# A BILL FOR AN ACT

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE HAWAII STATE CONSTITUTION REGARDING THE FREEDOM OF SPEECH.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the United States 2 Supreme Court's decision in Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission, 558 U.S. 310 (2010), reversed long-standing campaign 3 4 finance restrictions and designated corporate spending on 5 elections as free speech protected under the First Amendment of 6 the Constitution of the United States. The decision removed any limits on the amount of money that corporations, special 7 8 interest groups, and political action committees (PACs) could 9 spend on an election. The legislature further finds that the decision in Citizens United is a serious threat to our 10 democracy. Corporations enjoy various advantages, including 11 12 limited liability, perpetual life, and favorable treatment in the accumulation and distribution of assets, which allow them to 13 14 amass and spend an extraordinary amount of money on political 15 messages that often have far greater reach and influence than 16 messages from individuals. During the thirteen years since the

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Citizens United decision, there has been a massive increase in
 political spending by corporations, special interest groups, and
 PACs, dramatically expanding their already outsized political
 influence on election outcomes and policy decisions.

The legislature also finds that the power to amend state 5 6 constitutions rests with the people of each state, and the 7 legislature believes it is critical that the State express its 8 disapproval of the Citizens United decision. At least twenty 9 states, including Hawaii in 2016, have taken legislative action 10 urging Congress to pass a proposed constitutional amendment that 11 overturns the decision in Citizens United; however, Congress has 12 failed to take any action and appears unlikely to do so.

13 The legislature acknowledges that as long as *Citizens*14 United is binding law, this Act will have no effect on the
15 Constitution of the United States. United States Supreme Court
16 decisions can be overturned, as demonstrated by the Court's
17 decision to override the fifty-year-old *Roe v. Wade* decision.
18 Therefore, a state constitutional provision, while not binding
19 today, may nonetheless be valuable in the future.

20 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to propose an21 amendment to article I, section 4, of the Constitution of the

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1	State of Hawaii to provide that the expenditure of money to
2	influence elections is not a form of speech protected under the
3	Constitution of the State of Hawaii.
4	SECTION 2. Article I, section 4, of the Constitution of
5	the State of Hawaii is amended to read as follows:
6	"FREEDOM OF RELIGION, SPEECH, PRESS,
7	ASSEMBLY AND PETITION
8	Section 4. No law shall be enacted respecting an
9	establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise
10	thereof, or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press or
11	the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition
12	the government for a redress of grievances.
13	The freedom of speech shall not include the expenditure of
14	money to influence elections."
15	SECTION 3. The question to be printed on the ballot shall
16	be as follows:
17	"Shall the Constitution of the State of Hawaii be amended
18	to state that freedom of speech protections under the
19	Constitution of the State of Hawaii do not include the
20	expenditure of money to influence elections?"
21	SECTION 4. New constitutional material is underscored.

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# 1 SECTION 5. This amendment shall take effect on July 1,
