, if need be, that the property be
10		$\operatorname{destroyed}[_{ au}]$ by any police officer or authorized
11		person, or provide for the cleansing or repair of \underline{the}
12		property, and if the cleansing or repair is to be at
13		the expense of the owner, the procedure [therefor]
14		shall follow as nearly as may be the provisions of
15		section 322-2, which shall be applicable; and further,
16		authorize, without the permission of the owners or
17		occupants, entry on private premises for any [such] of
18		<pre>these purposes;</pre>
19	(2)	Relieve hardships and inequities, or obstructions to
20		the public health, safety, or welfare, found by the
21		governor to exist in the laws and to result from the

1		operation of federal programs or measures taken under
2		this chapter, by suspending the laws, in whole or in
3		part, or by alleviating the provisions of laws on
4		[such] terms and conditions as the governor may
5		impose, including licensing laws, quarantine laws, and
6		laws relating to labels, grades, and standards;
7	(3)	Suspend any law that impedes, $[\Theta r]$ tends to impede or
8		be detrimental to the expeditious and efficient
9		execution of, or [to conflict] conflicts with,
10		emergency functions, including laws which by this
11		chapter specifically are made applicable to emergency
12		personnel; provided that the governor may suspend the
13		laws under chapter 6E, relating to historic
14		preservation requirements, only when there is an
15		imminent or presently occurring emergency that
16		threatens health and safety;
17	(4)	Suspend the provisions of any regulatory law
18		prescribing the procedures for out-of-state utilities
19		to conduct business in the State, including any
20		licensing laws applicable to out-of-state utilities or
21		their respective employees[, as well as] and any

1		order, rule, or regulation of any state agency, if
2		strict compliance with the provisions of [any such]
3		the law, order, rule, or regulation would in any way
4		prevent, hinder, or delay necessary action of a state
5		utility in coping with the emergency or disaster with
6		assistance that may be provided under a mutual
7		assistance agreement;
8	(5)	In the event of disaster or emergency beyond local
9		control, $[\Theta \hat{r}]$ an event which, in the opinion of the
10		governor, [is such as to] would make state operational
11		control necessary, or upon request of the local
12		entity, assume direct operational control over all or
13		any part of the emergency management functions within
14		the affected area;
15	(6)	Shut off water mains, gas mains, electric power
16		connections, or suspend other services, and, to the
17		extent permitted by or under federal law, suspend
18		electronic media transmission;
19	(7)	Direct and control the mandatory evacuation of the
20		civilian population;

1	(8)	Exercise additional emergency functions to the extent
2		necessary to prevent hoarding, waste, or destruction
3		of materials, supplies, commodities, accommodations,
4		facilities, and services, to effectuate equitable
5		distribution thereof, or to establish priorities
6		[therein] as the public welfare may require; to
7		investigate; and notwithstanding any other law to the
8		contrary, to regulate or prohibit, by means of
9		licensing, rationing, or otherwise, the storage,
10		transportation, use, possession, maintenance,
11		furnishing, sale, or distribution thereof, and any
12		business or any transaction related thereto;
13	(9)	Suspend section 8-1, relating to state holidays,
14		except the last paragraph relating to holidays
15		declared by the president, which shall remain
16		unaffected, and, in the event of the suspension, the
17		governor may establish state holidays by proclamation;
18	(10)	Adjust the hours for voting to take into consideration
19		the working hours of the voters during the emergency
20		period, [and] suspend those provisions of section 11-
21		131 that fix the hours for voting, and fix other hours

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1	by	stati	ng	the	same	in	the	election	proclamation	or
2	not	ice,	as	the	case	may	be;	:		

- infrastructure facilities, both publicly and privately owned, by regulating or, if necessary [to] for the continuation of the service [thereof], by taking over and operating the same; and
- Except as provided in section 134-7.2, whenever, in 8 (12)9 the governor's opinion, the laws of the State do not 10 adequately provide for the common defense, public health, safety, and welfare, investigate, regulate, or 11 12 prohibit the storage, transportation, use, possession, maintenance, furnishing, sale, or distribution of, as 13 14 well as any transaction related to, explosives, 15 firearms, [and] ammunition, inflammable materials and 16 other objects, implements, substances, businesses, or 17 services of a hazardous or dangerous character, [or] 18 that are particularly capable of misuse, or 19 [obstructive of] that obstruct or [tending] tend to 20 obstruct law enforcement, emergency management, or 21 military operations, including intoxicating liquor and

1	the liquor business; and authorize the seizure and
2	forfeiture of any [such] objects, implements, or
3	substances unlawfully possessed, as provided in this
4	chapter."
5	SECTION 2. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
6	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
7	begun before its effective date.
8	SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
9	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
10	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
