A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FERAL CHICKENS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that feral chickens and SECTION 1. 2 roosters have become a persistent nuisance, particularly in suburban and urban residential communities. Feral chickens and 3 4 roosters wander into yards and gardens, digging up plants, 5 damaging food crops, and jeopardizing native plants and 6 resources. Feral roosters crow at all times of the day and 7 night, which has led to numerous noise complaints by residents 8 throughout the State, and droppings from feral chickens are 9 unsanitary and create a health concern.

10 The legislature further finds that feral chickens and 11 roosters also carry diseases that threaten other animals, 12 including native birds, and a noticeable increase in the number 13 of feral chickens and roosters also creates a road hazard for 14 drivers who must suddenly stop or swerve to avoid them. The 15 legislature further finds that residents and visitors need 16 better education to not exacerbate this problem by feeding feral 17 animals, which leads to further congregation and growth of the

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nuisance. To protect Hawaii's ecosystem and natural resources
and the health and safety of its residents, it is critical that
the State work together with the counties to identify and
implement collaborative solutions to control the significant
increase in the population of feral chickens and roosters.

6 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate 7 funds as a grant-in-aid to each county of the State to implement 8 feral chicken control programs and appropriate funds to the 9 department of health for a feeding of feral animals education 10 campaign.

SECTION 2. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of 11 12 the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93, 13 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the 14 appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, 15 and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure 16 ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by 17 per cent. This current declaration takes \$ or 18 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act 19 20 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure 21 ceiling are that:

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1	(1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
2	serve the public interest; and
3	(2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
4	addressed by this Act.
5	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
6	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
7	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 as a
8	grant-in-aid to each county as follows:
9	(1) \$ to the city and county of Honolulu;
10	(2) \$ to the county of Hawaii;
11	(3) \$ to the county of Maui; and
12	(4) \$ to the county of Kauai,
13	for the implementation of a feral chicken control program for
14	each respective county.
15	The sum appropriated shall be expended by each county for
16	the purposes of this Act.
17	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
18	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
19	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for a
20	feeding of feral animals education campaign.

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The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
health for the purposes of this Act.

3 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
