#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTHCARE PRECEPTORS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is a shortage
- 2 of primary care providers in the State, which will be
- 3 exacerbated by the projected retirements of current physicians,
- 4 advanced practice registered nurses, pharmacists, and other
- 5 healthcare workers. Further, although students are interested
- 6 in pursuing careers in Hawaii's healthcare service industry, in-
- 7 state educational institutions are constrained by the lack of
- 8 clinical education sites in Hawaii and limited supply of
- 9 qualified preceptors. One way to encourage the participation of
- 10 preceptors is to offer an income tax credit for professionals
- 11 who serve as preceptors.
- 12 The purpose of the existing healthcare preceptor income tax
- 13 credit established under section 235-110.25, Hawaii Revised
- 14 Statutes, is to incentivize volunteer preceptors to offer
- 15 professional instruction, training, and supervision to students
- 16 and residents seeking careers as healthcare providers in Hawaii.
- 17 During the implementation of the tax credit, many providers



- 1 trained eligible students, but only a small subset met the
- 2 eligibility requirements due to the primary care qualifying
- 3 criterion for the preceptor.
- 4 Thus, the legislature recognizes that those programs
- 5 training physicians, advanced practice registered nurses,
- 6 pharmacists, and physician assistants in primary care also
- 7 require training from specialty preceptors who support primary
- 8 care, in addition to training from primary care providers. The
- 9 legislature further recognizes that the healthcare workforce has
- 10 shortages that extend beyond the current professions included in
- 11 the tax credit whose workforce expansion is also limited by
- 12 available preceptors, including social workers, physician
- 13 assistants, and registered dieticians. The legislature also
- 14 finds that the definition of "volunteer-based supervised
- 15 clinical training rotation" may be clarified to facilitate the
- 16 preceptor credit assurance committee's implementation of the tax
- 17 credit.
- 18 Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 19 (1) Amend the definitions of "preceptor" and "volunteer-
- 20 based supervised clinical training rotation" to

1		improve accessibility for providers to receive income
2		tax credits for acting as preceptors;
3	(2)	Add physician assistants, social workers, and
4		registered dieticians to the list of preceptors;
5		provided that any recognized preceptor may train any
6		eligible student to become eligible for the preceptor
7		tax credit;
8	(3)	Include physician assistant, registered dietitian and
9		social worker students in the definition of eligible
10		students; and
11	(4)	Revise the membership of the preceptor credit
12		assurance committee to include the director of health.
13	SECT	ION 2. Section 235-110.25, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended by	y amending subsection (g) to read as follows:
15	" (g)	For the purposes of this section:
16	"Aca	demic program" means an academic degree granting
17	program o	r graduate medical education program that:
18	(1)	Holds either its principal accreditation or a physical
19		location in Hawaii; and
20	(2)	Provides education to students, of whom more than
21		fifty per cent are residents of Hawaii.

         "Medical student" means an individual participating in a

    nationally accredited academic program leading to the medical

    doctor or doctor of osteopathy degree. "Medical student"

    includes graduates from nationally accredited academic programs

    who have continued their training, in the role of resident or
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- 1 fellow, to obtain the additional qualifications needed for
- 2 medical licensure, pursuant to chapter 453, or specialty
- 3 certification.
- 4 "Nationally accredited" means holding an institutional
- 5 accreditation by name to offer post-secondary medical primary
- 6 care education. Accreditation for medical students shall be
- 7 offered by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education or
- 8 American Osteopathic Association Commission on Osteopathic
- 9 College Accreditation. Accreditation for advanced practice
- 10 registered nurse students shall be offered by the Commission on
- 11 Collegiate Nursing Education. Accreditation for pharmacy
- 12 students shall be offered by the Accreditation Council for
- 13 Pharmacy Education. Accreditation for physician assistant
- 14 students shall be offered by the Accreditation Review Commission
- 15 on Education for the Physician Assistant, Inc. Accreditation
- 16 for social work students shall be offered by the Council on
- 17 Social Work Education. Accreditation for registered dietician
- 18 students shall be offered by the Accreditation Council for
- 19 Education in Nutrition and Dietetics.
- 20 "Pharmacy student" means an individual participating in an
- 21 academic program that is nationally accredited for the training

- ${f 1}$  of individuals to become registered pharmacists pursuant to
- 2 chapter 461.
- 3 "Physician assistant student" means an individual
- 4 participating in an academic program that is nationally
- 5 accredited for the education of physician assistants to become a
- 6 nationally certified and licensed physician assistant pursuant
- 7 to section 453-5.3.
- 8 "Preceptor" means a physician [or], osteopathic physician
- 9 or physician assistant, licensed pursuant to chapter 453[ $_{7}$ ]; an
- 10 advanced practice registered nurse, licensed pursuant to chapter
- 11 457 [-]; registered dietician, licensed pursuant to 448B, social
- 12 worker, licensed pursuant to chapter 467E, or a pharmacist,
- 13 licensed pursuant to chapter 461, who is a resident of Hawaii
- 14 [and who], maintains a professional [primary care] practice in
- 15 [this] the State[-], and whose specialty supports the
- 16 development and training of an eligible student in primary care.
- 17 "Primary care" means the principal point of continuing care
- 18 for patients provided by a healthcare provider, including health
- 19 promotion, disease prevention, health maintenance, counseling,
- 20 patient education, diagnosis and treatment of acute and chronic

- 1 illnesses, and coordination of other specialist care that the
- patient may need.
- 3 "Registered dietician student" means an individual
- 4 participating in an academic program that is nationally
- 5 accredited for the training of individuals to become licensed
- 6 registered dieticians pursuant to chapter 448B.
- 7 "Social work student" means an individual participating in
- 8 an academic program that is nationally accredited for the
- 9 training of individuals to become a social worker licensed
- 10 pursuant to chapter 467E.
- "Volunteer-based supervised clinical training rotation"
- 12 means [an-uncompensated] a period of supervised clinical
- 13 training [of] to an eligible student that totals at least eighty
- 14 hours of supervisory time annually, in which a preceptor
- 15 provides personalized instruction, training, and supervision to
- 16 an eligible student to enable the eligible student to obtain an
- 17 eligible professional degree or training certificate [-];
- 18 provided that, while a preceptor may be compensated for
- 19 providing standard clinical services, the preceptor shall be:

1	(1)	Uncompensated for the clinical training above or		
2		beyond clinical salary or reimbursements for clinical		
3		services; or		
4	(2)	Uncompensated for the provision of clinical training		
5		services from tuition funds or from state general		
6		funds."		
7	SECT	ION 3. Section 321-2.7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
8	amended to read as follows:			
9	"[+]	§321-2.7[+] Preceptor credit assurance committee. (a)		
10	There is	established the preceptor credit assurance committee		
11	within th	e department of health. The committee shall develop		
12	and implement a plan for certifying healthcare preceptor tax			
13	credits u	nder section 235-110.25, including:		
14	(1)	Developing a process ensuring that requests for credit		
15		certification are reviewed and verifications are		
16		processed no later than [thirty] sixty days following		
17		the close of each calendar year; and		
18	(2)	Developing the documentation process for the committee		
19		to certify a preceptor for the tax credit; provided		
20		that the documentation to be collected shall include:		

1	(A)	The preceptor's name, address, place of practice,
2		and Hawaii provider license number;
3	(B)	Dates and hours of volunteer-based supervised
4		clinical training rotation per eligible student;
5	(C)	Attestation that the preceptor is uncompensated
6		for the volunteer-based supervised clinical
7		training rotation; [and] provided that, if the
8		preceptor is compensated for providing standard
9		clinical services, attestation that the preceptor
10		is:
11	<u>(i)</u>	Uncompensated for the clinical training above or
12		beyond clinical salary or reimbursements for
13		clinical services; or
14	<u>(ii)</u>	Uncompensated for the provision of clinical
15		training services from tuition funds or from
16		state general funds;
17	(D)	Itemized specialties that support the development
18		and training of the eligible student in primary
19		care; and
20	[ <del>(D)</del> ]	(E) Other information deemed necessary by the
21		committee.

1 (b) The committee shall be composed of [representatives]: 2 (1) The director of health, or the director's designee; 3 and 4 (2) Representatives of: 5  $[\frac{1}{1}]$  (A) The Hawaii/Pacific basin area health education 6 center; 7  $[\frac{(2)}{(2)}]$  (B) The center for nursing; and 8  $[\frac{3}{3}]$  (C) Academic programs with eligible students. 9 (c) Members of the committee shall be immune from civil 10 liability for any official act, decision, or omission performed 11 for the purpose for which the committee was established, except for any acts, decisions, or omissions that constitute gross 12 13 negligence or wilful misconduct. 14 The proceedings of the committee shall not be subject 15 to part I of chapter 92. 16 (e) As used in this section, "academic program", "eligible **17** student", "preceptor", "primary care", and "volunteer-based 18 supervised clinical training rotation" shall have the same 19 meanings as in section 235-110.25." 20 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed

and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

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- 1 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023;
- 2 provided that section 2 of this Act shall apply to taxable years

3 beginning after December 31, 2022.
