A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM PERSONNEL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
- 3 "(b) The civil service to which this chapter applies shall
- 4 comprise all positions in the State now existing or hereafter
- 5 established and embrace all personal services performed for the
- **6** State, except the following:
- 7 (1) Commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Hawaii
- 8 National Guard as such, and positions in the Hawaii
- 9 National Guard that are required by state or federal
- 10 laws or regulations or orders of the National Guard to
- 11 be filled from those commissioned or enlisted
- personnel;
- 13 (2) Positions filled by persons employed by contract where
- 14 the director of human resources development has
- 15 certified that the service is special or unique or is
- 16 essential to the public interest and that, because of
- 17 circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel
- 18 to perform the service cannot be obtained through

1		normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any such
2		contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;
3	(3)	Positions that must be filled without delay to comply
4		with a court order or decree if the director
5		determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
6		civil service procedures would result in delay or
7		noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent
8		decree;
9	(4)	Positions filled by the legislature or by either house
10		or any committee thereof;
11	(5)	Employees in the office of the governor and office of
12		the lieutenant governor, and household employees at
13		Washington Place;
14	(6)	Positions filled by popular vote;
15	(7)	Department heads, officers, and members of any board,
16		commission, or other state agency whose appointments
17		are made by the governor or are required by law to be
18		confirmed by the senate;
19	(8)	Judges, referees, receivers, masters, jurors, notaries
20		public, land court examiners, court commissioners, and
21		attorneys appointed by a state court for a special
22		temporary service;

1 (9) One bailiff for the chief justice of the supreme court 2 who shall have the powers and duties of a court 3 officer and bailiff under section 606-14; one 4 secretary or clerk for each justice of the supreme 5 court, each judge of the intermediate appellate court, 6 and each judge of the circuit court; one secretary for 7 the judicial council; one deputy administrative 8 director of the courts; three law clerks for the chief 9 justice of the supreme court, two law clerks for each 10 associate justice of the supreme court and each judge 11 of the intermediate appellate court, one law clerk for 12 each judge of the circuit court, two additional law clerks for the civil administrative judge of the 13 14 circuit court of the first circuit, two additional law 15 clerks for the criminal administrative judge of the circuit court of the first circuit, one additional law 16 17 clerk for the senior judge of the family court of the first circuit, two additional law clerks for the civil 18 motions judge of the circuit court of the first 19 20 circuit, two additional law clerks for the criminal motions judge of the circuit court of the first 21 22 circuit, and two law clerks for the administrative

5			alternative school project coordinators, and

13			agents, personnel engaged in instructional work,

15			personnel of the university;

18	(13)	(A)	Positions filled by inmates, patients of state
19			institutions, persons with severe physical or
20			mental disabilities participating in the work
21			experience training programs;

1		(B) Positions filled with students in accordance with
2		guidelines for established state employment
3		programs; and
4		(C) Positions that provide work experience training
5		or temporary public service employment that are
6		filled by persons entering the workforce or
7		persons transitioning into other careers under
8		programs such as the federal Workforce Investment
9		Act of 1998, as amended, or the Senior Community
10		Service Employment Program of the Employment and
11		Training Administration of the United States
12		Department of Labor, or under other similar state
13		programs;
14	(14)	A custodian or guide at Iolani Palace, the Royal
15		Mausoleum, and Hulihee Palace;
16	(15)	Positions filled by persons employed on a fee,
17		contract, or piecework basis, who may lawfully perform
18		their duties concurrently with their private business
19		or profession or other private employment and whose
20		duties require only a portion of their time, if it is
21		impracticable to ascertain or anticipate the portion
22		of time to be devoted to the service of the State;

1 (16)Positions of first deputies or first assistants of 2 each department head appointed under or in the manner 3 provided in section 6, article V, of the Hawaii State 4 Constitution; three additional deputies or assistants 5 either in charge of the highways, harbors, and 6 airports divisions or other functions within the 7 department of transportation as may be assigned by the 8 director of transportation, with the approval of the 9 governor; one additional deputy in the department of 10 human services either in charge of welfare or other 11 functions within the department as may be assigned by 12 the director of human services; four additional 13 deputies in the department of health, each in charge 14 of one of the following: behavioral health, 15 environmental health, hospitals, and health resources 16 administration, including other functions within the 17 department as may be assigned by the director of 18 health, with the approval of the governor; two 19 additional deputies in charge of the law enforcement 20 programs, administration, or other functions within 21 the department of law enforcement as may be assigned 22 by the director of law enforcement, with the approval

1		of the governor; three additional deputies each in
2		charge of the correctional institutions,
3		rehabilitation services and programs, and
4		administration and other functions within the
5		department of corrections and rehabilitation as may be
6		assigned by the director of corrections and
7		rehabilitation, with the approval of the governor; an
8		administrative assistant to the state librarian; and
9		an administrative assistant to the superintendent of
10		education;
11	(17)	Positions specifically exempted from this part by any
12		other law; provided that:
13		(A) Any exemption created after July 1, 2014, shall
14		expire three years after its enactment unless
15		affirmatively extended by an act of the
16		legislature; and
17		(B) All of the positions defined by paragraph (9)
18		shall be included in the position classification
19		plan;
20	(18)	Positions in the state foster grandparent program and
21		positions for temporary employment of senior citizens

1		in occupations in which there is a severe personnel
2		shortage or in special projects;
3	(19)	Household employees at the official residence of the
4		president of the University of Hawaii;
5	(20)	Employees in the department of education engaged in
6		the supervision of students during meal periods in the
7		distribution, collection, and counting of meal
8		tickets, and in the cleaning of classrooms after
9		school hours on a less than half-time basis;
10	(21)	Employees hired under the tenant hire program of the
11		Hawaii public housing authority; provided that not
12		more than twenty-six per cent of the authority's
13		workforce in any housing project maintained or
14		operated by the authority shall be hired under the
15		tenant hire program;
16	(22)	Positions of the federally funded expanded food and
17		nutrition program of the University of Hawaii that
18		require the hiring of nutrition program assistants who
19		live in the areas they serve;
20	(23)	Positions filled by persons with severe disabilities
21		who are certified by the state vocational

1		rehabilitation office that they are able to perform
2		safely the duties of the positions;
3	(24)	The sheriff;
4	(25)	A gender and other fairness coordinator hired by the
5		judiciary;
6	(26)	Positions in the Hawaii National Guard youth and adult
7		education programs;
8	(27)	In the state energy office in the department of
9		business, economic development, and tourism, all
10		energy program managers, energy program specialists,
11		energy program assistants, and energy analysts;
12	(28)	Administrative appeals hearing officers in the
13		department of human services;
14	(29)	In the Med-QUEST division of the department of human
15		services, the division administrator, finance officer,
16		health care services branch administrator, medical
17		director, and clinical standards administrator;
18	(30)	In the director's office of the department of human
19		services, the enterprise officer, information security
20		and privacy compliance officer, security and privacy
21		compliance engineer, security and privacy compliance
22		analyst, information technology implementation

1		manager, assistant information technology
2		implementation manager, resource manager,
3		community/project development director, policy
4		director, special assistant to the director, and
5		limited English proficiency project
6		manager/coordinator;
7	(31)	The Alzheimer's disease and related dementia services
8		coordinator in the executive office on aging;
9	(32)	In the Hawaii emergency management agency, the
10		executive officer, public information officer, civil
11		defense administrative officer, branch chiefs, and
12		emergency operation center state warning point
13		personnel; provided that for state warning point
14		personnel, the director shall determine that
15		recruitment through normal civil service recruitment
16		procedures would result in delay or noncompliance;
17	(33)	The executive director and seven full-time
18		administrative positions of the school facilities
19		authority;
20	(34)	Positions in the Mauna Kea stewardship and oversight
21		authority;

1	(35)	In the office of homeland security of the department		
2		of law enforcement, the statewide interoperable

5		human services, the business technology analyst [-];

17	service status of any incumbent as it existed on July 1, 1955."

JUSTIFICATION SHEET

DEPARTMENT: BUDGET AND FINANCE

TITLE: A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EMPLOYEES'

RETIREMENT SYSTEM PERSONNEL.

PURPOSE: To exempt the Deputy Executive Director

(DED), Chief Compliance Officer (CCO), and branch manager positions at the Employees'

Retirement System of the State of

Hawaii(ERS) from chapter 76, Hawaii Revised

Statutes (HRS). The change from civil

service positions to exempt positions would apply upon approval to the CCO position but would not apply to the DED or branch manager positions until the positions are vacated by the incumbents in the positions at the time

of approval.

MEANS: Amends section 76-16(b), HRS.

JUSTIFICATION: The continued administration of a strong

pension system is reliant on experienced management to be responsive to the ERS's Board, its Executive Director, and ERS membership. The responsibilities of these managerial positions have increased with the growth of the membership of the ERS and staff, advancement in technology, and regulatory requirements. Specialized pension managerial skills, experience, and commensurate compensation are required to maintain the level of professionalism that the ERS requires. The DED position reports to the Executive Director and fills in as acting Executive Director, when the Executive Director is unavailable, and manages the day-to-day operations of the The CCO reports to the Executive Director and manages the ethics, risk, and compliance program and is integral to not only the protection of the assets of the ERS but also to the success, stability, and sustainability of the ERS. The branch

managers, who in combination with executive leadership, develop policies and procedures, report to the DED and manage staff who execute the retirement benefits programs, accounting services for both pensions and investments, and the maintenance and security of the ERS's information technology. These managerial positions also periodically report to the ERS Board, which has the responsibility for the proper operation of the ERS. The stakeholders of the ERS, which include employees of the State and counties, are reliant on a strong ERS to secure current and future benefits.
