#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOMELAND SECURITY.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. 2 Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by 3 amending subsection (b) to read as follows: 4 The civil service to which this chapter applies shall 5 comprise all positions in the State now existing or hereafter 6 established and embrace all personal services performed for the 7 State, except the following: 8 Commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Hawaii (1) 9 National Guard as such, and positions in the Hawaii National Guard that are required by state or federal 10 11 laws or regulations or orders of the National Guard to be filled from those commissioned or enlisted 12 13 personnel; 14 (2) Positions filled by persons employed by contract where 15 the director of human resources development has certified that the service is special or unique or is 16 17 essential to the public interest and that, because of 18 circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel

1		to perform the service cannot be obtained through
2		normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any such
3		contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;
4	(3)	Positions that must be filled without delay to comply
5		with a court order or decree if the director
6		determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
7		civil service procedures would result in delay or
8		noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent
9		decree;
10	(4)	Positions filled by the legislature or by either house
11		or any committee thereof;
12	(5)	Employees in the office of the governor and office of
13		the lieutenant governor, and household employees at
14		Washington Place;
15	(6)	Positions filled by popular vote;
16	(7)	Department heads, officers, and members of any board,
17		commission, or other state agency whose appointments
18		are made by the governor or are required by law to be
19		confirmed by the senate;
20	(8)	Judges, referees, receivers, masters, jurors, notaries
21		public, land court examiners, court commissioners, and

1 attorneys appointed by a state court for a special
2 temporary service;

One bailiff for the chief justice of the supreme court 3 (9) who shall have the powers and duties of a court 4 officer and bailiff under section 606-14; one 5 secretary or clerk for each justice of the supreme 6 court, each judge of the intermediate appellate court, 7 and each judge of the circuit court; one secretary for 8 9 the judicial council; one deputy administrative 10 director of the courts; three law clerks for the chief justice of the supreme court, two law clerks for each 11 associate justice of the supreme court and each judge 12 **13** of the intermediate appellate court, one law clerk for 14 each judge of the circuit court, two additional law 15 clerks for the civil administrative judge of the 16 circuit court of the first circuit, two additional law 17 clerks for the criminal administrative judge of the circuit court of the first circuit, one additional law 18 clerk for the senior judge of the family court of the 19 20 first circuit, two additional law clerks for the civil 21 motions judge of the circuit court of the first circuit, two additional law clerks for the criminal 22

1 motions judge of the circuit court of the first circuit, and two law clerks for the administrative 2 judge of the district court of the first circuit; and 3 4 one private secretary for the administrative director 5 of the courts, the deputy administrative director of the courts, each department head, each deputy or first 6 7 assistant, and each additional deputy, or assistant deputy, or assistant defined in paragraph (16); 8 9 (10) First deputy and deputy attorneys general, the administrative services manager of the department of 10 11 the attorney general, one secretary for the 12 administrative services manager, an administrator and **13** any support staff for the criminal and juvenile 14 justice resources coordination functions, and law 15 clerks; 16 (11)(A) Teachers, principals, vice-principals, complex area superintendents, deputy and assistant 17 superintendents, other certificated personnel, no 18 19 more than twenty noncertificated administrative, 20 professional, and technical personnel not engaged 21 in instructional work;

1		(B)	Effective July 1, 2003, teaching assistants,
2			educational assistants, bilingual/bicultural
3			school-home assistants, school psychologists,
4			psychological examiners, speech pathologists,
5			athletic health care trainers, alternative school
6			work study assistants, alternative school
7			educational/supportive services specialists,
8			alternative school project coordinators, and
9			communications aides in the department of
10			education;
11		(C)	The special assistant to the state librarian and
12			one secretary for the special assistant to the
13			state librarian; and
14		(D)	Members of the faculty of the University of
15			Hawaii, including research workers, extension
16			agents, personnel engaged in instructional work,
17			and administrative, professional, and technical
18			personnel of the university;
19	(12)	Empl	oyees engaged in special, research, or
20		demo	nstration projects approved by the governor;
21	(13)	(A)	Positions filled by inmates, patients of state
22			institutions, persons with severe physical or

1			mental disabilities participating in the work
2			experience training programs;
3		(B)	Positions filled with students in accordance with
4			guidelines for established state employment
5			programs; and
6		(C)	Positions that provide work experience training
7			or temporary public service employment that are
8			filled by persons entering the workforce or
9			persons transitioning into other careers under
10			programs such as the federal Workforce Investment
11			Act of 1998, as amended, or the Senior Community
12			Service Employment Program of the Employment and
13			Training Administration of the United States
14			Department of Labor, or under other similar state
15			programs;
16	(14)	A cu	stodian or guide at Iolani Palace, the Royal
17		Maus	oleum, and Hulihee Palace;
18	(15)	Posi	tions filled by persons employed on a fee,
19		cont	ract, or piecework basis, who may lawfully perform
20		thei	r duties concurrently with their private business
21		or p	rofession or other private employment and whose
22		duti	es require only a portion of their time, if it is

1 impracticable to ascertain or anticipate the portion of time to be devoted to the service of the State; 2 Positions of first deputies or first assistants of 3 (16)4 each department head appointed under or in the manner provided in section 6, article V, of the Hawaii State 5 Constitution; three additional deputies or assistants 6 7 either in charge of the highways, harbors, and 8 airports divisions or other functions within the 9 department of transportation as may be assigned by the 10 director of transportation, with the approval of the 11 governor; one additional deputy in the department of 12 human services either in charge of welfare or other 13 functions within the department as may be assigned by 14 the director of human services; four additional **15** deputies in the department of health, each in charge **16** of one of the following: behavioral health, **17** environmental health, hospitals, and health resources 18 administration, including other functions within the 19 department as may be assigned by the director of 20 health, with the approval of the governor; two 21 additional deputies in charge of the law enforcement 22 programs, administration, or other functions within

1		the department of law enforcement as may be assigned
2		by the director of law enforcement, with the approval
3		of the governor; three additional deputies each in
4		charge of the correctional institutions,
5		rehabilitation services and programs, and
6		administration or other functions within the
7		department of corrections and rehabilitation as may be
8		assigned by the director of corrections and
9		rehabilitation, with the approval of the governor; an
10		administrative assistant to the state librarian; and
11		an administrative assistant to the superintendent of
12		education;
13	(17)	Positions specifically exempted from this part by any
14		other law; provided that:
15		(A) Any exemption created after July 1, 2014, shall
16		expire three years after its enactment unless
17		affirmatively extended by an act of the
18		legislature; and
19		(B) All of the positions defined by paragraph (9)
20		shall be included in the position classification
21		plan;

1	(18)	Positions in the state foster grandparent program and
2		positions for temporary employment of senior citizens
3		in occupations in which there is a severe personnel
4		shortage or in special projects;
5	(19)	Household employees at the official residence of the
6		president of the University of Hawaii;
7	(20)	Employees in the department of education engaged in
8		the supervision of students during meal periods in the
9		distribution, collection, and counting of meal
10		tickets, and in the cleaning of classrooms after
11		school hours on a less than half-time basis;
12	(21)	Employees hired under the tenant hire program of the
13		Hawaii public housing authority; provided that not
14		more than twenty-six per cent of the authority's
15		workforce in any housing project maintained or
16		operated by the authority shall be hired under the
17		tenant hire program;
18	(22)	Positions of the federally funded expanded food and
19		nutrition program of the University of Hawaii that
20		require the hiring of nutrition program assistants who
21		live in the areas they serve;

1	(23)	Positions filled by persons with severe disabilities
2		who are certified by the state vocational
3		rehabilitation office that they are able to perform
4		safely the duties of the positions;
5	(24)	The sheriff;
6	(25)	A gender and other fairness coordinator hired by the
7		judiciary;
8	(26)	Positions in the Hawaii National Guard youth and adult
9		education programs;
10	(27)	In the state energy office in the department of
11		business, economic development, and tourism, all
12		energy program managers, energy program specialists,
13		energy program assistants, and energy analysts;
14	(28)	Administrative appeals hearing officers in the
15		department of human services;
16	(29)	In the Med-QUEST division of the department of human
17		services, the division administrator, finance officer,
18		health care services branch administrator, medical
19		director, and clinical standards administrator;
20	(30)	In the director's office of the department of human
21		services, the enterprise officer, information security
22		and privacy compliance officer, security and privacy

1		compliance engineer, security and privacy compliance
2		analyst, information technology implementation
3		manager, assistant information technology
4		implementation manager, resource manager,
5		community/project development director, policy
6		director, special assistant to the director, and
7		limited English proficiency project
8		manager/coordinator;
9	(31)	The Alzheimer's disease and related dementia services
10		coordinator in the executive office on aging;
11	(32)	In the Hawaii emergency management agency, the
12		executive officer, public information officer, civil
13		defense administrative officer, branch chiefs, and
14		emergency operations center state warning point
15		personnel; provided that for state warning point
16		personnel, the director shall determine that
17		recruitment through normal civil service recruitment
18		procedures would result in delay or noncompliance;
19	(33)	The executive director and seven full-time
20		administrative positions of the school facilities
21		authority;

1	(34)	Positions in the Mauna Kea stewardship and oversight
2		authority;
3	(35)	In the office of homeland security of the department
4		of law enforcement, the statewide interoperable
5		communications coordinator[+] and the cybersecurity,
6		economic, education, and infrastructure security
7		coordinator; and
8	(36)	In the social services division of the department of
9		human services, the business technology analyst.
10	The	director shall determine the applicability of this
11	section t	o specific positions.
12	Noth	ing in this section shall be deemed to affect the civil
13	service s	tatus of any incumbent as it existed on July 1, 1955."
14	SECT	ION 2. Section 128A-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15	amended b	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
16	" (a	) There shall be established within the department of
17	law enfor	cement an office of homeland security. The director
18	shall emp	loy appropriate personnel and make expenditures as may
19	be necess	ary to carry out this chapter. The director shall
20	appoint a	n administrator of homeland security and a
21	cybersecu	rity, economic, education, and infrastructure security
22	coordinate	or who shall be exempt from chapter 76, subject to

1	removal by the director, and receive compensation as the
2	director may determine."
3	SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
4	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
5	SECTION 4. This Act, upon its approval, shall take effect
6	on July 1, 2024.
