# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FERAL CHICKENS.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that feral chickens and
- 2 roosters have become a persistent nuisance, particularly in
- 3 suburban and urban residential communities. Feral chickens and
- 4 roosters wander into yards and gardens, digging up plants,
- 5 damaging food crops, and jeopardizing native plants and
- 6 resources. Feral roosters crow at all times of the day and
- 7 night, which has led to numerous noise complaints by residents
- 8 throughout the State and droppings from feral chickens are
- 9 unsanitary and create a health concern.
- 10 The legislature further finds that feral chickens and
- 11 roosters also carry diseases that threaten other animals,
- 12 including native birds, and a noticeable increase in the number
- 13 of feral chickens and roosters also creates a road hazard for
- 14 drivers who must suddenly stop or swerve to avoid them. The
- 15 legislature further finds that residents and visitors need
- 16 better education to not exacerbate this problem by feeding feral
- 17 animals, which leads to further congregation and growth of the

- 1 nuisance. To protect Hawaii's ecosystem, natural resources, and
- 2 the health and safety of its residents, it is critical that the
- 3 State work together with the counties to identify and implement
- 4 collaborative solutions to control the significant increase in
- 5 the population of feral chickens and roosters.
- 6 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate
- 7 funds to the city and county of Honolulu and the department of
- 8 health to implement a feral chicken control program and a
- 9 feeding feral animals education campaign, respectively.
- 10 SECTION 2. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of
- 11 the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,
- 12 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the
- 13 appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023,
- 14 and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure
- 15 ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by
- 16 \$ or per cent. This current declaration takes
- 17 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal
- 18 year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act
- 19 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure
- 20 ceiling are that:

| 9  | program in the city and county of Honolulu.                    |
| 10 | The sum appropriated shall be expended by the city and         |
| 11 | county of Honolulu for the purposes of this Act.               |
| 12 | SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general            |
| 13 | revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$50,000 or so much |
| 14 | thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for a    |
| 15 | feeding of feral animals education campaign.                   |
| 16 | The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of    |
| 17 | health for the purposes of this Act.                           |
| 18 | SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.         |
