A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE COMMUNITY OUTREACH COURT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that increased 2 homelessness on the island of Oahu has led to more arrests and citations for nonviolent crimes. These offenses include 3 4 drinking liquor in public; being in public parks after hours; 5 trespassing; and illegal lodging on sidewalks, beaches, and in 6 other public places. Many persons who receive citations are unable to attend court or have misplaced their court paperwork 7 due to the transient and unstable nature of homelessness. When 8 9 a person fails to appear for court and has no known address, the 10 courts are left with no option but to issue a bench warrant. 11 This can be traumatic for the cited person and expends law 12 enforcement officers' time and resources.

13 To help address these issues, the judiciary, office of the 14 public defender, and department of the prosecuting attorney of 15 the city and county of Honolulu established a community court 16 outreach project to make court appearances more accessible for 17 homeless persons. The legislature formalized a community court

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1 outreach project in Act 55, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017. The 2 community court's goal is to assist nonviolent offenders who are 3 charged with offenses that disproportionately impact the 4 homeless community. Court sessions are held in community 5 locations where large homeless populations are located. The 6 court may resolve active charges and impose alternative 7 sentencing in cases where the offender is unable to pay fines 8 and fees. Resolving an offender's pending cases, and avoiding 9 bench warrants, leaves the offender in a better position to 10 obtain basic necessities, including employment, income 11 assistance, and housing. Community court social workers may 12 also assess offender needs for mental health services, substance 13 abuse treatment, sustenance or shelter assistance, or other 14 appropriate social services. The social worker may also help 15 arrange other referred services.

16 The legislature recognizes that the project has been 17 successful. Since its inception, the project has addressed more 18 than ten thousand cases, recalled more than nine hundred bench 19 warrants, lifted more than six thousand driver license stoppers, 20 and assisted more than six hundred participants with social 21 services or referrals.

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1	Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to permanently
2	establish and appropriate funds for the community outreach court
3	as a division of the district court of the first circuit.
4	SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
5	adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read
6	as follows:
7	"CHAPTER
8	COMMUNITY OUTREACH COURT
9	S -1 Community outreach court; establishment. (a) The
10	community outreach court shall be established as a division of
11	the district court of the first circuit.
12	(b) The community outreach court shall be held at any duly
13	designated location within the first judicial circuit by any
14	designated judge of the community outreach court.
15	§ -2 Jurisdiction. (a) The community outreach court
16	shall have concurrent jurisdiction with all district courts of
17	the first circuit to consider and adjudicate nonviolent,
18	non-felony criminal and traffic offenses, including traffic
19	infractions under chapter 291D, charged to offenders deemed
20	appropriate, after application and acceptance, for participation
21	in the community outreach court.

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1	(b)	In any case in which it has jurisdiction, the
2	community	outreach court shall exercise general equity powers as
3	authorize	d by law. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed
4	to limit	the jurisdiction and authority of any judge designated
5	as a judg	e of the community outreach court on matters within the
6	scope of	this chapter.
7	§ .	-3 Principles and components of the court. The
8	community	outreach court shall:
9	(1)	Facilitate the early identification and timely
10		placement of eligible offenders;
11	(2)	Foster cooperation between the prosecuting attorney
12		and public defender to resolve cases;
13	(3)	Impose alternative sentencing, including community
14		service sentences, and support the offender's
15		participation in programs based on the offender's
16		needs, including mental health services, substance
17		abuse treatment, sustenance or shelter assistance, or
18		other social services;
19	(4)	Establish a coordinated strategy to respond to an
20		offender's compliance or noncompliance with the
21		offender's sentence; and

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(5) Encourage partnerships between the court, public
 agencies, community-based organizations, and other
 entities, to maximize the court's effectiveness."
 SECTION 3. Act 55, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017, is
 repealed.

6 SECTION 4. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of 7. the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93, 8 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the 9 appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, 10 and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure 11 ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by 12 Ś or per cent. This current declaration takes 13 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal 14 year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act 15 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure 16 ceiling are that:

- 17 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
 18 serve the public interest; and
- 19 (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs20 addressed by this Act.
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1	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
3	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to
4	establish permanent positions in support of the community
5	outreach court, including:
6	(1) \$ each for four full-time equivalent (4.0
7	FTE) court clerk positions;
8	(2) \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE)
9	court bailiff position;
10	(3) \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE)
11	adult client services branch judicial clerk V
12	position; and
13	(4) \$ each for three full-time equivalent (3.0
14	FTE) adult client services positions.
15	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the judiciary for
16	the purposes of this Act.
17	SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
18	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
19	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for
20	two full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE) deputy sheriff positions to
21	support the community outreach court.



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The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
law enforcement for the purposes of this Act.
SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general
revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for
permanent positions in support of the community outreach court,
including:
(1) \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE)
deputy public defender;
(2) \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE)
paralegal; and
(3) \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE)
social worker or mental health worker, assigned to the
office of the public defender.
The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of the
public defender for the purposes of this Act.
SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for
permanent positions in support of the community outreach court,
including:

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1 (1) \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) • 2 deputy prosecuting attorney; (2) \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) 3 4 paralegal; and for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) 5 (3) \$ legal assistant. 6 7 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of the 8 prosecuting attorney of the city and county of Honolulu for the 9 purposes of this Act. SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the general 10 11 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 12 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for 13 the operations of the community outreach court, including 14 security, equipment, training, and other operational needs. 15 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the judiciary for 16 the purposes of this Act. 17 SECTION 10. This Act does not affect rights and duties 18 that matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were begun before its effective date. 19 20 SECTION 11. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
