A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that investment in public
health infrastructure is critical to reduce the probability of
death and disability in local communities by increasing timely
response and ability to render effective aid to 911 calls - both of which are of paramount importance to successful outcomes
from life-threatening incidents and sickness.

7 The legislature further finds that ensuring access to 8 emergency health care statewide is contingent on empowering 9 aspiring medical health care professionals, including emergency 10 medical services personnel, to practice in the State. 11 Currently, under section 453-32, Hawaii Revised Statutes, 12 emergency medical technicians, advanced emergency medical 13 technicians, mobile intensive care technicians, and paramedics 14 can pursue licensure from the Hawaii medical board after 15 completing various prerequisites, including position-specific 16 local programs and certification by the National Registry of



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Emergency Medical Technicians for the requisite level of
practice.

3 The legislature also finds that in recent years, efforts to 4 request funding for the establishment of advanced life support 5 ambulances have stalled due to a lack of gualified personnel to 6 consistently staff the vehicles. Existing law requires a 7 minimum of one mobile intensive care technician and one 8 emergency medical technician for advanced life support, as well 9 as two emergency medical technicians for basic life support, except hospital-based ambulance service, which requires one 10 emergency medical technician and one registered nurse licensed 11 12 in the State.

13 The legislature further finds that there are only three 14 institutions that currently provide programs that offer the 15 requisite training for emergency medical service licensure in 16 the State, including Kapiolani community college; University of 17 Hawaii, Maui college campus; and Hawaii community college. With 18 programs not offered in every county, many prospective emergency services personnel are required to relocate to pursue licensure. 19 20 This barrier has created a disparate impact on rural,



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1 underserved communities in these counties, where public health 2 services represent a significant source of healthcare. 3 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require the 4 department of health to establish and implement a program to 5 improve access to critical care by increasing support for 6 emergency medical services personnel in the State. 7 SECTION 2. (a) The department of health shall establish 8 and implement a program to improve and increase support for 9 emergency medical services by: 10 (1) Expanding access to curriculum and training approved 11 by the department of health for emergency medical 12 services personnel in each county of the State, 13 including remote or virtual classes; 14 (2) Providing a pathway for high school students who want to pursue a career in emergency medical services; 15 16 (3) Promoting the recruitment, hiring, and retention of 17 trained emergency medical services personnel in each 18 county of the State; 19 (4) Providing reimbursement for fees and costs associated 20 with training courses required for licensure to



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1 individuals who successfully obtain a license pursuant 2 to section 453-34, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and 3 (5) Providing new equipment, medication, and vehicles to 4 the county emergency medical systems established 5 pursuant to section 46-192, Hawaii Revised Statutes. 6 (b) The department of health shall submit a report of its 7 findings and recommendations regarding the effectiveness of the 8 program, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature 9 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular 10 sessions of 2024 and 2025.

11 (C) The program shall cease to exist on June 30, 2025. 12 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 13 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 14 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and 15 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 16 year 2024-2025 for the department of health to establish a 17 program to improve and increase support for emergency medical 18 services in the State pursuant to section 2 of this Act.

19 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department20 of health for the purposes of this Act.

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SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
