### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS.

### **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

The legislature finds that the State of Hawaii 1 SECTION 1. 2 is ranked fourth in the nation for highest rates of homelessness 3 according to 2022 Homeless Counts by State. The 2023 Oahu Point in Time Count reported that among homeless persons: thirty-six 4 5 per cent were chronically homeless; thirty-one per cent suffer 6 from substance abuse problems; thirty-nine per cent reported a 7 mental illness; sixty-two per cent reported one or more 8 disabling conditions; and twenty-eight per cent reported a 9 physical, developmental, or other disability.

10 The legislature further finds that homeless individuals 11 suffering from behavioral health conditions are often high users of the hospital emergency departments, which costs the State's 12 13 health system millions of dollars each year for emergency 14 ambulance transportation and emergency mental health evaluations. Providing appropriate care for these individuals 15 16 requires clinical expertise to evaluate their physical and 17 mental impairments and to assist in overcoming barriers to





access proper medical treatment and resources to meet the basic 1 2 needs like food, hygiene, safety, and transportation. 3 "Triage" is recognized as an evidence-based practice to end 4 the cycle of homelessness and provides assessment of a person's 5 disorders, need for medication-assisted detoxification, and timely psychiatric treatment. The lack of a triage service has 6 7 been a major gap in the State's system of behavioral health care 8 for homeless persons and others with mental illness or substance 9 abuse issues. When a person is ready and seeking treatment, 10 they should be able to access it immediately. This is particularly true for those who suffer from substance use 11 12 disorders for whom the window of contemplation about the 13 benefits of treatment is often brief and fleeting. The safety 14 and constant supervision available in a triage center is a stark 15 contrast to the chaos and vulnerability individuals experience 16 on the street. Trauma informed services in the community 17 fosters active client participation and support, which are 18 critical to effective engagement in treatment and in patient 19 retention.

20 The legislature also finds that the 'Imi Ola Piha Homeless
21 Triage Center (HTC), piloted by the Institute for Human Services



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and operating since June 5, 2023, has been successful in moving 1 2 homeless from the street to permanent housing. Within six months of operation, through collaborating with police, outreach 3 4 specialists, and other community providers, the eight-bed service site has triaged over one hundred fifty referrals. 5 Of the eighty-three clients in intake, the HTC has detoxed sixty-6 7 three clients and stabilized the mental illness of thirty-five 8 clients. The HTC has also transitioned those detoxed and 9 stabilized into housing or shelter, enabling continued treatment 10 in the community.

11 The successful pilot program can do more to reduce the cost 12 of restoring homeless persons to normalcy and independence. According to Oahu's 2023 Point in Time Count, there are 1,602 13 14 homeless persons reporting substance abuse or mental health 15 issues. The average cost of detoxification per year is \$1,536 16 for outpatients and \$58,810 for residential patients, while the 17 cost for emergency transport and treatment total \$3,633 per 18 year. Saving 1,602 patients from outpatient rehab visits or 19 diverting them from emergency medical treatment could save the State upwards of \$2,460,672 and \$5,820,066, respectively. 20

21 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:



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1	(1)	Establish a triage center program for homeless
2		individuals within the statewide office of
3		homelessness and housing solutions in the department
4		of human services; and
5	(2)	Appropriate funds to the department of human services
6		to implement the triage center program.
7	SECTION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
8	amended by adding a new section to part XVIII to be	
9	appropriately designated and to read as follows:	
10	" <u>§346-</u> Statewide office of homelessness and housing	
11	solutions; triage center program; establishment. (a) The	
12	department of human services shall establish a triage center	
13	program within the statewide office of homelessness and housing	
14	solutions that focuses on serving homeless individuals with	
15	substance	abuse issues or mental illness.
16	(b)	The triage center program shall provide:
17	(1)	Access to emergency food, shelter, housing navigation,
18		and supportive services, twenty-four hours per day,
19		seven days per week;
20	(2)	Case management services;



1	(4)	Substance abuse treatment and detoxification services;	
2	(5)	Behavioral health services; and	
3	(6)	Trauma-informed, cultural-based life skills groups for	
4		shelter guests to maximize engagement and retention.	
5	<u>(c)</u>	The statewide office of homelessness and housing	
6	solutions	shall work in cooperation with local hospitals,	
7	rehabilitation facilities, law enforcement agencies, and		
8	homeless service providers in establishing the triage center		
9	program.		
10	(d)	The statewide office of homelessness and housing	
11	solutions may contract with facilities that provide		
12	comprehensive triage services to homeless individuals suffering		
13	from mental or substance abuse problems to carry out the triage		
14	center program."		
15	SECTION 3. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of		
16	the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,		
17	Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the		
18	appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023,		
19	and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure		
20	ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by		
21	\$	or per cent. This current declaration takes	



1 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal 2 year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act 3 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure 4 ceiling are that:

5 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
6 serve the public interest; and

7 (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs8 addressed by this Act.

9 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
11 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to
12 implement the triage center program established pursuant to
13 section 2 of this Act.

14 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 15 human services for the purposes of this Act.

16 SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.

17 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.
