A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that, in 2001, the
- 2 federal Bureau of Prisons opened the Honolulu Federal Detention
- 3 Center. Located on the west side of the Daniel K. Inouye
- 4 International Airport, the Honolulu Federal Detention Center
- 5 houses male and female federal pre-trial detainees, sentenced
- 6 felons who have nearly completed their prison terms, and Hawaii
- 7 inmates who are awaiting trial in state court, at an occupancy
- 8 rate far below the facility's potential capacity of one thousand
- 9 two hundred beds.
- 10 The Honolulu Federal Detention Center currently houses
- 11 approximately four hundred inmates, approximately one hundred
- 12 seventy of whom are state detainees, in an efficient vertical
- 13 design structure that requires fewer workers to manage detainees
- 14 than antiquated state facilities. The center also includes
- 15 integrated state-of-the-art surveillance and management
- 16 technologies, and includes cells, office areas, medical
- 17 facilities, recreational areas, storage rooms, food preparation

- 1 areas, laundry areas, mechanical rooms, security systems, and
- 2 communications systems.
- 3 The State has struggled for years to find additional bed
- 4 capacity for its overcrowded jails and prisons, which were
- 5 designed to hold a combined total of 2,491 inmates but currently
- 6 hold approximately 5,161 inmates. Replacing or refurbishing
- 7 state prisons and jails to meet the current demand for adequate
- 8 space and services would cost an estimated \$1,500,000,000 to
- 9 \$2,000,000,000.
- 10 Since June 2001, the State has leased bed space at the
- 11 Honolulu Federal Detention Center to relieve jail overcrowding.
- 12 In September 2019, it housed one hundred eighty-six male and
- 13 female inmates under the department of public safety's
- 14 jurisdiction at a daily cost of \$129.48 per inmate.
- 15 State acquisition of the Honolulu Federal Detention Center
- 16 will expand the bed capacity of the department of public safety,
- 17 help alleviate overcrowding at the Oahu community correctional
- 18 center and the State's other jails and prisons, and eliminate
- 19 the immediate burden of building a new state jail.
- The legislature further finds that there has long been
- 21 interest in obtaining the Honolulu Federal Detention Center.

- 1 In 2016, House Concurrent Resolution No. 31 requested Hawaii's
- 2 congressional delegation to assist the State in negotiating with
- 3 the federal government for the acquisition of the Honolulu
- 4 Federal Detention Center.
- 5 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds for the
- 6 purchase of the Honolulu Federal Detention Center.
- 7 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 8 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 9 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and
- 10 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 11 year 2024-2025 to purchase the Honolulu Federal Detention Center
- 12 for the purpose of housing state detainees and inmates,
- 13 relieving overcrowding at state jails and prisons, and
- 14 eliminating the financial costs of leasing bed space for state
- 15 inmates at the Honolulu Federal Detention Center.
- 16 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 17 public safety or its successor agency, the department of
- 18 corrections and rehabilitation, as the case may be, for the
- 19 purposes of this Act.

1 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
