A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LEAD POISONING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. Chapter 325, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended b	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to re	ad as follows:
4	" <u>§32</u>	5- Lead poisoning; testing; minors; exemption. (a)
5	Beginning	January 1, 2025, a physician treating a minor patient
6	shall com	plete the following:
7	(1)	Test the minor patient for lead poisoning, or order
8		the test for the minor patient at certain intervals
9		using methods pursuant to rules adopted by the
10		department of health; and
11	(2)	If the physician performs the test described in
12		paragraph (1), the physician shall make an entry of
13		the testing on the minor patient's record that is
14		maintained pursuant to section 325-33.
15	(b)	The department of health shall adopt rules pursuant to
16	chapter 9	1 to implement this section. The rules shall include
17	but not b	e limited to:

1	(1)	Subject to subsection (c), a requirement that a minor
2		residing in the State is tested at the following ages:
3		(A) Twelve months of age and twenty-four months of
4		age; or
5		(B) If the minor has no previous record of the test
6		required pursuant to subsection (a), between
7		twenty-four months of age and seventy-two months
8		of age;
9	(2)	Identification of geographic areas in the State that
10		pose a high risk for childhood lead poisoning and a
11		requirement that a minor who is four years of age be
12		tested if the minor resides in an area designated by
13		the department of health;
14	(3)	Factors to identify a minor who is at high risk for
15		lead poisoning shall include but not be limited to:
16		(A) Residing in a home where other minors have been
17		diagnosed with lead poisoning; and
18		(B) Residing in a home that was built before 1978;
19	(4)	A requirement that minors be tested at intervals
20		determined by the department of health if a physician
21		determines that the minor is at high risk for lead

1		poisoning by applying the factors in paragraph (3),
2		through a parent's attestation or through the
3		physician's own independent medical judgment; and
4	<u>(5)</u>	Procedures for entering the information described in
5		subsection (a)(2) on the minor's record of testing
6		that is maintained pursuant to section 325-33,
7		including but not limited to procedures for entering
8		the information if testing is performed by a person
9		other than a physician.
10	(c)	The department of health may, by rule, adjust the age
11	requireme	nts in subsection (b)(1) or eliminate the testing
12	requireme	nt if, after collecting and reviewing data on lead
13	poisoning	in the State for five years, the department of health
14	determine	s that testing minors at the ages set by subsection
15	(b)(1) is	no longer necessary or appropriate to maintain the
16	health an	d safety of minors who reside in the State. If the
17	departmen	t of health adjusts the ages or eliminates the
18	requireme	nt in subsection (b)(1) pursuant to this section, the
19	departmen	t of health shall submit a report of its findings and
20	rationale	to the legislature twenty days prior to the convening
21	of the ne	xt regular session.

1	(d) This section shall not apply to a minor whose parent,
2	guardian, or individual in loco parentis objects to testing."

Report Title:

DOH; Minors; Lead Poisoning; Mandatory Testing; Requirements; Rules; Exemption

Description:

Beginning 1/1/2025, requires physicians to perform or order test for lead poisoning in minor patients at certain intervals, and if the physician performs the test, the results to be included in the minor patient's record of immunization. Requires the Department of Health to adopt rules. Provides certain exemptions for the mandatory lead poisoning testing of minors.
