A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE OAHU COMMUNITY CORRECTIONAL CENTER SITE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Oahu community
- 2 correctional center no longer properly serves the needs of its
- 3 inmate population or the surrounding community of Kalihi and is
- 4 no longer conducive to running an effective and secure modern
- 5 corrections facility. The legislature also finds that the
- 6 current location of the Oahu community correctional center is
- 7 not a suitable location for a jail. The jail is also near the
- 8 future route of the Honolulu rail transit project, and the
- 9 presence of the Oahu community correctional center may hinder
- 10 rail-related growth in the surrounding community.
- 11 The legislature further finds that the State is currently
- 12 evaluating proposals to relocate the Oahu community correctional
- 13 center. In 2018, the governor announced plans to relocate the
- 14 jail to the site of the State's animal quarantine facility in
- 15 Halawa.
- 16 The legislature further finds that for decades, government
- 17 and private entities have shown interest in redeveloping the



- 1 Oahu community correctional center site. The development of
- 2 this portion of Kalihi opens an opportunity to increase and
- 3 improve the community's affordable housing inventory, employment
- 4 options, and economic development potential. However, as with
- 5 any project, planning will be required to ensure the
- 6 redevelopment is compatible with the existing community. This
- 7 planning must be done collaboratively between all relevant
- 8 public and private organizations and the broader community.
- 9 Among other things, the planning must ensure that the zoning of
- 10 the jail site, and the zoning of surrounding parcels, are
- 11 conducive to the needs of the community. Good planning can also
- 12 help to promote public safety in the area, preventing the
- 13 recurrence of recent instances of criminal activity in the area
- 14 surrounding the jail site, such as illegal gambling.
- 15 The legislature further finds that planning is also
- 16 necessary to ensure that the infrastructure serving the site is
- 17 adequate to support its intended uses. This is particularly
- 18 important because some of the infrastructure around the jail
- 19 site is privately owned. Recently, a street near the Oahu
- 20 community correctional center was found to be contaminated with
- 21 dangerous levels of lead. The United States Environmental

1	Protection	Agency	had	to	obtain	an	administrative	warrant	to

- 2 access the road because the road did not have a designated
- 3 owner. The delays that these hurdles caused were of great
- 4 concern because the contaminated road was located in a dense
- 5 urban neighborhood with numerous residents and within a half-
- 6 mile of schools and parks. Adequate planning could help to
- 7 prevent these types of issues from recurring in the future.
- 8 The purpose of this Act is to establish the Oahu community
- 9 correctional center site redevelopment working group to bring
- 10 together state and county agencies, private entities, and the
- 11 broader Kalihi community to:
- 12 (1) Examine ways to best utilize the Oahu community
- correctional center site and the surrounding area
- 14 after the correctional center is relocated to a new
- 15 location; and
- 16 (2) Identify, study, work through, and recommend solutions
- to issues relating to the redevelopment of the Oahu
- 18 community correctional center site and the surrounding
- 19 area.
- 20 SECTION 2. (a) There is established within the office of
- 21 planning and sustainable development for administrative purposes

3	(b)	The working group shall identify, study, work through
4	and recom	mend solutions to the following:
5	(1)	Best uses of the Oahu community correctional center
6		site and the surrounding area after the correctional
7		center is relocated;
8	(2)	Possible changes in zoning to implement the
9		utilizations identified in paragraph (1);
10	(3)	Issues relating to the ownership and maintenance for
11		any roads or other infrastructure whose ownership is
12		in dispute at the site or the surrounding area;
13	(4)	Mitigation of, and adaptation to, the effects of
14		climate change at the site and the surrounding area;
15	(5)	Integration of the site with the future Honolulu rail
16		transit system;
17	(6)	Integration of the site with any existing area
18		transit-oriented development plans;
19	(7)	Integration of the site with the larger Kalihi
20		community;

1	(8)	Recommendations to maximize the use of the site to
2		revitalize the Kalihi community and promote Kalihi as
3		a major center of economic activity, while also
4		ensuring that residents of the Kalihi community gain
5		economic and other benefits from the redevelopment;
6		and
7	(9)	Any other issues that the working group finds to be
8		relevant to the site and surrounding area.
9	(c)	Members of the working group shall include:
10	(1)	The governor or the governor's designee, who shall
11		convene the working group's initial meeting;
12	(2)	The member of the state senate whose district includes
13		the Oahu community correctional center site or the
14		senator's designee;
15	(3)	The member of the state house of representatives whose
16		district includes the Oahu community correctional
17		center site or the representative's designee;
18	(4)	The superintendent of education or the
19		superintendent's designee;
20	(5)	The chairperson of the Hawaiian homes commission or
21		the chairperson's designee;

1	(6)	The chairperson of the board of land and natural
2		resources or the chairperson's designee;
3	(7)	The director of public safety or the director's
4		designee;
5	(8)	The director of transportation or the director's
6		designee;
7	(9)	The director of the office of planning and sustainable
8		development or the director's designee;
9	(10)	The chancellor of the Honolulu community college or
10		the chancellor's designee;
11	(11)	The executive director of the Hawaii housing finance
12		and development corporation or the executive
13		director's designee;
14	(12)	The mayor of the city and county of Honolulu or the
15		mayor's designee;
16	(13)	The member of the Honolulu city council whose district
17		includes the Oahu community correctional center site
18		or the councilmember's designee;
19	(14)	The director of the department of facility maintenance
20		of the city and county of Honolulu or the director's
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1	(15)	The director of the department of planning and
2		permitting of the city and county of Honolulu or the
3		director's designee;
4	(16)	The executive director of the Honolulu authority for
5		rapid transit or the executive director's designee;
6	(17)	A member of the Kalihi/Palama neighborhood board
7		number fifteen;
8	(18)	A representative to be invited from Kamehameha
9		Schools;
10	(19)	A representative to be invited from Kokua Kalihi
11		Valley; and
12	(20)	A representative to be invited from the Susanna Wesley
13		Community Center.
14	(d)	In addition to the members designated by subsection
15	(c), the	working group may invite any other appropriate person
16	to join th	he working group.
17	(e)	The initial meeting of the working group shall take
18	place no	later than sixty days after the effective date of this
19	Act and sl	hall be convened by the governor or the governor's
20	designee.	The working group shall elect a chairperson and any

- 1 other necessary officers from among its members at the initial
- 2 meeting.
- 3 (f) Members of the working group shall serve without
- 4 compensation. No member of the working group shall be subject
- 5 to section 84-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, solely because of
- 6 that member's participation on the working group.
- 7 (g) In fulfilling its responsibilities, the working group
- 8 shall consult, cooperate with, and seek advice from government
- 9 officials, Kalihi area residents, and representatives from the
- 10 public and private sectors, nonprofit social service
- 11 organizations, and community-based organizations.
- (h) To ensure transparency in the working group's
- 13 proceedings, the working group shall:
- 14 (1) Hold meetings on convenient dates and times to allow
- interested members of the public to attend, whether
- in-person or virtually; and
- 17 (2) Hold at least two meetings in which public comment or
- input is listed as an agenda item and make reasonable
- efforts to publicize the opportunity for the public to
- 20 submit input in advance.

1	(i)	The	office	of	planning	and	sustainable	development

- 2 shall provide administrative and clerical support as required by
- 3 the working group.
- 4 (j) The working group shall submit a report of its
- 5 findings and recommendations, including any proposed
- 6 legislation, to the governor, the legislature, the mayor of the
- 7 city and county of Honolulu, and the Honolulu city council no
- 8 later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular
- 9 sessions of 2024 and 2025.
- 10 (k) The working group shall cease to exist on June 30,
- 11 2025.
- 12 (1) As used in this Act:
- "Oahu community correctional center site" or "site" means
- 14 the site located at 2199 Kamehameha highway, TMK 1-2-013:002, on
- 15 which the Oahu community correctional center is located.
- 16 "Surrounding area" means the area within a one-half mile
- 17 radius of the current location of the Oahu community
- 18 correctional center; provided that the term may include areas
- 19 outside of the one-half mile radius when determined by the
- 20 working group to be necessary for planning purposes.

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1 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
