SECTION 1. The legislature finds that climate change is an

RELATING TO CLIMATE.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

2 existential threat globally. The effects of climate change are 3 evident as people and communities the world over are 4 experiencing the dire effects of climate change. Climate change 5 is directly contributing to humanitarian and environmental emergencies from heatwaves, wildfires, droughts, floods, and 6 tropical storms to hurricanes. Moreover, these emergencies are 7 8 increasing in scale, frequency, and intensity. In 2021, Hawaii 9 was the first state to declare a climate emergency. 10 The legislature recognizes that combating climate change 11 requires able leadership at the state level to take meaningful 12 and proactive action to combat this state crisis, promote 13 renewable energy, and build a clean energy economy. legislature further finds that a senior advisor on climate is 14 15 necessary to serve as a principal leader in the areas of state

energy and climate to reduce the effects of climate change.

addition, a senior advisor on climate position would be critical

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1 to state, county, and federal leadership collaborative policies 2 and actions in addressing climate change. 3 The purpose of this Act is to establish a senior advisor on climate position within the office of planning and sustainable 4 5 development to serve in an advisory role in providing quidance 6 to the governor in reducing climate change and addressing the 7 impacts of the climate crisis on the State. 8 SECTION 2. Chapter 225M, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 10 and to read as follows: 11 "§225M- Senior advisor on climate; established. (a) 12 There is established the position of senior advisor on climate, 13 which shall be placed within the office of planning and 14 sustainable development and report to the governor. 15 The senior advisor on climate shall: (b) Serve in an advisory role in providing guidance to the 16 (1) 17 governor in reducing climate change and addressing the 18 impacts of the climate crisis on the State; Advise the governor on priorities, policies, 19 (2)

initiatives, and areas related to climate change;

1	(3)	Help integrate climate solutions, including adaptation
2		and mitigation strategies across state departments and
3		agencies;
4	(4)	Assist in the coordination and implementation of
5		funding and policies for clean energy, climate, and
6		resiliency initiatives;

9		governments, and the private and nonprofit sectors;

11	(6)	Serve as a member on the Hawaii climate change
12		mitigation and adaptation commission.
13	(c)	The senior advisor on climate shall be nominated by
14	the gover	nor and, by and with the advice and consent of the
15	senate, a	ppointed by the governor without regard to chapters 76

17	<u>(d)</u>	The senior advisor on climate shall hold office for a
18	term to e	expire at the end of the term for which the governor was
19	elected,	unless sooner removed by the governor."
20	SECT	ION 3. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21	amended b	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

8		laws or regulations or orders of the National Guard to
9		be filled from those commissioned or enlisted

12		the director of human resources development has
13		certified that the service is special or unique or is
14		essential to the public interest and that, because of
15		circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel
16		to perform the service cannot be obtained through
17		normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any such
18		contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;
19	(3)	Positions that must be filled without delay to comply
20		with a court order or decree if the director
21		determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
22		civil service procedures would result in delay or

1		noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent
2		decree;

4		or any committee thereof;
5	(5)	Employees in the office of the governor and office of

Section 225P-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 8 amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows: 9 "(c) The commission shall include the following members: 10 (1)The chairs of the standing committees of the 11 legislature with subject matter jurisdiction 12 encompassing environmental protection and land use; 13 The chairperson of the board of land and natural (2) 14 resources or the chairperson's designee, who shall be 15 the co-chair of the commission; 16 The director of the office of planning and sustainable (3) 17 development or the director's designee, who shall be 18 the co-chair of the commission; The director of business, economic development, and 19 (4) 20 tourism or the director's designee;

1	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$175,000 or so much
3	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for the
4	establishment of the one full-time equivalent (1.00 FTE)
5	permanent senior advisor on climate position.
6	The sum appropriated shall expended by the department of
7	business, economic development, and tourism for the purposes of
8	this Act.
9	SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
10	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
11	SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
12	provided that section 5 shall take effect on July 1, 2024.

DEPARTMENT: GOVERNOR

TITLE: A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLIMATE.

PURPOSE: To establish a senior advisor on climate

position within the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development to serve in an advisory role in providing guidance to the governor in reducing climate change and addressing the impacts of the climate crisis on the State, make the senior advisor on climate a member of the Hawaii Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission, and appropriate funds for the senior advisor

on climate position.

MEANS: Add a new section to chapter 225M, Hawaii

Revised Statutes (HRS); amend sections 76-16(b) and 225P-3(c), HRS; and appropriate

general funds.

JUSTIFICATION: Climate change is an existential threat to

our State and globally. Climate change is directly contributing to humanitarian and environmental emergencies from heatwaves, wildfires, droughts, floods, and tropical storms to hurricanes. The dire effects of climate change are impacting health, the environment, and the economy in our State. Combating climate change requires able leadership at the state level to take meaningful and proactive action to combat this crisis in Hawaii. A senior advisor on climate is also necessary to serve as an advisor to the governor in the areas of State energy and climate to reduce the

effects of climate change.

Impact on the public: The senior advisor on climate will reinforce leadership at the state level in combating climate change and furthering cohesion and collaborative efforts among the state, federal, and county governments, and private and nonprofit

sectors in addressing this crisis in the

State.
