#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that pharmacies and 2 pharmacists have a critical role in the State's health care 3 system. Pharmacies are often vital and convenient access points in the community for prescriptions, routine testing, 4 immunizations, and patient education. Pharmacists are trusted 5 6 health care professionals who have established relationships 7 with their patients, medical providers, and hospitals and can 8 improve optimal patient care.

The legislature further finds that in response to the 9 10 coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic, the federal 11 government issued an emergency declaration under the Public 12 Readiness and Emergency Preparedness (PREP) Act in April of 13 2020. In addition to other health care measures, the PREP Act 14 authorized pharmacists to order and administer COVID-19 vaccinations and other routine immunizations to adults and 15 children three years of age and older. The legislature also 16 finds that when the PREP Act expires at the end of 2024, this 17



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1 important health care practice that has been safely performed by pharmacists will no longer be available to children ages three 2 3 through ten. The legislature therefore finds that codifying the 4 current standard of care for minor immunizations into state law 5 will ensure that pharmacists can continue to provide this necessary health care service so that all individuals ages three 6 7 and older will continue to have convenient and safe access to 8 routine immunizations.

9 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to authorize
10 pharmacists to order and administer immunizations and
11 vaccinations to children three years of age and older under
12 state law.

13 SECTION 2. Section 461-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14 amended by amending the definition of "practice of pharmacy" to
15 read as follows:

16 ""Practice of pharmacy" means:

17 (1) The interpretation and evaluation of prescription
18 orders; the compounding, dispensing, and labeling of
19 drugs and devices (except labeling by a manufacturer,
20 packer, or distributor of nonprescription drugs and
21 commercially legend drugs and devices); the



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1 participation in drug selection and drug utilization 2 reviews; the proper and safe storage of drugs and 3 devices and the maintenance of proper records therefor; the responsibility for advising when 4 5 necessary or where regulated, of therapeutic values, content, hazards, and use of drugs and devices; and 6 7 the interpretation and evaluation of prescription orders to adjust the supply dispensed for purposes of 8 9 medication synchronization pursuant to section 10 431:10A-606, 432:1-621, or 432D-30; 11 (2) Performing the following procedures or functions as 12 part of the care provided by and in concurrence with a 13 "health care facility" and "health care service" as 14 defined in section 323D-2; or a "pharmacy"; or a 15 licensed physician, a licensed physician assistant, or 16 a licensed advanced practice registered nurse with 17 prescriptive authority; or a "managed care plan" as 18 defined in section 432E-1, in accordance with 19 policies, procedures, or protocols developed 20 collaboratively by health professionals, including 21 physicians and surgeons, pharmacists, physician



1 assistants, and registered nurses, and for which a 2 pharmacist has received appropriate training required 3 by these policies, procedures, or protocols: 4 (A) Ordering or performing routine drug therapy 5 related patient assessment procedures; 6 Ordering drug therapy related laboratory tests; (B) 7 (C) Initiating emergency contraception oral drug 8 therapy in accordance with a written 9 collaborative agreement approved by the board, 10 between a licensed physician, physician 11 assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse 12 with prescriptive authority and a pharmacist who 13 has received appropriate training that includes 14 programs approved by the Accreditation Council 15 for Pharmacy Education (ACPE), curriculum-based 16 programs from an ACPE-accredited college of 17 pharmacy, state or local health department 18 programs, or programs recognized by the board; 19 (D) Administering drugs orally, topically, by 20 intranasal delivery, or by injection, pursuant to 21 the order of the patient's licensed physician,

1 the family, oversees the acute, chronic, and preventive health 2 needs of the patient in a comprehensive, coordinated, and 3 continuous fashion." 4 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 5 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 6 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval. 7
